APSU named Best for Vets College

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APSU is the only fouryear university in the state of Tennessee to be named a "Best For Vets College" by the *Military*

Times.

According to the *Military*Times website, over 650 schools, a new record, completed the Best
For Vets College survey of almost
150 questions. Only 68 schools were qualified for the list. The number one four-year college for military veterans, according to the survey, was Eastern Kentucky
University in Richmond, KY.
APSU ranked 43.

Some of APSU's attractions for student veterans are its various military accomodations. There are out-of-state fee waivers for active duty military, early registration for veterans, veteranspecific sections of classes and the ability to withdraw without penalty if they are deployed or activated.

Various organizations serve the student veterans on APSU's campus. The Military Student Center inside the UC lets student veterans, active duty military, ROTC students and family members study, relax and interact with other students. Inside the center are a lounge area, a study table and computers and printers available for use.

and printers available for use.

Additionally, the center helps veterans and military students transition into college life while educating students about the sacrifices and challenges that student veterans go through with workshops and outreach events throughout the year.

Also, the Student Veterans Organization, which began as a discussion group for student veterans, was officially formalized in April 2010.

It is associated with the

Student Veterans of America, which is a network of college and university student veteran groups throughout the United States.

The *Military Times* took several factors into account when compiling the list of veteranfriendly colleges.

The factors include the full and part-time enrollment of student veterans for the university in question.

They also considered whether the Veterans Affairs Department participates in the Yellow Ribbon program, where the school and VA contribute equal amounts to fully or partially make up the difference between a school's tuition and the post-9/11 GI Bill's nationwide cap for funding.

Other factors include whether or not a school has a central office for handling veteran issues, the number of staff members

SGA proposes three resolutions

SGA is jumping back into things immediately following the Thanksgiving break by proposing three resolutions. This brings the total number of resolutions SGA has proposed up to six for the semester.

Senator Amanda Blankenship, representing the College of Arts and Letters, put forth Resolution No. 4. This resolution suggests APSU purchase bleachers for the intramural field after students "expressed displeasures with this particular area."

Should this resolution pass by majority vote in the SGA, a formal recommendation would be issued to the vice president of Finance and the Physical Plant to investigate the purchasing of bleachers. Resolution No. 4 will be put to a debate and vote Wednesday, Dec. 5.

Senator Myleah Gallagher wrote the second resolution put forth. Gallagher has previously put forth two pieces of legislation, both of which passed unanimously and are currently in the progress of being enacted.

Resolution No. 5 is a request to install three Halsey Taylor bottle filling stations for "reducing the need for single-use plastic water bottles, therefore decreasing the amount of waste produced."

Two models are mentioned: one is a wall mounted model which, according to the website drinkingfountaindoctor.com, costs \$1,843.50 each, and the other is a freestanding model approved by the Americans with Disabilities Act which costs \$2,603.50 per unit. Resolution No. 5 will be put to debate and vote on Wednesday,

Resolution No. 6 was not read at the meeting held on Wednesday, Nov. 28, as the sponsoring senator, Jessica Dillingham, was not present at the meeting.

Dillingham's legislation proposes a request be sent to APSU's Dining Services and Chartwell's to "discontinue usage of polystyrene food containers and start using more environmentally friendly alternatives, such as to-go boxes made from corn or recyclable plastic."

Mentioned in the legislation is a study published in the Journal of Applied Polymer Science which found that even after 32 years, polystyrene

— more commonly called Styrofoam - did not biodegrade.

Resolution No. 6 will be introduced to the senate floor on Wednesday, Dec. 5.

The SGA had its first visitor this semester as well.

Ryan Whipkey, a junior political science major who is president of the Gay Straight Alliance and the College Democrats, came to address the senate regarding a petition currently in the works which suggests the establishment of a center for gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender students.

The petition hasn't been presented to the senate yet, but according to Ryan, the GSA is planning to do so. TAS

More and more young people are losing their lives to car accidents than ever before, and new technological advances accessible in vehicles are not helping. Choosing to send a text, tweet or Facebook status while driving negatively affects

Being a distracted driver doesn't just involve texting. Drivers can be distracted from the road due to eating and drinking, talking to passengers, grooming, reading maps, using a navigation system, watching a video or even adjusting your

In 2010, 3,092 people were killed in crashes involving a distracted driver and an estimated additional 416,000 were injured in motor vehicle crashes involving a distracted driver, according to distraction.gov.

Studies have shown, texting while driving can be worse than drinking while driving. Being a distracted driver affects the driver's ability to react effectively and their ability to be as alert as they should when on the road.

