

Normal Whips Bethel Team By 14 To 0 Score

Holt and Miller Star in
Great Game on
October 16.

A flashing figure weighing only about 170 pounds, but with the ten of dynamite's and ran like a wild mule, weaved in and out around the Bethel McKee football team and led the way for the Red and White team of Austin Peay normal to win 14 to 0, on Friday, October 16. This sensational normal halfback, Harwood (Brentwood, Blizard), Holt, acted like the Bethel team, beat it back on its haunches and with sometimes two and three men dashed about, his body loomed the opposing line for disastrous gains and for two touchdowns. To Hart and Darden on the credit for the two extra points. It was Hart who went in to take Holt's place immediately after he had scored the first two touchdowns in the first quarter, who kicked the goal for the "first extra point" and then booted the pignik over the goals in the last quarter for the second point. Afterward, Miller, the star of Holt in the backfield, not only proved himself a dangerous man on the offense, but he broke the backs of the visitors in their air attack to intercept six passes and spike every effort to win the overhead ball. Miller also developed an uncanny habit of tickling the sky and taking the ball punched for a hostile back and nip every yard rally before it even budged.

Line Play Was Great and Austin forgot every man on that team, especially Overby and Pickard played great games. The entire line was invincible when the goal was threatened. Every time the Bethel team struck at the goal line it found instead a determined line invincible and unbreakable, which loomed before it. Devereux, Cotton and they played splendidly in the backfield and Cotton's punting was excellent. Darden, who shared duties both in the line and in the backfield, made a valuable man in every department of the game.

The normal team kicked off to start the affair and Bethel could not make first down. Normal received the ball on a punt and Holt started his great work by making twenty yards on Cotton's pass which he hurried out of bounds. "The ball was on Bethel's forty yard line and Miller kicked off eight yards. Holt by a trick play carried the ball to the 20 yard line and Miller made a yard through the line. Miller punted off, another first down and the ball was on the Bethel 12 yard line. Holt on a left and ran carried the leather to the 5 yard line and then a spin play carried the ball to the 1 yard line. On the next play Holt went over the touchdown. Coach Adair then told him and sent in Hart who kicked the extra point. In the second quarter the Bethel team showed a decided determination to score. Early in that period Cotton's punt was blocked and Bethel recovered the ball on normal's 20 yard line. Here the normal line was invincible and Bethel lost the ball down. Devereux made a first down on a spin play and then Cotton on the third down kicked to the Bethel 23 yard line.

Bethel Threatens
Coming back in the last half Bethel for a few minutes swept down the field like a new team. Beadles' pass was completed for a 25 yard gain, and the ball was on normal's 25 yard line. Another first down, by a line pass and off tackle, Beadles carried the ball to the 40 yard and White 13 yard line. Here the line held and the visitors pressed to the air. Miller, by a pass, passed on his own yard line and the fourth down and Holt escaped through the line. For nine yards. Cotton then kicked to the 40 yard line. Bethel tried punting and again Miller grabbed the ball and took up the

playhouse. Here the visitors kicked on the fourth down to again almost score. Beadles' Bethel's 27 yard line. Beadles made a 20 yard run, a 3 yard ball on normal's 3 yard line. Darden came left, but when Cotton punted out of danger he was charged with shagging. Beadles and the normal team was penalized 25 yards, the ball being moved to normal's 3 yard line. Darden came in the game for Cotton, Holt going to quarterback. Darden then kicked out of danger.

The last touchdown was scored in the fourth quarter. The final spurt was started by Miller who intercepted a pass for the fourth time on his own 40 yard line. Holt made 3 yards through the line and again made 3 yards. Miller went another three yards and Holt made third down playing the ball on the 23 yard line. Holt again made first down by a great dash over the line and the Bethel team was 7 yards. Holt reeled off another firstdown, leaving the ball on the 23 yard line. The visitors were given a chance to take it over, but he fumbled the pignik and recovered. Holt then shot over for the second touchdown. Darden drop-kicked the extra point.

Miller intercepted his fifth punt for the 20 yard line. Normal began a desperate air attack. Normal kicked again and the Bethel team intercepted the ball on his sixth pass from the waiting arms of a Bethel player, who made a yard in the Red and White team's possession.

It may be seen by the story that the back field was played as a team game, but the line was charging and the guards were doing their best to intercept. The Red and White team was like a stone wall.
