



Never again will school spirit create such festivities.









## DEANS






# Campus Life





Marty Chambliss was featured on their amusing homecoming float which placed third in the parade.




The Govs started out rather slowly but gradually picked up steam. By the time the VSAC Tournament rolled around



we were at our peak. In the first game of the tournament we set a school all-time scoring record by defeating Union University by a score of 108-97. The old school mark was 106 points.

After we won the VSAC Tournament, four of our players were chosen to the All-Tournament team. They were: Jim Stewart, Bob Bradley, Roger Davis, and Howard Gorrell. Gorrell was also named the most valuable player in the entire VSAC. Howard finished fifth in the nation in small college free throw percentage.

Shortly after the tournament we were invited to the small college basketball tournament being played in Owensboro, Kentucky. We won our first regional game with Belmont Abbey, 74-63, and advanced to the regional finals opposed by mighty Kentucky Wesleyan. The Govs were defeated after a long battle by fourteen points, 83-60. This closed the 1960 season.

Aaron's men had succeeded in reviving the school spirit after the hard football season.

This year we lose only two men, Howard Gorrell and Ray Justice. The future looks extremely bright as the Freshman team, coached by George Fisher, compiled a fine overall record of 21-4. Some of the boys will be brought up to replenish the varsity which will be extremely strong.

Austin Peay has been the Volunteer State Athletic Con-

Best free throw pct. in one game, 93.8% against Florence State.






This club is made up of music majors and minors and others who are interested in music education.




