






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We share this with YOU!

HOTEL MAKES UP FOR OVERPOPULATED CAMPUS LIVING

Students are moving back and new freshman move in. On campus housing is a great option for students because the location is at school and payment is included in tuition at the beginning of the school year. This year however, on-campus housing has become overpopulated.

Due to the increased enrollment this past year, some APSU students were housed in hotel rooms at the Riverview Inn until on-campus rooms became available.

"This year we stopped taking applications for all non-first-time freshmen on Aug. 10," Housing Director Joe Mills said. "That was the first time we have done that in my 20 years at APSU."

"We continued to take freshman applications because of freshman residency requirements," Mills said. The Riverview Inn, located at 50 College St., only a few blocks from campus, housed 120 students affected by the housing overflow in 60 rooms reserved by APSU.

APSU received a discounted rate, but the exact amount of the discount was confidential. Payment for the hotel came out of the students' housing fees.

The students residing there did not go without a few extra perks with the hotel having wireless Internet throughout, a restaurant, an indoor pool, and a coin operated laundry on site.

As rooms became available on campus, students moved from the hotel into dorm rooms as the school year progressed.

There are currently 1,411 beds on campus and a new residence hall is under construction on Castle Heights Road to be completed by Fall 2011, followed by the demolition of the Cross, Killebrew and Rawlins dorms. Those dorms will be replaced with a new 400 bed residence hall to be finished for the Fall 2013 semester.



Hemlock Opening!

A year after breaking ground, Austin Peay State University celebrated the grand opening of the new Hemlock Semiconductor Building Sept. 16, 2010 with a standing-room only crowd.

The Chemistry Department began a new program, Chemical Engineering Technology (CHET), which will earn the successful student an associate of applied science degree and increase his or her chances of earning a position at Clarksville's new Hemlock Semiconductor LLC plant that was set to be constructed by late 2012.

Dr. Robin Reed, chair of the chemistry department, said CHET will be beneficial to students who acquire the degree. With the arrival of Hemlock, APSU was granted more than \$6 million to develop a course that would be tailored to the requirements of the semiconductor plant but also broad enough to be applied to others.

"Our goal here at the chemistry department is to train students as best we can to become employed by Hemlock or any of the other applicable companies," Reed said.

In June 2010, the Tennessee Board of Regents approved President Tim Hall's recommendation to name the facility in honor of Michigan-based Hemlock Semiconductor Group for its \$2 million gift to APSU for the purchase of laboratory equipment for the building. The contribution was one of the largest monetary gifts ever given to APSU.



PostSecret

Comes to Campus

They stepped up to the microphone, many of them with quivering voices and fresh tears. The Clement Auditorium was dark and hushed. One by one, students broadcast their darkest secrets for nearly 500 audience members to hear.

In 2004, Frank Warren gave strangers blank postcards, hoping to receive secrets and confessions in return. He called it the PostSecret project.

"There are probably several moments that became significant to the life of the project. The first one was when I got that first postcard mailed to me. It was understanding that someone would share such a deep, dark secret and send it in to a stranger. Another turning point was when I started receiving enough postcards every week to share new ones on the website on Sundays and being able to create conversations with a larger community," Warren said.

PostSecret sparked a cultural phenomenon that is powered by innermost secrets. Warren said on any given day, he may receive up to 200 postcards a day from all over the globe.

On Monday, Sept. 20, Frank Warren kicked off his PostSecret Live tour at APSU and shared his story as well as the secrets of others, including some of the more taboo secrets that his book publishers did not allow into the books. Not only did the night include quirky and surprising jokes and secrets, but it allowed attendees to perceive themselves and others as they truly are and wish to be. An open-mic session enabled audience members to step forward with their own secrets. They shared hopeful, gut-wrenching, heart-breaking and awe-inspiring secrets.

