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## FOREWORD

Tennessee's newest university is our own Austin Peay State University, a state-supported, multipurpose institution located in Clarksville, the state's sixth-largest city with a population of 35,657.

Named for former Gov. Austin Peay, a Clarksville resident, APSU was elevated to university status on Sept. 1, 1967, by the Tennessee State Board of Education. Established in 1927 as Austin Peay Normal School, the institution became Austin Peay State College in 1943. APSU is situated on an urban campus that for over 150 years has been used for educational purposes.

Enrollment has increased steadily in the past few years and 2,917 students (1,815 men and 1,102 women) registered during the 1967 fall quarter. Students come from 26 states of the union, several foreign countries and 58 of the 95 counties in Tennessee.

An 11.3 per cent increase in full-time students highlighted the fall quarter enrollment figures. Growth and expansion are key words on the APSU campus as 30 full-time academic and administrative personnel members were added this year. Degrees which may be pursued now total six with the addition of the M.A. and M.S.

An urban renewal project, acquisition of property and the opening of several new buildings has enlarged the campus and improved physical facilities.


# UNIVERSITY




# UNCERTAINTY




## UNITY




## UNFORGETTABLE

## USEFULNESS






## UTOPIA










## Follies, Josh White spark fall entertainment













# ADMINISTRATION



Three different groups of people primarily comprise the university community; each group serves an important function. The groups are the students, the faculty and the administrative officers and staff. The students' role is that of learning; the faculty serves to impart knowledge. The administrative officers and staff members seek to supervise and coordinate these activities of the other two groups in order to create an efficient institution of higher learning. Capable officers assume the task of drafting administrative policies, setting goals, strengthening standards and finalizing decisions, which are sometimes difficult. The administration of a growing university is a significant enterprise—one whose challenge the dedicated executives of the administrative staff continue to meet.


Austin Peay State's growth in its first year as a university is being greatly aided by the Hon. Buford Ellington, Governor of Tennessee, and the State Board of Education. Gov. Ellington is an ex-officio member of the board, which is the governing body of APSU. The board serves over five other state universities, the state's junior colleges and is the policy-making and regulatory board for the public school system of Tennessee. The state administration's interest in local educational facilities and the sponsorship of progressive academic programs is evidenced by APSU's appropriated 1967-68 operating budget of \$2.3 million and capital outlay of \$1.7 million for the 1967-69 biennium. The 1968-69 operating appropriation will total \$2.5 million.

## Improvements have flourished under Morgan

Chief administrator of APSU is President Joe Morgan, who received his doctorate degree in June, 1967.

Dr. Morgan is the dominant figure in the growth of the university. Since his arrival on campus nearly five and one-half years ago, the former state commissioner of education has guided the erection of six major buildings and eight apartment units at a cost of nearly \$6 million. Acquisition of property and an urban renewal project are long-range developmental programs in which Dr. Morgan has been instrumental.

APSU's first year as a university is also a memorable year for F. G. Woodward, dean of faculty. Woodward, who has served the institution since its opening in 1929, is completing his final year as top academic executive. A dynamic individual, this scholar's dedication is primarily responsible for the excellence which exists in departments today. Through the years he has strengthened the faculty with better trained educators.

Named associate dean of faculty this academic year, Dr. William H. Ellis also serves as head of the expanding division of graduate studies. Two degrees, the M.A. and M.S., were added this year due largely to Ellis' efforts.

## Modern methods accompany growth

Three administrators who are guiding the university's growth through modernized improvements are Richmond C. Shasteen, M. P. Bowman and Dr. Harold S. Pryor. Increased use of computerization has assisted the Office of Admissions, under Dean Bowman, to make registration more convenient and efficient.

The Business Office, headed by Shasteen, is also using the newly acquired computer equipment to process all records, thus facilitating the expanding financial business of the university.

Under the supervision of Dr. Pryor, the department of education is utilizing modern equipment and service facilities in the recently opened Claxton Building to support the teacher education program.



## Board furthers application of good collegiate journalism




Living by its purpose, the Board of Student Publications is "to exercise supervision over student publications and to help maintain the best standards of collegiate journalism in student publications."

As academics is the core of any institution of higher learning, so it is here at APSU. Knowledge can be pursued in many fields (21 departmental majors are offered, plus study in nine pre-professional areas), and the combined experience and wisdom of the professors in assisting the student to think for himself is a factor in preparing the student to deal capably with his environment. A highly trained full-time teaching faculty of 130 of which 31 per cent hold the doctorate strive toward this goal. APSU requires liberal arts courses in order to produce graduates who will be well-informed and well-rounded to meet tomorrow's challenges.

# Expanding graduate division offers diverse programs



An expanding division of graduate studies at APSU offers two kinds of programs at the master's level. The 112 students enrolled in graduate classes during the fall quarter had the opportunity to pursue programs leading to a professional degree in a teaching or in an area of school service personnel (M.A. in Education) or programs leading to a liberal arts degree (M.A. and M.S.).

