### Gentry Attends Ill. Institute

Mrs. Janie S. Gentry, assistant acquisitions librarian of APSC, attended the ninth annual Allerton Park Institute of the University of Illinois Graduate School of Library Science, November 11-14 at Monticello, Ill.

This year the theme of the institute was "Selection and Acquisition Procedure in Medium-Sized and Large Libraries."

Program topics included the mechanics of book selection and book ordering; blanket book ordering; the selection, ordering and handling of serials; foreign publications; U. S. Government publications; the state of the rare book market today; and the relationship of the acquisitions department to the library's total program.

These conferences are limited to 100 participants and deal with a topic which has been selected to be of primary concern of the profession.

These students were selected for this honor on the basis of these standards:

1. Scholastic grade average of all records to date must be "B" at least.

2. Recognition by students or participation in campus activities must be in at least one of the following four categories:

a. Must have held at least one elective office for one year in a type of college organization recognized by the administration, or

b. Must have been active in at least two organizations of the college which provide membership for at least one and all students of the college at any one year.

These organizations may be band, religious organizations, etc., or

c. In lieu of being active members in two college organizations which are open to all students of the college, one supervisory or annual recognition voted by the students may be substituted for one year of active membership as described, or

d. Must have received an award through some college organization recognized by the administration. These may be awards by an organization such as athletics, debating, etc.

Those honored had to pass the preceding qualifications in order to have their names submitted for a vote from the faculty. Their names were then sent to "Who's Who's" board from which the final selections were made according to their accomplishments and faculty vote.

### Former APSC Teacher Dies In Maryville

Miss Annie Laurie Huff, first woman superintendent of schools in Tennessee, died November 26 in a Maryville, Tenn. nursing home.

Miss Huff, author of several English textbooks and poems, taught school in Cooke County, Rowan, East Tennessee State College and at APSC.

She came to APSC in September 1929 from Pulaski, where she had been the first woman superintendent of schools. She was retired in 1956 from APSC. She was the faculty adviser of "The All State," the campus newspaper, and was instrumental in helping to organize the first alumni group on campus.

In 1935 she co-authored "Our Mighty Language," a textbook for elementary schools.

Until she went to the nursing home, she had lived in Parrottsville.

rah Todd Fowler, will teach the course.

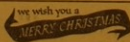

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## Speech Read To Students

Harlan Matthews, Commissioner of the Department of Finance Administration for Tennessee, brought greetings from Governor Buford Ellington to the Austin Peay State College student body in assembly November 21. Matthews was introduced by Joe Morgan, Commissioner of Education and president-elect of APSC. Morgan was introduced by Earl Sexton, acting president of APSC.

Matthews presented the speech which Ellington had written for the occasion. Ellington said that more money is spent in Tennessee for education than for any other function. Forty-four cents of every tax dollar collected goes for education.

Ellington's text commented that the state colleges, including APSC, had a democratic basis which made them principally interested in assistance to the students. APSC is a people's college, he said, and does not practice selective admission. The college is responsive to needs of the students.

All that is necessary for evil to triumph over good, Ellington's speech said in regard to the threat of Communism throughout the world, is for the good to do nothing. The undercover movement in this nation was pointed out.

Perhaps one reason why people distrust the federal government more, the governor pointed out, is that federal taxes are so much higher. Much expense is required for national defense; part of the federal taxes comes back to the states for use within the various states.

Ellington's prepared speech pointed out that the world is changing daily and that people should feel their responsibility to elect only highly qualified persons to high offices.

The basketball Governors presented new head coach George Fisher with his first victory in their opening game Saturday, defeating Transylvania 84-80 in overtime.

Led by Doug Stamper (21 points), Jackie Winders (19 points) and Steve Miller (12 points), APSC turned the tables on Transylvania in this year's game. Transylvania defeated the Gobs

87-84 last year.

Transylvania led by Jack Lucas (23 points), Sonny Voyles (21 points) and Charlie Moore (16 points).

The Gobs can point to their rebounding strength and free throw shooting as their main weapons in winning. APSC out-rebounded Transylvania 50 to 33 and outscored them from the free throw lane 20 to 8. Both teams were red hot from the field, the

Gobs hitting 48.4 per cent of their shots and Transylvania hitting 48 per cent.

Miller (14 rebounds) and Henry Murry (12 rebounds) led the Gobs in cleaning both boards.

In the freshman game, the Baby Gobs defeated Cumberland University 91-66.

The Gobs play two more games on the road this week, at Middle Tennessee December 6 and at Belmont December 8. APSC returns to Memorial Gymnasium December 10 to play Van American in their last pre-Christmas home game.

Junior half-back Ralph Grant and sophomore tackle Ed Bunio were noted the outstanding players from APSC.

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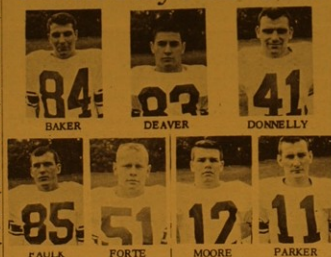
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