Warren explained the benefit of sharing one's secrets. "The [secrets] that really resonate with me are the ones that come from young people sharing a secret that no person should have to carry ... a sense of sorrow and a sense of loneliness really resonates with me," Warren




said. "I think it can be very cathartic letting a secret go. ... I think that it empowers people to change their lives for the better. When you're talking about real and true secrets, they're never comfortable. There's something about the deep truth we want to hide that is obscene or obnoxious ... secrets can be uncomfortable; that's why we keep them secret."

The main message of the night was that keeping secrets under wraps only allows the secrets to rule and control the secret-keeper. One thing was apparent at the end of the PostSecret event: No matter the painful secret burden you have, you are not alone.





Peay Read: Freedom Writer's Diary

The small woman with dark brown hair stepped forward to grab the microphone, and the crowd went silent as she pierced the thick air with her miraculous story.

At The Peay Read on Sept. 30, 2010, guest speaker Erin Gruwell vivaciously and charismatically captivated the audience. Many had read about Gruwell, the acclaimed teacher from Long Beach, Calif., who helped students who, as many would say, were never supposed to make it. They were the students who got pushed to the side and forgotten until Gruwell entered her English classroom at Wilson High School.

Gruwell had hopes of becoming a lawyer until the Los Angeles riots broke out. After the riots, she wondered why so many young people lived lives in which hopes and dreams were only figments of their imagination. She realized she could impact those young people, so Gruwell changed her life forever and pursued a degree in teaching.

After earning her degree, she promised herself she would not teach students like herself, who went to nice schools in the suburbs around Los Angeles. She promised herself she would travel to teach at a school that was in dire need of inspiration, as well as new textbooks, computers and most of the technological advancements many take for granted.

This brought her to that fateful classroom in Wilson High School.

On her first day, her father pleaded with her to wear a bulletproof vest — at this the Peay Read crowd shared a laugh with her — but in fact this was no joke. She recalled being out of her element as she passed through metal detectors, was overly dressed, looked different and spoke the wrong tone. She told of the students making jokes at her expense to defer attention away from themselves. It was this classroom, though unbeknownst to her, where she would change lives.

One day, students were vigorously passing around a note. Gruwell snatched the paper and glimpsed a picture characterizing a racial gesture. This was the catalyst that inspired her to take her students on a journey against intolerance.

Gruwell bought books like "The Diary of Anne Frank" and "Zlata's Diary" for her students in order to paint a picture of empowerment that showed her students that they were young, beautiful and full of hope. Many of her students had never read before, let alone written. But as the students began to read the diaries of these courageous young authors who dealt with racial intolerance and violence, Gruwell's students felt liberated from their own troublesome pasts and began writing and keeping diaries of their own.

Soon, they became known as the "Freedom Writers." Gruwell's students had gone from being voices howling in the wing to voices of the future, voices of hope, empowerment and courage.

All of her students, unique in their own ways, were brought together by a hateful, violent culture. From Gruwell's tiny English classroom, lives were changed. Most of Gruwell's students never expected to make it past the age of 25 or even graduate high school, but now they hold respectable positions in society.

Gruwell's story was made into a book called "The Freedom Writers Diary," and in 2007, a movie, "Freedom Writers."













Miss Austin Peay Pageant



The department of Psychology has a variety of facilities to provide learning and research opportunities. Rooms equipped with one-way observation windows, video and other monitoring equipment are available for counseling, testing and human research.

The department has arranged for intern and practicum experiences with a variety of community agencies. Laboratories for vision, infant development, animal learning, and behavioral physiology are available for faculty and student research.

The department has numerous means for data collection, analysis, and the preparation of manuscripts.

Health and Human Performance

A student pursuing a Bachelor of Science degree from the Department of Health and Human Performance can choose one of five concentrations: Applied Exercise Science Concentration; Health Care Management Concentration; Health Concentration; Human Movement Concentration; or K-12 Teaching Concentration.

