President's report little but rhetoric

DR. JOE MORGAN, APSU president, presented his annual report on the state of the university at the abunni barquet homecoming night. Instead of the usual address, a pumphlet was handed out to those attending. The booklet is a most attractive one, sixteen pages in bearth and innecessive at first shape. However, after a

The booklet is a most attractive one, sixteen pages in length and impressive at first glance. However, after a closer look, one soon realizes that the report's content does not measure up to its appearance.

This year's report borders on obscurity, smothering is substance in a mass of incomplete statistics and vag rebetoric. Nothing new is really presented in the report in most anyone with ties with APSU or the Alumin Associati would not already know. No insight whatsoever is give comparing Austin Peay to the other state-supportergional universities.

THE SECTION ENTITLED "where we stand" contain only a breakdown of APSU's expenditures and revenues or a percentage basis and a listing of capital projects. No comparisons are given, and likewise, no conclusions of

The next section, "where from here," contains only contains only conception of the University Community Planning Cordinating Committees. No specifics are given, and in their piece is a paragraph of vague inprior about the committee the report. Statements like "development and expansion" in degree peoprams in a variety of occupational fields dominate the academic goals. No planned programs or university requests to be presented to the Board of Regents of the programs of the programs of the results of the Board of Regents.

"OUR REAL NEEDS," according to Dr. Morgan, are probably the most obscurely stated sentences in the presidents report. As one observer remarked, "Morgan's goals, with one exception, (the remedial education need), could easily be those of a church kindergarten class."

Needs such as "a more effective system of twow communications with our publice" and "means for desist and implementing programs of whatever kind to meet tidentifiable and changing needs of the people of cregion" are among those considered real by our preside the 1974 President's Report of Austin Peay St.

Inc. 19/4 Presents report or Austin Peay State University seems much like a Madison avenue-type ad vertising approach in university salesmarship. The university's problems are not mentioned, no new programs in curricula are proposed, and comparative facts are continually ignored.

THIS YEAR'S REPORT is by no means a fair and honest evaluation of the state of the university. Dr. Morgan is not a very slick salesman. The All State would like to see him a little more frank and a little less rhetorical.


