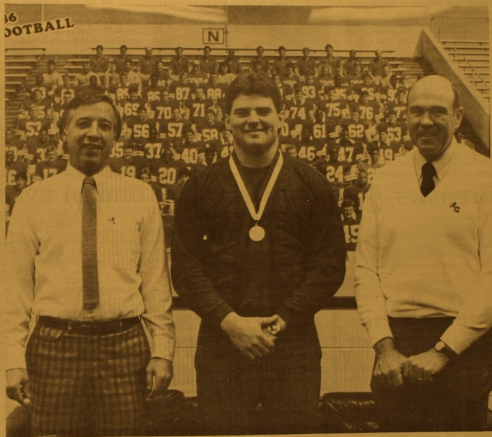

## Poet, playwright Amiri Baraka speaks tonight

Distinguished poet and playwright Amiri Baraka, better known to many as LeRoi Jones, will speak on the civil rights movement Wednesday night at 6:30 in the University Center Ballroom.

Baraka has been an important force in American poetry for more than 30 years, founding in 1958 Totem Press, which first published works by Allen Ginsberg, Frank O'Hara, Jack Kerouac, Gary Snyder, Charles Olson and many others.

He was also a founder and editor of Yugen magazine, a signal publication of New American Writing in the late 1950's and was co-editor of *The Floating Bear*, a literary newsletter.

Baraka grew up in Newark, N. J., attended Howard University, spent two years in the Air Force, and received a master's degree in German literature from Columbia University.

His early poems often describe a personal anguish for his race but seek no political solutions. "I am inside someone—I who hates me, I look/ out from his eyes," he wrote in "An Agony, As Now" (1964). Also in the same year

he said in *I Substitute for the Dead Letter*, "And I am frightened/ that the flame of my sickness/ will burn off my face. And leave/ the bones, my steeved black skull/ an empty cage of failure."

But in a series of influential plays in the mid-1960's, Baraka turned to explore the violent



bases of relationships between blacks and whites. In *Dutchman* and *Slew*, he describes and encounter of a young black and a white woman in a subway; it ends in the murder of the black.

During this era he become more socially and

politically active. He was involved in the Newark riots of 1967. Taking his Muslim name, he helped found in 1968 the Black Community Development and Defense Organization, a black separatist group in Newark.

His book of poems *Black Magic*, published in 1969, marked a real point of departure in his writings. In the poem "Black Art," he writes, "We want a black poem. And a/ Black World/ Let all the world be a Black Poem."

He has edited *Crickle*, a magazine of Afro-American music, and directed publication of new literature through Jihad Press and Peoples War Publications in recent years.

He is currently editor of *The Black Nation*, a journal of African-American thought.

Baraka's visit is being funded by Austin Peay's Visiting Speakers and Artists Committee and sponsored by the Society To Organize Minority Persons.

In addition to his talk Wednesday night, Baraka will meet informally with students that afternoon. Dr. Jim Mock, associate professor of political science, is planning that session.

## Forensics team finishes second in event

Austin Peay's debate and forensics team placed second in Overall Sweepstakes at Marshall University's Chief Justice Tournament in Huntington, W.Va., Nov. 21-22.

Austin Peay defeated three top-10 teams—Ohio State University, fifth, Marshall University, sixth, and Morehead State, ninth—placing

behind the University of North Carolina at Wilmington who placed 12 at Nationals last year.

With the second-place finish, the team added two more slots for Nationals bringing their total to 21, which is more than any APSU team has ever qualified for the national competition.

According to Mike Gotcher, team

coach and APSU instructor of speech, communication and theatre, the tournament represented a tremendous victory because every team member was in finals in at least one event and most were in the finals in two events.

Outstanding student competitors included Celina Harrison who won first place in impromptu speaking, and

LuEllyn Boyer who placed first in prose interpretation and second in dramatic interpretation. Matt Burke won in the dramatic interpretation category while Michael Pendleton placed third in dramatic interpretation.

Other students who placed in competition were Reggie Woodard, Lisa Smith, Donna Borer and Jim Gifford.

## Thieves break Christmas spirit

Burglars entered two Meacham apartments during Christmas break according to campus police chief John Wagoner.