The full-time HHP faculty hold doctoral degrees in their specializations and offer expertise in many health and human performance areas. The university has a strong focus on teaching and one-on-one advising. Additionally, the concentrations (except K-12 Teaching) include an internship which provides valuable work experience. Many of the concentrations also have opportunities for students to practice their skills in real-life settings such as in the exercise physiology lab or working with special populations in campus-based physical activity programs.

APSU's School of Nursing provides students with a wealth of hands-on teaching tools, including dummies, gurneys and all the other equipment the students will use in the field.

Nursing school partners with MTSU for guided imagery program

Those familiar with the movie "Fight Club" may recall a dramatization featuring a computer-generated penguin of the very real technique known as guided imagery.

APSU partnered with MTSU in Fall 2010 to offer a certification program in guided imagery to nursing students and area registered nurses.

One Saturday each semester, a training session is held for those participating in the partnership program which includes a workshop, lecture and video, demonstration, practice and group work.

The training session for Fall 2010 was held Saturday, Sept. 18, and attendance was expected to be approximately 120 students and 15 registered nurses.

"Guided imagery involves the use of directed visual image suggestions to reduce stress and anxiety, reduce pain, reduce blood pressure and heart rate, and promote relaxation, sleep and overall well-being ... and has been explored in numerous studies," said Leslie

Suggs, assistant professor in the APSU School of Nursing.

"It's like light hypnosis," said Debra Wilson, associate professor in the MTSU School of Nursing.

"The partnership has been in place since Fall 2008. This fall marks the three year anniversary," Suggs said, adding the partnership is planned to continue indefinitely.

The idea for the partnership came from Wilson.

"I already had a relationship with the faculty at APSU," Wilson said, adding, when these faculty members found out that she was setting up this program for her students, "they wanted in on it."

"There's a million uses for [guided imagery]," Wilson said, adding some of the diverse applications include decreasing allergy symptoms and managing migraine headaches. The technique has even been shown to help the bodies of burn victims accept skin grafts.

"This is a wonderful opportunity for each student. Due to the current state of the

economy, many retired and part-time nurses are returning to full-time work, and obtaining a job as a new graduate is currently more challenging for these soon to be new nurses. This training gives students an edge that enables them to be more marketable in many nursing settings," Suggs said.

The partnership was designed specifically for the Psychiatric Mental Health Nursing courses at APSU and MTSU.

Though the courses involved in the partnership vary in their curriculum between the two universities, the topic of guided imagery is incorporated into both. The program is also open to local registered nurses.

"The program is recognized by the Tennessee Nurses Association as continuing education for nurses," Wilson said.

"These students will be certified in guided imagery when they're done."

In order to get the certificate, participants must also practice the technique on two people outside of the training session and are then evaluated in their use of the technique.

College of Business

The annual Fall 2010 semester field trip for College of Business students, many of whom are members of Alpha Kappa Psi, included a tour of the Jack Daniels Distillery. In addition to the tour and an explanation of the process involved in making Tennessee whiskey, the students were also provided an overview of the Jack Daniels marketing program that has resulted in both national and worldwide recognition of the Jack Daniels brand. After the tour, the students were treated to classic Southern hospitality and cooking at Miss Mary BoBo's boarding house, where they learned more of the history of Lynchburg and Jack Daniels. Past trips have explored a locomotive rebuilder, the Nissan plant, a Walmart distribution center and the Corvette museum. The trips were funded through Student Academic Success Initiative grant funds.

Career aspirations: I intend on completing my Doctorate in Military History with a focus on the Eastern Front during World War II.







In 1996, Eve Ensler produced the critically acclaimed play, "The Vagina Monologues," which later became a worldwide movement by inspiring and empowering women. For the past 10 years at APSU, we have been producing our very own Vagina Monologues, creating our own movement.

This year it was held on March 30 and 31. The student show was directed by Samantha Pohlot and Bryanna Licciardi, and the alumni show was directed by Caitlin Purdom. The student show is for undergraduate students from the Vagina Monologues class, taught by Jill Eichorn, associate professor of Women's Studies and English at APSU. The alumni



show is for graduate students who have performed in past productions for the play and also for first-time graduates too.

