

Foreword

Situated on an urban campus that for over 150 years has been used for educational purposes, Austin Peay State University is a state-supported, multipurpose institution located in Clarksville, the state's sixth-largest city with a population of 35,657.

Named for one of Tennessee's great governors, the university is divided into five distinct divisions. These include the college of arts and sciences, college of education, school of business and economics, division of applied arts and sciences and the graduate school. Six degrees, three on the undergraduate and three on the graduate level, are granted. In addition, the university offers pre-professional curricula in nine areas.

A record 3,305 students (2,058 men and 1,247 women) come from 31 states, nine foreign countries and 58 of the 95 counties in Tennessee.

Twenty-five new faculty members and administrative appointments brought the full-time teaching faculty to 136, of which 31 per cent hold the earned doctorate, and the professional staff to 19.



... to provide society with professionally




Orientation week helps freshmen adapt to campus routine








Campus atmosphere proves conducive to student fellowship






Presenting of queen, court highlights homecoming '68


Enthusiastic student body backs the Gov footballers




Dorm procedures become busy way of life for many




Hectic routines of student life include a variety of activities








Most distinguished seniors represented by Governor, First Lady








Formal sorority dance, Iris Ball highlight spring quarter

433 granted diplomas at 39th annual graduation ceremony



ACADEMICS



Emphasis on excellence has been recognized nationally and regionally as APSU has set increasingly higher standards for itself over the years. Fully accredited, the university is organized into two colleges, two schools and one division.

Six degrees, three undergraduate and three graduate, enable the student to select the particular program which best meets his requirements for the future. Instruction is offered in 31 areas on the undergraduate level, plus nine pre-professional curricula offerings. At the graduate level, knowledge can be pursued in 10 departments.

A highly trained full-time faculty of 136, of which 53 per cent either hold the earned doctorate or have completed all course requirements, attempts to use their experience and wisdom in assisting the student to think for himself to deal capably with his environment.

Fast becoming a geographical crossroads through her intricate system of faculty and student recruitment, APSU strives to provide a quality education.

As the commitment to improvement becomes more and more pressing, a searching self appraisal is constantly being conducted. The pursuit of excellence in learning means a curricula which leads to intellectual maturity and development of ideas, insights and values which form a permanent personal capacity for thought and action.







Campus art exhibits result in increased number of majors

Growing English staff works constantly to better program








Bimonthly discussion groups held by philosophy professor




Unique physics program financed through NSF grant






Political science department now boasts total of 21 courses



'Seminar on Taxation' brings informative tax men for talks









Psychology students donate time to aid retarded children






Courses added to meet needs of industrial arts department

Newest program on campus to admit first students in fall



Twenty persons were pinned of the 48 who were eligible by virtue of being saluted at Academic Honors Day.






ATHLETICS


In a world which moves at an ever-increasing pace, athletics is taking a more important position as it offers recreation and enjoyment both to spectator and participant.

Recognizing the importance of intercollegiate competition, the university fields varsity teams in seven sports: football, cross-country, basketball, baseball, golf, tennis and track. Freshman slates are played in football and basketball. The Governors compete for championships as members of the Ohio Valley Conference and the National Collegiate Athletic Association. Having climbed to the levels of a contender in nearly every sport in the OVC, the Govs have major-college or university division status in every sport except football.

Varsity competition is only a part of the physical education program, however, as students not gifted enough or interested in intercollegiate athletics find ample recreational opportunities afforded them through the intramural program. Individual and team sports are available including badminton, table tennis, volleyball, basketball, football and swimming.

Also, through the six physical education activity courses required of each student the university is able to effect a proper balance between the academic and athletic perspectives of higher education in offering a complete educational experience for the student.

Governors rewrite record book on way to 5-5 football slate



Records fell by the wayside as the 1968 edition of APSU's football Governors broke or tied 32 standards. En route to a 5-5 record the youthful scarlet and white sustained defeats at the hands of three of the top 10 college division teams in America during the first three weeks of the season.

With a never-say-die attitude, the young charges came back to become the hottest team in the Ohio Valley Conference before injuries halted a four-game win skein. After two losses, APSU won the season finale, and under the direction of Bill Dupes, the Govs reversed the losing fortunes of the previous year and returned respectability to the gridiron program.


The squad set records for pass attempts (272), pass completions (126), yards gained by passing (1,785), most punts (76), first downs by passing (73), first downs (165), fumbles (35) and average yards gained per game by passing (178.5).

Dennis Dyer led the assault on individual records from his all-important quarterback slot as he cracked 14 marks. Four of the season marks he set or equalled were most passes attempted (204),

Continuing his record-breaking habits, Harold (Red) Roberts caught 63 aerials for 990 yards, eclipsing his own marks set a year earlier. Roberts has caught 119 passes for 1,656 yards and 19 touchdowns in his two varsity seasons.

Chattanooga Moccasins roll past young Governors 41-13

Nationally ranked Chattanooga jumped to an early lead the first time that they touched the ball, and proceeded to better the Governors 41-13. Moccasin quarterback Roger Catarino scored Chattanooga's first touchdown on a 14-yard jaunt; he finished the evening with two TD passes.

The contest was actually closer than the score indicated as APSU stayed close in the statistical departments. The passing of Rodney Collins and the receiving of stellar end Harold (Red) Roberts proved to be highlights for the Govs.

