Her primary inspiration comes from her life experiences, as well as animated films and her dreams which she navigates and explores as a lucid dreamer.

Self Reflection

For this series I wanted to be more personal with the audience while sticking to the narrative style that I have been working with for the past few years. I wanted to discuss the nostalgia about entering adulthood and the childlike tendencies that linger. I feel as if I illustrated this well by using the found image to create old fairytale environments. I do however think that I rushed the last two collages and that with a little more patience they could have been equally as strong as the paintings with them. I believe that this is the strongest aspect of this series as a whole though. I think that as a complete series this work was consistent with the characters who held a storybook style. I also believe that my compositions were well done in the way that I pushed the characters into this layered environment like a pop up book. My inclusion of the natural and artificial flora framing was a great tie into the works and I loved seeing the shadows that they created. I believe this allowed for the audience to feel as if they were peering in on the story and I think the viewers enjoyed the intimacy that this created. By including the folk music playing in the background, I think that I brought the world I created into reality. I think the combination of it all set the tone and created the exact atmosphere that I wanted. I believe that linearly the story flowed well as directionally everything moved to the right including the exit tunnel of the woods. I do however wish i did not place the poem at the end of the installation in favor of not wanting to split the works between a pole. My only real regret with this show was not including more works.
