MR. V. C. MOFFITT

Few, if any, of today's students at Austin Peay State College have had the privilege of being in this man's classroom. This year's seniors just missed the opportunity, for Mr. Moffitt retired, after eighty-eight quarters of teaching at Austin Peay, at the end of the summer quarter of 1951. But the spirit of Mr. Moffitt's philosophy lives on in the halls of the College through the memory of those who were his students and fellow instructors and through the large photograph which hangs today in the education department. To his former students, his name is synonymous with courses in psychology, and none will ever forget "Moffitt's psychology."

Mr. Venus C. Moffitt was a member of the original faculty when the College opened in 1929, the second person to arrive on the campus when operation began. During the depression years, he was the only staff member of the education department and taught all psychology and education courses. It was at this time that the methods courses were shifted from the education department to the various departments concerned, and this arrangement has continued to this day.

When Mr. Moffitt retired from the teaching profession in 1951, he settled down on his farm in the Sango community where he enjoys "gentleman" farming.

Because of his contribution to the nourishment of our college in its growing years, and because of the gems of his thinking that he left with us, we, the staff of the 1955 FAREWELL AND HAIL, are proud to dedicate this book to Mr. Venus Clyde Moffitt.

HALBERT HARVILL

Mr. Halbert Harvill has served Austin Peay State College as president for nine years. But he has served the College in some capacity ever since its beginning. Mr. Harvill came to Austin Peay in 1929 as instructor of history; in his early days here, he also acted as athletic coach. He became Dean-Registrar in 1930 and acted in this position until he entered the armed forces in 1942. He came back to the College in 1946 as president, the post he has held ever since.

Besides these positions with the College, President Harvill was Commissioner of Education for the State of Tennessee from 1938 to 1939.

Under his guidance, Austin Peay State College has had expansion after expansion, and he has certainly led us toward fulfilling our motto, "Grow With Austin Peay." This expansion can be witnessed not only in the number of modern buildings—the Science-Classroom Building, the Administration-Library Building, the Men's Dormitory, and the Memorial Gymnasium—but also in the amazing increase in enrollment and in the size and capabilities of the faculty. It was during Mr. Harvill's administration, too, that the College was authorized to offer a curriculum leading to the Bachelor of Arts degree and later to establish a fifth year leading to the Master of Arts degree in Education.

This year, the College has started its second-quarter century, still a young college, but at its greatest height and continues to grow under President Harvill's able leadership. A swimming pool, shop, additions to the Demonstration School, and other innumerable facilities have been added this year.

President Harvill is a leader not only in education, but in civic and church circles as well.

We attend a better Austin Peay State College because of Mr. Harvill's consecrated efforts. The students and faculty of Austin Peay State College through the years feel privileged to have had such an outstanding administrator—and to have known such an outstanding person.



"To promote a closer bond among students of Education, to enter into more intimate fellowship with those dedicated to the cause of teaching as a profession, to encourage high professional, intellectual, and personal standards, and to recognize outstanding contributions to education"—such are the stated aims of Kappa Delta Pi, a nation-wide Honor Society.

Because the students of Austin Peay State College also are dedicated to these ideals, we secured a chapter, which was installed under the name of Eta Rho on May 23, 1953. Since that date it has initiated seventy-four members, including outstanding undergraduates, graduate students, four faculty members, and our President and Dean of Instruction.

One proof of the vitality of any organization is its receptivity to new ideas. Innovation introduced in 1954-55 include the presentation of a "shingle" to each new member; a re-working of the initiation ceremony tailored to most appropriate local use; an open-house meeting honoring sophomore students who might be eligible for election next year (no one below junior collegiate standing can become a member); and a scholarship to college for some worthy high school student who shows promise of developing into an admirable teacher.

The highlight of the club year was the Valentine Dance when their candidates, Frances Miller and James Curl, were crowned King and Queen of Hearts.





The Home Economics Club is open to girls who plan to major or minor in home economics and any other interested persons.



Rounding out the coaching staff is Kenneth Cooper who comes to the "Big Red" by way of Vanderbilt and the Baltimore Colts. Coach Cooper was an All-Southeastern Conference guard while at Vanderbilt.

The trainer of the Governor football team is Ed Kulakowski, a former Governor grid star.

SEASON'S RECORD

Led by co-captains Bobby Brown and Bobby Way, Austin Peay's football team had a record of three wins, five defeats, and two ties.


First on the Austin Peay agenda was East Tennessee State, who took a 28 to 7 win from the "Governors." The next week the "Red and White" journeyed down to Arkansas where they picked up a 19 to 13 win over Henderson State College.

Florence State of Alabama invaded the Austin Peay cam-

pus and managed to eke out a 13 to 7 victory. Underdogs against the "Blue Raiders" of Middle Tennessee, Austin Peay managed to gain a 7 to 7 tie in what was considered to be one of the better games of the season.

Austin Peay proved too much for Uncle Sam as they trounced Memphis Navy 14 to 7. The Aaron men were not quite so successful against the "Gamecocks" of Jacksonville State as last year; but they did manage to get a 14 to 14 tie. This was the Homecoming game, and although not a complete success because of the tie, it was good not to lose this game in particular.

The "spooks" of Halloween and the hills of East Tennessee proved too much for Austin Peay as it lost to Carson-Newman on October 30, by a score of 13 to 6.

The last two games on the Austin Peay slate were quite a disappointment to both players and coaches. Austin Peay succumbed to two powerful Ohio Valley Conference teams, Tennessee Polytechnic Institute 27 to 13, and Murray State of Kentucky 44 to 7.

However, the Austin Peay season did not end on a sad note. In the past the city of Clarksville has held a mid-state championship game for high school teams. This year it was decided that the Austin Peay "Governors" and the Fort Campbell "Angels" should tangle in this game. Austin Peay did itself proud, played its best game of the season, and won by a score of 13 to 12.

Austin Peay was able to outrush, but not outpass nor outscore their opponents. Austin Peay averaged 144.6 yards rushing and 53.8 yards passing for a total of 198.4. Their opponents averaged 136.4 yards rushing and 89.5 yards passing for a total of 225.9. The "Red and White" scored 107 points while their opponents were scoring 178.

The rushing leader for AP was Bill Alexander, a Georgia boy. Bill carried 96 times for 365 yards, an average of 3.8 yards a carry. Bill was also high scorer with three touchdowns and two extra points for 20 points.

The leading passer was John Martin, who attempted 65, completed 26, had 11 intercepted, and gained 379 yards. His completion percentage was 40 per cent. The leading pass receivers were James Williams and Don Woods, who caught 7 each. James gained 154 yards on his seven catches, while Don gained 143.

The leading punter was Lloyd Hill, who averaged 37.14 yards on 7 boots, and Jack Midwood, who averaged 35.3 yards on 10 kicks.

The "Governors" had no outstanding man on their squad this year as all men played on about the same equal.

Most of the men should return next year as Kim Smith and Ron Clary were the only graduates.



AP scored 1,554 points for an average of 64.3 per game. Their opponents scored 1,733 for an average of 72.2 per game.


The leading scorer, Dickie Elliott, also had the best per game average. He scored 280 points for an average of 16.47.

Three "Governors," Holmes, Chance, and Moore, participated in all games.



Although not winning too many games, the team showed great courage, try, and sportsmanship.




Austin Peay had several first places in the meet. These were Don Woods, shot put; Richard Weakley, mile and two miles; and Eddie Evans, 880.


Weakley was tied for second high scorer in the meet and Evans was tied for third.
