2118 Are Enrolled

Austin Peay State College has 2118 students enrolled for the Fall Quarter, according to M. P. Bowman, registrar and dean of admissions.

The number is a record enrollment at APSC and exceeds the previous high of 1979 set last year.

Included in the number are 1451 men and 667 women. By classification, there are 903 fresh-

men, 485 sophomores, 394 juniors, 262 seniors and 74 graduate students.

By further breakdown, there are 926 men and 503 women that are full-time residence students. An additional 343 men and 139 women are enrolled as part-time residence students.

The Fort Campbell Extension Center has 185 students enrolled with an additional 22 students enrolled in in-service extension.

Govs Face Bucs

The Buccaneers will encounter the powerful Buccaneers of East Tennessee State College this Saturday.

The Buccaneers, leading the OVC with a record of 3 and 1 in games played through October 20, are led by quarterback Jimmy Baker. Baker leads the OVC in rushing with a 7.5 yards per carry average, in passing with 570 yards and 5 TDs, in total offense with 908 yards, and scoring with 48 points.

Student coach Jack Bushofsky, after scouting East Tennessee, said, "The Buccaneers are the toughest team the Governors will face this year. They are lacking in depth but have 15 or 16 boys who can go all the way."

Gamecocks Defeat Governors

The Governors' defeat at the hands of the Jacksonville Gamecocks Saturday came as a surprise to most of the crowd who saw the game.

It was thought by many of the people closely connected with the team that the Govs had their best chance of winning their first game this year.

The Gamecocks, led by Little All-American Arland Carter, spoiled an otherwise successful homecoming celebration by defeating the Governors 23-13. Carter scored two of his team's touchdowns and was the game's leading rusher with 158 yards

gained.

The lone bright spot for Austin Peay State was senior quarterback Richard Moore. When the final horn sounded, Moore had broken a total of seven school records -- five single game records and two career records.

The records now owned by Moore are: (1) Most passes attempted single game, 38; (2) most passes completed single game,

19; (3) most yards gained by passing single game, 233; (4) most offensive plays single game, 41; (5) most total offense single game, 218. Career records set by Moore are: (1) Most passes attempted; (2) Most passes completed.

This week the Governors face the powerful East Tennessee State Buccaneers.