"The first break in was reported Dec. 21," Wagoner said. "A 20" RCA color television valued at \$400 and a Lloyd's video cassette recorder valued at \$250 were stolen from Meacham 210.

Wagoner said the second break-in occurred between Dec. 5 and Jan. 5. "The burglary was reported Jan. 5. A gold necklace valued at \$40 was stolen," he said.

## University begins fund-raising drive

Austin Peay has kicked off a fund-raising campaign for its second Chair of Excellence—the Chair of Excellence in Free Enterprise, a significant commitment by the university to its College of Business.

Dotson Guinn, president of the Northern Bank of Tennessee and a member of the APSU Foundation, is chairman of this campaign. Regarding his involvement as chairman, Guinn said, "I am pleased to lend my support to this effort because I recognize that Austin Peay is a tremendous asset to our business community."

Guinn said that through gifts and pledges some \$277,000 have been raised.

He said that the challenge goal of the campaign is \$450,000 which would be matched dollar-for-dollar with state funds through the Chairs of Excellence program, meaning a total

endowment of \$900,000 for APSU. The victory goal, which is the minimum required to implement the chair, is \$312,000.

Funding for this chair will allow the university to obtain the additional doctoral-level faculty position in the College of Business required for accreditation.

Dr. Rex F. Galloway, dean of APSU's College of Business, said, "This signifies an important decision for the future of our College of Business, which is already highly regarded. As a result of this chair, business graduates will be better prepared to immediately assume roles as capable businessmen and women, entrepreneurs and leaders."

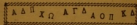

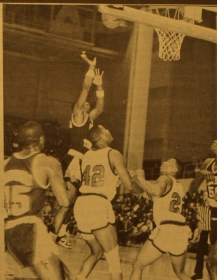

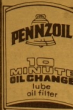

# Coach Austin takes world title

To do something and be good at it is one thing. But to do something and be the best, well that's another story.

Dan Austin, strength coach, was named 1986 World Powerlifting Champion this November in the Netherlands.

Austin also received the title in 1984 but didn't repeat in 1985. "I thought I'd repeat in '85, but I didn't," he said. "By losing the title, I got the incentive to work harder. I really appreciated this victory because I knew I worked for it."

A lot went into Austin's preparation for the event. "I tried to think positively and not let negative thoughts enter my mind. I was in training for eight weeks before the event," he said. "I did say to

myself that if I did at the competition what I was doing here, I would place in the top three."

Austin's toughest competition was Ausby Alexander from Austin's hometown of South Carolina. "I've competed against him for four years, and he's never beaten me. I knew he was going to try and beat me, so I knew I had to work harder," Austin said.

There were 16 guys in Austin's weight class. "I was afraid some guy from nowhere would blossom up and win. I could have lifted more on the deadlift, but I was real conservative because I wanted to make sure I'd win," he said.

Austin lifted 573 lbs. in the squat, 347 lbs. in the bench press and 650 lbs. in the deadlift for a total of 1570 lbs. His closest competitor was Ausby Alexander who lifted 1520 lbs.

Students were asked to work on different committees to organize the event.

Joe Case, WTVF channel 5 co-host of "Talk of the Town," will serve as master of ceremonies. Judges will be Bill Hall, WSMV-TV channel 4 weatherman; Eleanor Bradley, model

As an introduction to each segment of competition, several student groups will provide song and dance routines for entertainment. Barber said he hopes students will be selected by an application process to work on organization committees in upcoming years.

The \$1,000 scholarship to be awarded to the winner of the pageant was provided by the Student Government Association. "They have really supported us in getting the pageant together this year, and we appreciate all their hard work," Barber said.

In addition to the scholarship, Miss APSU will receive a \$500 wardrobe from Snyder's, use of a car from Jenkins-Wynne at the Miss Tennessee Pageant and 50 tanning sessions from Sun Solution. First runner-up will receive a \$600 scholarship and flowers. Second, third, fourth and Miss Congeniality will receive scholarships and flowers.

Tickets for the pageant go on sale this week at the University Center information desk or the Emerald Hills Alumni Office and are \$3 for students and \$5 general admission. Tickets will also be available at the door.

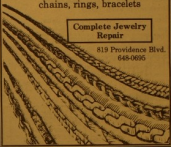

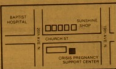