The M.A. and M.S. are designed to provide a program appropriate to those persons who plan to continue at the doctoral level or enter college-level teaching. Twelve majors within the field of professional and teaching education are offered.

As a regional state university, APSU provides instruction, undertakes research and engages in public services. However the primary task of the university is that of providing instruction through means of an educational program that includes not only liberal arts and sciences but also curricula in applied arts and sciences. Three degrees are offered on the undergraduate level: bachelor of science, bachelor of arts and bachelor of science in education.

The educational program of the university is fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. In addition, programs are accredited by the National Association of Schools of Music and by the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education.






## Aspiring chemists benefit from additional laboratories






## Advanced degree planned for department of English





Continual activity by its faculty members in local, state, regional and national mathematics affairs makes the department of mathematics one of the most progressive departments on the campus.








Emphasizing research, the department encourages interested students to pursue additional studies in preparation for vocations in public administration, political science, law and international relations.





# ATHLETICS



Athletics have universal appeal at APSU. Nineteen hundred and sixty-seven would have to be considered a rebuilding year for the APSU football annals. Although losing only seven lettermen from the 1966 contingent this year's edition of the Governors was plagued by inexperience.

Although the footballers recorded a saddening 2-8 record after winning 22 contests in the three previous seasons, the Govs did rewrite several records. Since Bill Dupes has taken the helm as head coach the Govs have smashed 99 records and tied 10 others.

Six individuals had a hand in the record-setting performances. Senior Carl Williams established a new mark for yards gained by passing in a career with 1548.

Other records included: Most career pass interceptions—10 by Howell Flatt; passes caught (season)—56 by Harold Roberts; reception yardage (season)—666 by Roberts; TD passes caught (season)—11 by Roberts; individual tackles (season)—112 by Philip Farinella.


Single game records include: TD passes caught—four by Roberts; most punts—10 by Jimmy Hardie; most TDs—four by Roberts; most points scored—24 by Roberts; rushing and passing plays—46 by Dennis Dyer.

Team single season marks were set for pass completions (85), kickoffs returned (50), penalties against (64), yards penalized (671) and fumbles (35).

Eight plays later EKU had a 17-0 lead and were winging their way to victory and the OVC championship.






Traveling to Morehead State, APSU capitalized on an early break to win 10-8.






"We eliminated those terrible mistakes that have cost us ball games all year." Thus Bill Dupes explained the Govs' smashing win over Murray State's Racers.



It appeared that APSU might come back until a bad break on a punt return gave the Bucs the ball and eventually the game.






Jimmy Alexander kicks off to start the Govs' contest against UT Martin.








## Cagers capture 3 after initial loss

APSU opened the 1967-68 basketball season on a losing note, falling to Murray 77-68 in the opening round of the OVC tournament. Howard Wright established himself as a man with a future as he drove and hit long jump shots for 18 points.


In their next outing the Govs gained composure by swamping Bethel by nine markers. Charlie Moore (21) and Holly Heaberlin (15) led APSU as 11 men scored. 

A three-game swing into Texas highlighted play for APSU during the Christmas break. Carrying a 3-1 record into the encounter with nationally ranked Trinity University, the Govs fell behind by 21 at halftime and fared no better the second half. Cold shooting hurt the Governors as the cagers could manage only 35.0 per cent from the field and 53.3 from the foul line. Trinity countered with a hot 51.3 field percentage. Howard Wright led APSU with 16 and Barry Rollins added 12. Wright, Rollins and Charlie Moore led APSU to their only Texas win by tallying 20, 24 and 19 points respectively against Lamar Tech. Hot shooting (56.1 per cent) also proved instrumental in the 95-81 victory. A terrifying cold streak was too much for the Govs to overcome in spite of a valiant comeback against Pan American. APSU overcame deficits of 25 points to close the final margin to eight points. Pan American, also nationally ranked, outshot the Govs from the field by sinking 45.3 per cent of their field attempts. Returning home, APSU opened the 1968 portion of the season losing to Eastern Kentucky 88-83. Wright, who had tallied 23 points against Pan American, bucketed 30 against EKU.




Charlie Moore grabs a rebound and starts his drive toward the bucket around Bellarmine's Mike Clark (12).





APSU had its longest win streak of the second half of the season during the middle weeks of January. Losses to Morehead State and East Tennessee ended a four-game loss skein.




Murray State invaded the Red Barn and upset APSU's two-game winning streak by capturing a nine-point win 91-82. APSU could hit only 37.8 per cent from the field while the Racers were tallying a hot 48.6 percentage.

Murray had five men in double figures;

Charlie Moore's 16 markers paced the Govs. The cold wave continued against Transylvania; APSU hit only one out of every three field shots. Still the scarlet and white, primarily on the strength of Joe Waller's record-tying 27 rebounds and team-leading 23 points, caught Transy in the late stages and won the contest in overtime.

The Govs next played host to Middle Tennessee and lost by five points. MTSU received credit for a basket which was not scored, a technical foul shot on the ensuing dispute, and two points for the prettiest illegal dunk shot of the year.