Sending or receiving a text takes a driver's eyes from the road for an average of 4.6 seconds, according to distraction.gov. This is the equivalent of driving the length of an entire football field blind, at 55 mph.

Laws against texting and driving are being written in many different states, and Tennessee is how convenient, it is one of them. These laws help deter some people from being distracted drivers, although too many drivers ignore these laws and text message while driving anyway.

"Many people use cell phones from a place they were never intended to be used: the driver's seat. When Tennesseans' hands are off the wheel, their focus is off the task of driving, and the consequences can be deadly," former Governor Phil Bredeson told tn.gov in 2010, in support of the "No Phone Zone Day" campaign which was established by Oprah Winfrey.

Winfrey took the time to start the campaign on April 30, 2010, to encourage drivers to make a pledge against distracted driving their ability to be as and texting while behind the

"My biggest hope for the No Phone Zone campaign is When on the road." that it becomes mandatory

that no one uses their phone in the car or texts while driving just as seat belts are mandatory, just as driving while drunk is considered absolutely taboo ... I'm hoping that this becomes not just law, but second nature for all of us," Winfrey said in a statement in The New York Times.

Many celebrities have taken on the responsibility of telling people not to text while

driving. Even famous pop performer, Justin Bieber took the time to support the cause. He has shown his concern through television appearances as well as his support of the phone application called Phone Guard, which is an app made for your phone to help prevent distracted driving.

"Phone Guard 360 is about saving lives pure and simple. It's horrible what is happening out

on the roads today. Injuries and lives cut short because so many people are texting and talking on their phones while driving," Bieber said, "Please join me and Phone Guard to stop this tragedy ... The app even has a personal panic alarm feature that will automatically dial 911, parents or any other selected number in case of

an emergency." Kim Kardashian released a statement via Twitter saying, "I had an awful texting and driving experience, can't wait to share it with you all one day! Seriously it's so unsafe and it's so preventable."

These are just a few celebrities who have taken the time to tell their fans it is not safe to text while driving.

If they can support it, so can we.

Drivers that risk their life and the lives of others, just to send a text message or check their Facebook, are reckless and very irresponsible.

Concerned drivers should go to distraction.gov to find out more information and statistics on the dangers of texting while driving and also to sign the pledge to not text while you drive. **TAS**



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

The plays consisted of many different story lines, from a play about how cell phones interrupt quiet

activities, as in Stephen Smith's "Fell Wishers," to an interesting relationship between an animal rights activist and her boyfriend who accidentally runs over a duck in Andrew Sanders' "The Day the Duck Died."

"I have enjoyed all the plays, but 'Fell Wishers' really caught my attention," said APSU student Julie Upshur. "It showed how cell phones are an interruption to life, yet we still continue to use them."

As an organization, the CWC encouraged writers to further develop their writing skills and open their minds to new forms of writing through the Playfest.

Members were also able to come closer together by understanding each others' ideas and acting them out in their intended ways.

"I think, as a whole, it was an utter success," CWC president Chase Davenport said about Playfest. "The performances were all very well done, and used a very diverse pool of talent."

The CWC was able to raise over \$200 for the club from the event, and hopes to use the funds for a literary road trip in the near future.

"It's fantastic to have a fundraiser that relates to our goal as a club," Key said.

Avoiding stress during final exam season

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We all create our own stress. This semester it would be a good idea to identify how we are doing this.

Some people tend to lose their perspective and, instead of thinking in a positive way, begin to set up

Many students enter final exams thinking, "If I don't get an A on this exam, I might fail the course."

Then the anxiety builds up, and it's possible to actually make a lower grade given the additional stress.

Teresa Prendes-Walls, counseling psychologist at Student Counseling Services, called this process "catastrophizing."

Prendes-Walls said she believes students should be realistic and change the way they think.

"Eat well, get more sleep, be around friends and get out of your room," Prendes-Walls said.

She shared her view of other things we can all do, such as going for walks, taking breaks, studying with friends, designing a schedule and getting exercise.

Exercise can sometimes be blamed for causing tiredness, but this is the opposite of what exercise can

When people walk or participate in sports or any

other exercise, the heart rate and metabolic rate increase to release endorphins in the brain.

People will tend to feel a sense of euphoria and calmness, which helps focus and general well-being. Exercise does not make people feel tired.

