Miss Morrison's plans for the future include transferring to the University of Tennessee and marriage in the spring.







BLACK HISTORY WEEK was held February 12-17. Various activities were scheduled with each emphasizing contributions of the Black American.



In the winter quarter "A Lion in Winter" made its way to the Austin Peay stage. This production was also an effort of Filippo.




THE NIGHT THOREAU

Mayor.








The plays were well received and provided a night of free entertainment for students.










Activities started on Friday, March 29, with a jam session, and the judging of various contests began Saturday and ran well into the night.


Along with the fiddlers, an added attraction was an Arts and Crafts Exhibition and sale.











WORK is not a word unfamiliar to most students. Many of the students at Austin Peay found jobs in the surrounding areas to cut costs, while others secured jobs on campus.














The NIGHT for many students is a time of relaxation after the classes of that day. Students join together at the University Center for a game of pool, ping pong, cards, or just company and conversation.





The students and people of Clarksville gave their support to the team. Although defeated, this game provided interest and excitement that would long be remembered.







Student Government Association





Speech and Theatre




Mathematics





Education

This program introduces skills and concepts necessary for general library use. The study was conducted by Mildred G. Wallace.









Farewell and Hail

Sigma Chi



As a weekly student publication The All State served as the media by which students were kept informed on the happenings around campus. As a prize-winning college newspaper. The All State maintained its record of excellence.



IT WAS SOMEWHAT less than an earth-shattering year in 1973 for first year head coach Jack Bushofsky and his Governors. Austin Peay had a 2-8 over-all record and 1-6 Ohio Valley Conference mark.

Bushofsky returned to his alma mater where he was a Little All-American guard on the Gov squad of 1960. He replaced Bill Dupes who had tutored APSU for ten previous seasons. Because Bushofsky was not selected for the job until mid-January, recruiting efforts were extremely difficult. However, the new head man made strides in several phases of the new program via recruitment and fielded a representative squad.

Austin Peay opened the season at home, but lost to non-conference Henderson State by a 17-7 margin. But the Govs rebounded the next weekend to upend Youngstown of Ohio 16-7. Tailback Bill Hammon keyed APSU's win, piling up 141 yards on the ground and kicking a 40-yard field goal.






WESTERN KENTUCKY UNIVERSITY'S awesome and powerful Hilltoppers almost completely shut off Austin Peay's offense and carried home an impressive 28-0 decision in the OVC opener for both teams played in Municipal Stadium. The 'Toppers' went on to finish their regular season undefeated and earned a berth in the NCAA Division II playoffs where WKU was runner-up for the national championship.

Eastern Kentucky was a rude host on the Governor's first road game, soaking up a 24-7 win in a rain hampered afternoon game. Lack of offensive punch was again the Gov downfall. Austin Peay's only score was an 83-yard pass play from Jeff Baker to Ron Bailey, both freshmen. It was Baker's first collegiate pass and Bailey's first collegiate reception.








AUSTIN PEAY led OVC runner-up Murray State 13-7 early in the third quarter but the Racers stormed back to register a 31-19 win over the Governors. Bushofsky's Govs final road game of the year resulted in a 31-12 setback to Tennessee Tech in near-freezing temperatures. Austin Peay closed the season by blitzing East Tennessee 28-13. Bill Hammon led the APSU offensive assault with 161 yards rushing.

Defensive back Eddie Filyaw and defensive end Don Neff were named to the All-OVC second team

at season's end. Linebackers Dwight Houston and Tony Wade, quarterback Rick Christopel, center Bob Sizemore, wide receiver Ron Bailey, offensive guard Landon Pickett and middle guard Jimmy Reynolds were listed as All-OVC honorable mention.



AN OHIO VALLEY CONFERENCE co-championship and a second straight trip to the NCAA Midwest Regional tournament were the results of a 17-10 win record by the 1973-74 Austin Peay State Governors.

The Govs were ranked as high as tenth in the nation in preseason polls. However, two-time All-OVC performer and team leader Howard Jackson fell 83-feet from a roof during a summer construction job and broke both legs, eliminating him from action for the season. The Govs were forced to regroup.



The Govs lost only one of its first six games. That was a 94-92 loss to eighth-ranked Providence on the road.


However, the Govs lost two games by a total of six points in the Senior Bowl Classic in Mobile, Ala., and then received a 93-70 shelling from Jacksonville.




Austin Peay stopped Morehead State 80-70 in the OVC opener for both teams. However, Eastern Kentucky capitalized on Gov errors and upset the scarlet and white 71-64.












However, Austin Peay took a close call win over Western Kentucky 98-97 before flying off to New York to play Long Island in Madison Square Garden. It was homecoming for Fly Williams, Danny Odums and Fred Lee in New York, but the Govs lost to LIU 90-88 in overtime.






Five straight conference wins put the Governors in the driver's seat of the OVC race with only three games remaining. Included in the five straight wins was a double victory in Death Valley against Morehead and Eastern Kentucky, a first for the Govs.

However, the Govs lost two of their last three. The win was an electrifying 91-66 cremation of Middle Tennessee. The losses were to Western 84-82 and Murray 74-71. The Govs ended by being tied for the OVC title with Morehead, but APSU represented the league in the NCAA's via the two regular season wins over the Eagles.











THE GOVERNORS dominated Ohio Valley Conference honors. Noel Phillips, who had a 20-3 season singles record, was named the OVC Player of the Year after winning the OVC single's title. Jorge Jimenez joined Phillips on the All-OVC team via his OVC No. 4 singles championship and 19-4 over-all season record.

Bernie Marrero, the third APSU head coach in three years, was voted by his fellow league coaches as the OVC Coach of the Year.

The doubles team of Phillips and Jimenez also captured the OVC No. 1 doubles title. Other Gov standouts and their records were Manual Losada (15-7), Erasmo "Poncho" Sanhueza (12-8) and Lawrence Weiss (9-9).

ELEVEN SCHOOL RECORDS out of 17 events headlined the achievements of the 1973 Austin Peay State outdoor track team. The Governors of first year head coach Ken Gunter, had a 4-0 dual meet mark for the spring.

Austin Peay competed in two other meets. The Govs placed a close third in the Tennessee Intercollegiate behind Middle Tennessee and Memphis State. In the Ohio Valley Conference championships, APSU finished sixth, tying the previous high by a Gov squad.

Probably the biggest story of the year centered around freshman Anthony Carter. Carter became the first APSU track athlete ever to compete in an NCAA championship meet. He leaped 25-8 1/2 in indoor competition which sent him to Detroit where he placed fifth in the nation. Carter also qualified for the NCAA outdoor championships in Baton Rouge where he placed seventh. All-in-all, Carter shattered three indoor marks (60-yard dash, long jump, triple jump) and four outdoor marks (100-yard and 220-yard dashes, long jump, triple jump). He was also a member of one indoor and two outdoor relay teams that cracked school records.





INJURIES PLAGUED the Austin Peay State 1973 cross-country team throughout its season. The Governors competed in two dual meets, winning both, placed second in a triangular meet, finished second in the Tennessee Intercollegiate, sixth in the Ohio Valley Conference meet and because of injuries, failed to field a team for two invitationals.

The Govs' best showing of the year came in the Tennessee Intercollegiate where Coach Ken Gunter's harriers were beaten only by the University of Tennessee.

In the Ohio Valley Conference meet at Morehead, injuries beset the Govs again and APSU finished sixth for the second straight year.

The APSU women's golf team finished second in the state last year even though they didn't play any matches before going to the tournament.