The message the women on stage expressed is that APSU and the world need to have compassion for each other. Compassion is when you have empathy and sympathy for one another. It is inhuman for us to not feel something when these brave women speak their minds, expressing how they really feel.

More than 360 people attended the show. According to Eichorn, over the 10-year time span, APSU has raised \$12,000 towards scholarship funds and the Clarksville Montgomery County SafeHouse.













Austin Peay State University sent its first class of graduates into the world more than 80 years ago.

This year, 1,010 graduates were awarded degrees, the most in APSU's storied history.



And, even if just lightly, he felt bittersweet about the end to a special time.


"For a while, APSU was my home," he said.








Left photo: Every graduating class has brave men and women that go straight from graduation to the armed forces. In front of all their peers, family and friends they recite the enlistment oath.



Both spoke with the unit in private with no media allowed. "We got to spend time with the assaulters who got bin Laden," Biden said boastfully during the ceremony.

The SEALs were lead by Vice Adm. William McRaven, who is head of the military's counterterrorism unit. Two-dozen SEALs raided the Pakistani compound with the same number circling overhead as backup. "They're America's quiet professionals because success demands secrecy," Obama said.

The members who carried

out the "historic" mission were given the Presidential Unit Citation, the most prestigious honor an entire unit can receive.

Obama and Biden also met with the 160th Special Operations Aviation Regiment — the Night Stalkers — who flew the SEALs on their mission, and Green Berets from the 5th Special Forces Group.

During the meeting, soldiers waiting in the heat of Hangar 3 were full of energy with a quartet from the 101st Airborne Division Band playing, singing Screaming Eagle Song and dancing to various other songs. Of the soldiers pres-

ent, 99 percent of them had served in Afghanistan.

"This has been a historic week in the life of our nation. The terrorist leader who struck our nation on 9/11 will never threaten America again," Obama said with soldiers cheering. "This is the finest military the world has ever known. And that includes all of you, men and women of the 101st."

SPC Michael Chatman from the 1-33 CAV, said, "[The speech was] inspiring. I'm grateful for it because it shows that somebody out here's actually saying they appreciate what we did." Chatman has served two tours in Afghanistan, the

first for six months and the second for 12.

"You guys have been in the fight from the beginning ... You've been in some of the most hostile terrain in the world ... You're amazing," Biden said. "You're the most capable warriors in the history of the world."

Obama said in closing, "There is nothing we can't do together, 101st; when we remember who we are and that is the United States of America. When we remember that no problem is too hard and no challenge is too great. And that is why I am so confident that with your service, America's greatest days are still to come."























Lady Govs celebrate best season in program history

If this were a movie, the Lady Govs soccer team would have won.

The 2010 team was one step away from an automatic bid into the NCAA tournament. No team in the program's history has ever made it that far. The Lady Govs walked into Jayne Stadium Sunday, Nov. 7, 2010 in their black uniforms, played in the OVC Championship final and lost 2-1 to Morehead State. Since the program started in 2002, only two other teams had played in the OVC tournament. This is the only team to make it to the championship game.

It was done after a season with the program's second-worst record (1-13-14), making it the biggest turnaround in program history.

"Of course, getting to this level in the conference is our goal every year," said head coach Kelley Guth.

"The accomplishment to reach the championship game this year after last season and being chosen to finish ninth in the conference is a tribute to our team and our girls."

The 2010 Lady Govs soccer team is the winningest team in the program's history with a 15-6-1 record. From 2007-2009, the

team had won one conference game. This team won four.


After being held scoreless 13 times in 2009, this team was only shut out four times and shutout its opponents 13 times.

They led the conference in shots, goals, points and attendance. Also at the top of the statistics were the Lady Govs' leading scorers, Tatiana Ariza and her sister, Natalia.

Tatiana led the team in goals, including six game-winners, the most in the conference. She also led the conference in points and was second in the conference in goals and shots.




