## Thesis Statement

The Nature of Grief will show the process of what grief is like through a sequence of acrylic paintings and a collection of small graphite drawings that portray the deeper emotions and chaos that occurs within this process.

## Thesis Proposal

For my senior thesis project, I am portraying the deeper layers of grief through portraiture, birds, and nature elements. I am incorporating birds based on behavioral patterns of that certain breed and their historical symbolic meaning. The portraits involve me and my feelings throughout the grieving process. I am portraying these emotions by painting with acrylic paint on larger canvases. I am choosing to use paint since it's a malleable medium and can express the layers and messiness that are attached to grief. I am also creating a series of journal entry sketches on paper that will show the everyday experiences with this process. These incorporate raw materials like graphite and charcoal along with raw emotions of my own, intended to make some viewers uncomfortable and other's comforted.

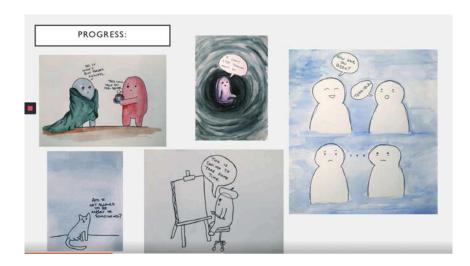
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#### THESIS STATEMENT:

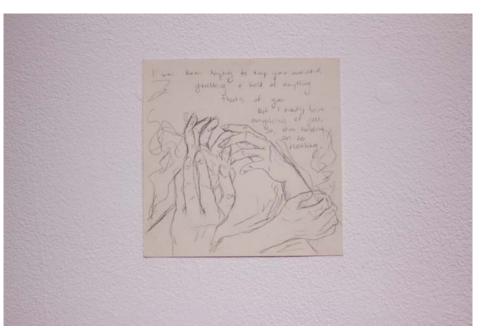












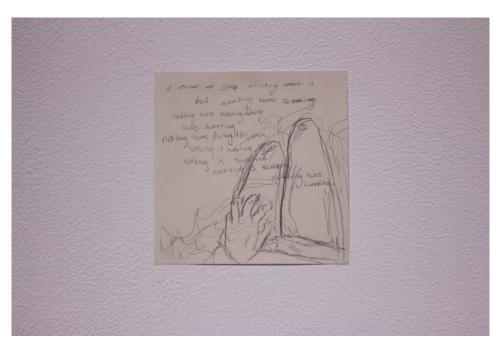






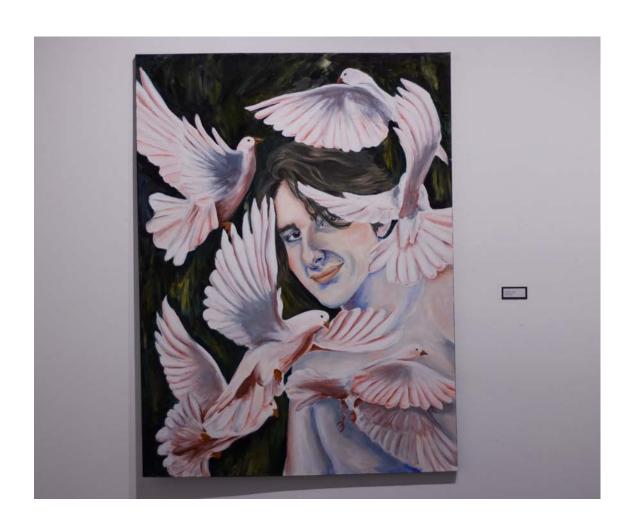






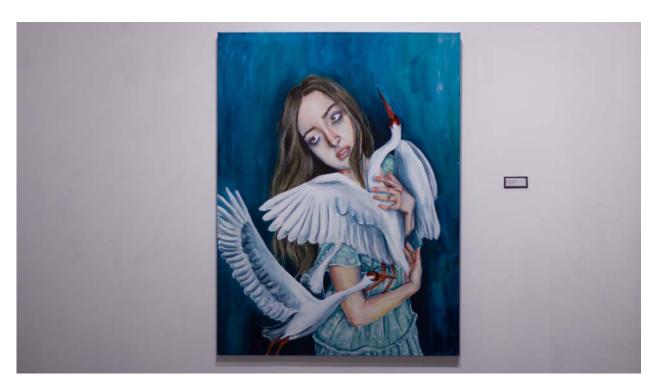












# Self-Gritique

This is just the beginning for me and my work. Looking at this body of work, I genuinely am taken a back at what I have done, in the humblest way of course. When creating each piece, I was my worst critic. My process was honestly quite grueling, just like the grief I was and am experiencing. Within each piece, I struggled with many factors that delayed my process. Last semester was my biggest halt. I fell miles behind where I needed to be, but over the break it was almost like a light went off and I switched directions completely and did what I needed to do. I worked fast and hard with careful attention to detail. I could hardly go a day without painting. It was like ideas kept landing in my lap and I ran with each one. However, even so, when making these I oddly couldn't stand to look at them. I critiqued them so harshly and endured many nights of horrible frustration. I even would keep them turned around when I was finished for the night or when I completed a piece.

Installing my show and seeing each piece interlocking with one another changed my perception on what each piece was like, what they were doing and how they were making me, and many others feel. I grew to love what I have created, and I think I have done something really amazing. *Journal Entries* were the pieces that made me utterly uncomfortable to the point of wanting to peel out of my skin when displaying them and seeing viewers read them, but I knew I needed them up. They played an essential role to my show and I actually grew to love them and feel more comfortable the longer they were displayed.

Overall, my show is something I have created that is really important to me, and my hopes is that it was and is to others as well. I have many more things to learn as I have grasped when making this body of work. As I stated before, this is just the beginning for me and my artwork.