It is important to know what causes stress — then it is easier to determine what helps and what doesn't. At this point, people are able to stage a plan to reduce

During finals, students need to take care of their bodies. If a student starts to worry about exams, it is

important to breathe deeply and slowly. Take time to enjoy a daydream about the things that are enjoyable and refocus back on the exam and how

During finals there are also a lot of distractions both on and off campus. Learn to say "no" to others if you start doing more for them than your time allows. Students can benefit by doing things at which they excel and making a list of their strengths.

If you have any health problems, don't ignore the symptoms because that may only lead to more stress. If all else fails, seek assistance from a professional if you are unable to deal with the stress level.

Try not to "cram," but if you do, don't forget about the Pre Cram Jam at the Foy Center at 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. on Thursday, Dec. 6.

There will be an oxygen bar available to help with relaxation. Students will be able to smell flavors and enjoy food, smoothies and inflatables, among other attractions. This is a great opportunity to be around others and get out of the dorm to take a break.

With the fall semester coming to a close, sports editor Daniel Newton has put together his All-APSU team for the top performers in all sports

Player of the semester: Tatiana Ariza



As a junior, Tatiana was named to her third consecutive all-OVC first team in soccer as well as being named OVC offensive player of the year. In 19 games, she had 12 goals, eight assists and 32 points. This season, she broke the APSU record for career goals, assists in a season and tied for second in goals in a season despite missing the first two games while playing in the Olympics.

Runner-up: Nikki Doyle

Doyle made the all-OVC volleyball team for the third consecutive year, becoming the first Lady Gov to do so and the only one from this year's squad. She was also the first Lady Gov to record three 400 kill seasons, setting the school record with 34 in a single match against MTSU. She finished the season with 429 kills and led APSU to a fourth-seed in the OVC tournament.

Natalia Ariza: Jr. midfielder, soccer

Ariza made the all-OVC first-team. Took more of a defensive role this season, tallying only three assist on the season, but made a reputation for being a shut-down defender on a team that allowed less than a goal per game

Devin Stark: Sr. wide receiver, football

Stark was quarterback Jake Ryan's favorite target, bringing in 67 catches for 774 yards and 10 touchdowns. He accounted for one-third of team catches and receiving yards and over half of the team's touchdown receptions.





Cami Fields: So. setter, volleyball

Fields has made her presence known since her arrival at APSU. She started all 31 games as a freshmen last year and played in all 121 sets this season, the only Lady Gov to do so. She accumulated 1254 of the teams 1491 assists.

Haylee Shoaff: Jr. goalkeeper, soccer

Earned second-team all-OVC honors. She accumulated a .837 save percentage and scored seven shut-outs on the season. She only allowed more than two goals in a game four times out of 21 games.





Leslie Martinez: Sr. forward, basketball

Through seven games, Martinez leads the Lady Govs basketball team in points (10.6), rebounds (6.3) and minutes (31.7) per game. She is second on the team in steals and assists, but leads the team in free throws made.

Xiamar Richards: Jr., cross-country

Richards was the top finisher in every event for APSU this season, winning the JSU Invitational with a time of 18:39.20. She made the all-OVC team for the second straight year after finishing 10th at the OVC championships





Emily Perkins: Sr. forward, soccer

Earned second-team all-OVC honors. Second on the team with seven goals, six assist and 20 points on the season. She started all 21 games in her final season and tied for third most goals in a career.

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The Lady Govs had a rough trip to Nashville when they took on Vanderbilt on Wednesday, Nov. 28. APSU was only able to score nine points in the second half, falling 67-37.

The team went a stone-cold three for 28 in the second half. Freshman Tiasha Gray led the team with 12 points.

Gray's performance at Vandy made an impression on coach Carrie Daniels, as she made her first start of her career against Ball State on Saturday, Dec. 1, beside fellow freshman Jennifer Nwokocha, who made her first career start at Vandy.

"We are very pleased with our freshmen class. I think they just continue to get better and better," Daniels said.

APSU started the game on a 7-0 run, but

then spent the rest of the half going back and forth. A Gray steal and layup as time expired made the Lady Govs lead 32-21 at halftime. Megan Bussabarger stole the show in the second half. After three straight turnovers

brought Ball State within six points,

Bussabarger led her teams charge, eventually gaining a 23-point lead before winning, 79-66. Bussabarger went six for nine in the second half, scoring 14 of her team high 20 points. Martinez finished with a double-double,

finishing with 11 points and 10 rebounds.

With the victory against Ball State, the Lady Govs record is 2-5. They will look to perform better on the road, traveling to Middle Tennessee State on Tuesday, Dec. 4, before returning home to take on St. Catherine College on Sunday, Dec. 9. TAS

Men's basketball demolish Berea, outrun by Fairfield