The team shot only 31 per cent against the Blue Raiders, and Howard Wright was held to two points. Against Western Kentucky a cold spell midway through the first half spelled doom for the Govs. Waller was the leading scorer with 16, while Barry Rollins and Bob Burnett each added 10.





## Govs handed 4 losses on road


Wright also pulled in 16 errant shots. The Govs then traveled into "death valley" in eastern

For the second straight year coach Leon Sandifer, dean of APSU coaches in his 16th year, saw the weather play havoc with his team's schedule.

The Govs could never really get rolling and suffered an eight-game losing skein during midseason. Lack of offensive power hurt considerably as APSU could muster only 60 runs


to the opposition's 125.

Furthermore, the APSU swatmark stood at a paltry .216, as compared to 18 opponents average of .279. Although placing fourth in the OVC's Western Division with a 3-9 slate, APSU still won enough to place Sandifer's 16-year record at 120-120. In spite of compiling only a .200 mark at the plate, third-sacker John Bratcher carried a big bat as he plated nine mates with five extra-base hits.

Mike Schrecker (.213) and Eddie Harrison (.194).


Among the mound corps, Joey Watts had the best record with three wins and four losses. The tall portrider recorded more than one strikeout per inning for the season.

Under the tutelage of youthful coach Sherwin Clift, the 1967 edition of the APSU linksmen recorded the best seasonal mark since 1950 with an 11-3-2 slate. Although experiencing difficulties in the OVC tournament for the fifth time in six years, the golfers recovered to capture eighth place among the NCAA College Division teams at Paducah, Ky.

Junior Jimmy Smith, a smooth swinger from Nashville, paced the squad as he captured 18th in the nation in the NCAA. The lithe MVP also placed fourth in the Tennessee Intercollegiate, a tournament he won as a sophomore in 1966.

Smith, who starred at Isaac Litton High, set the pace for APSU with an average of 75 strokes per round for the season. In match play he garnered 33 of a possible 48 points as he compiled an 11-5 record.

Fred Pitts and Danny Daniel, with 10-3-3 and 10-2-3 records respectively, also were outstanding for APSU.

The two sophomores tied for 12th in the TIC and finished right behind Smith in season scoring averages. Pitts averaged 76.3 strokes per round and Daniel 76.5.

Tim Tague (10-4-1) collected 30 of a possible 45 points.

Al Bannister, while shaping an 8-4 record, was the best finisher in the Governors' poor showing in the Murray Invitational.


Freshman Randy Feather, after a brilliant start, won eight of 15 matches and gained 26½ of 45 possible points. Feather also placed fifth among APSU golfers

with an average of 77.6 strokes per outing.


Clift's teams have now won 59, lost 30 and tied four since the 1961 season, plus defeating 69 different schools in matches and tournaments.



Head coach Sherwin Clift, Fred Pitts and Jimmy Smith discuss progress of match after nine holes.









Scoring 88½ points, freshman and MVP Alvin Hicks paced the 1967 cindermen to a record of four wins in seven outings, marking only the second time APSU has posted a winning record in track.

Jeff Fisher, who garnered 88 points in field events, and Terry Schultz, who scored 78 while competing in five events, aided Hicks in leading the Governors. Hicks established a new school mark in the pole vault with a vault of 14-3. Fisher set new standards in the discus (139-2½) and shot put (51-9¾).

Other Gov record setters included Ronnie Bell in the 440-yard dash (49.1), Schultz in the 440-intermediate hurdles (58.0) and

Ron Morton in the three-mile run (15:07.3). In the broad jump Dickie Sapp set a new standard (22-9) as did Billy Wendell in the triple jump (44-2).

Coached by Max Mayes, the thinclads won three meets in a row early in the season before losing three consecutively. The Govs finished the season on a winning note

by defeating Fort Campbell 82-71.

## Upperclassmen slip by underclassmen; basketball crowns




















# CLASSES

A year of continuous attempts for perfection is now over, and we can recall the hours and days of work as only a memory. Capturing significant emotions and experiences has presented itself to be one of the greatest challenges that we have thus encountered, and the success of this trial lies in the readers' opinion of these 304 pages.

The vitality with which we began our task gradually dwindled as deadlines approached and grades dropped. Yet we steadily sensed the immense responsibility of reflecting the composite of Austin Peay State University.

This, the 23rd volume of the FAREWELL & HAIL, was printed in Nashville, Tenn., by Benson Printing Co., Inc. The cover of combined embossed and silver foil design on fabrikoid was produced by Durand Manufacturing Co., Chicago, Ill. The book was produced by the offset process. Copy type faces used on the 100-pound Warren's lustro offset enamel include 24 pt. Bodoni Bold for narrative heads, 10 pt. Baskerville for body, 8 pt. Baskerville for captions and identifications and 24 pt. Bodoni Bold capitals on division pages. Eleven color process reproductions appear; the extra color used for spot color and duotones is process blue. Efforts of innumerable people are evident in this, the largest yearbook in APSU history. At Benson Printing Co., W. A. Benson, Jr. assisted in helping us assimilate the latest yearbook trends.