Collins connected on 15 of 31 attempts for 222 yards and two touchdowns, and a temporary ranking as the top passer in the conference. Roberts, picking up where he left off as a freshman, latched on to 12 aerials for 155 yards and one tally, setting a new single-game record for yardage on pass receptions.

Facing their second nationally ranked opponent in as many weeks proved disastrous for APSU's young footballers as Western Kentucky ran roughshod over the Govs 42-0.






Dennis Dyer was thrown for an early safety to give Morehead a 2-0 lead, but the Govs came back to march 58 yards and take a 7-2 lead.

An alert Gov defense recovered two fumbles, intercepted four passes and held the Raiders to only 41 yards rushing. Howell Flatt, all-conference safety, blocked three punts.



Meanwhile, the APSU offensive machine rolled up 20 first downs and 404 yards total offense.

Signal-caller Dennis Dyer found Red Roberts in the end zone twice, and he connected with Ronnie Fuqua for 42 yards for another score. Martin Ogles capped the scoring with a 31-yard interception return.

Record-breaking Roberts pulls Govs past FC 47-20

Producing over 40 points for the second week in a row, APSU rode the record-shattering pass receiving performance of Red Roberts to roll past Findlay College 47-20.

Roberts, all-league split end, caught 11 tosses for 222 yards and three touchdowns. He was helped in the offensive bombardment by Dennis Dyer, who threw for four TDs and carried for two himself. Govs bomb Murray Racers 56-35 with aerial fireworks


One of the largest fireworks displays in Ohio Valley Conference annals took place when APSU entertained Murray State and walked away with a 56-35 victory.





Later in the contest Ronnie Simpson had to leave because of a shoulder injury. Before being injured, Simpson garnered 75 yards in 18 carries.


TTU's Larry Schreiber kept the Govs at bay as he gained 186 yards in 36 carries, and he cov-





The Vols forged into a 7-6 lead on a one-yard sprint by Allan Cox and the conversion by Robert Hassell.




ond behind Crouch in the total offense department. Tommy Westbrook led the defense with 33 tackles and 14 assists.

Senior Ron Morton paced the team with five firsts, and was constantly challenged by Billy Sundy as the outstanding runner.








Cagers cop 3 straight wins after succumbing to Trinity

Governors fall to Western Kentucky 75-73 in Bowling Green











Govs manage only second OVC win, slap TTU 91-74





Led by guard Tom Santel, the 1968-69 version of the APSU freshman roundballers posted a 7-8 record. The Carl Taylor-coached quintet showed flashes of brilliance even though sporting only a mediocre record.

An astronomical pitching earned run average and the lack of power at the plate combined to produce a 6-14 record for the 1968 baseball team. Pitchers allowed the rate of 6.27 runs per game, and the batters garnered only 26 extra-base blows during the 20-game schedule.

One individual was outstanding, however, as junior college transfer Terry Holder led the team in 10 offensive and two defensive categories. Holder, a third baseman, hit .389 and led or tied for the lead in runs, hits, triples, homers, runs batted in, total bases, hit by pitches, bases on balls, games played, assists and errors.

Plagued by inclement weather, the squad won four of their first six contests. A letdown produced only two more wins, one in Ohio Valley Conference Western Division play against nine defeats.

Southpaw Joey Watts hurled two of the triumphs, while Ronnie Simpson and Jim Marable hit .323 and .316 respectively.


The Govs, while finishing only fifth in the Ohio Valley Conference, took runner-up honors in the 11-team Tennessee Intercollegiate field.

Despite opening the slate with a convincing 6-1 triumph over touring Wabash College, the netters were unable to maintain momentum as they dropped their next four outings.




Jim Lucas was the outstanding player with a 7-7 singles record, and Bill Lefko was close behind with a 6-8 tab.



Hicks, Schultz, Fisher assault records in 1-3 track season

Enjoying loftier finishes in invitational meets, the 1968 track squad posted only a 1-3 record in dual competition. In the Fort Campbell and Brownsville invitationals the thinclads captured

third and fourth place respectively against formidable opposition.

APSU climbed one step out of the cellar in the Ohio Valley Conference meet by finishing ahead of Morehead State. The thinlies finished sixth among seven teams in the Tennessee Intercollegiate University Division meet.

In dual meets, the Gov cindermen managed only a win over weak Union University.

Sophomore Alvin Hicks topped the squad in points scored for the second year. He garnered 79 points while specializing in the pole vault, long jump and high jump, in which he established a new record for the Govs.

Hicks was followed by senior Terry Schultz with 45½ points and Jeff Fisher, who captured 45 points in field events. Schultz set a new school record in the 440-yard intermediate hurdles (56.0), and he tied the record in the 120-yard high hurdles with a time of 15.1 seconds.

The quartet of Schultz, Ronnie Fuqua, Ronnie Bell and Bob Engler cracked the 440-yard relay mark with a 43.6 clocking, while strongman Fisher reestablished the standards for the shot put (53-3½) and discus (140-2) for the second consecutive year.




Colts, Bods, Virus capture intramural championships








Chemists secure experience in technical data preparation






APSU's first social fraternity is pepper-upper for campus



AP Playhouse presentations provide local entertainment








Fruit cake sale is fund-raiser for Collegiate Civitan's goals

Campus constantly growing: new dorm nears completion




