A family man, President and Mrs. Morgan have two sons, Joe Miller and John, and one daughter, Mary Ella.



Associated Student Body governs activities



The Associated Student Body, acting as a body through which the voice of the students can be heard, is a member in good standing of the Southern Universities Student Government Association.

Officers of the ASB consist of the president, the vice-president, the secretary and the treasurer, all of whom are elected in the spring quarter for the ensuing academic year. These elected officials meet with members of the administration to work out problems of student needs.

Replacing the former Student Council during the 1963-64 school year, the ASB ratified a new constitution which divided the student government into three branches: legislative, executive and judicial. Through its legislative branch, the Senate, it embraces a membership drawn from the classes, the dormitory councils, honor societies, departmental clubs and other chartered campus organizations.

The ASB managed to bring big-name entertainment to the campus and improved many phases of student life during the 1964-65 school year.

House Councils uphold high dormitory standards

Governing bodies for the men and women who live in the nine dormitories on campus are the Women's Student Government Council and the Men's Inter-Dorm Council.

WSGC consists of the house councils of Harvill Hall and Blount Hall, the president of Harned Hall and a freshman representative, making a total membership of 11.

Representatives from each of the six men's residence halls compose the membership of the Men's Inter-Dorm Council.

Both councils regulate matters pertaining to conduct in order that the standards and ideals of the college may be maintained.

Working closely with the Associated Student Body, the Dean of Students, the Dean of Women and resident hall supervisors, the two groups help in setting policies and assist in enforcing rules and regulations.

Panhellenic Council, Counselors advise clubs, girls






Academic achievement stressed by Laurel Wreath Society





The 1965 edition of *The Farewell & Hail* represents many laborious hours of work which go into the production of the Austin Peay State College yearbook. Edited by the students, the yearbook is a bound compilation of a year of life at APSC and it attempts to present a permanent pictorial record of the highlights of the school year.

As the deadline draws near on a college yearbook, the editor faces numerous problems. There are all-important photos missing, last-minute copy to be written, individuals failing to meet their obligations and, oh yes, there is an adviser complaining.

Planning for the book is begun in the early spring of the previous year, so it seems to the editor-in-chief that the yearbook is a two-year project.

Following the organization of the staff at the fall quarter's beginning, the staff writes and edits, proofreads and re-writes, crops pictures and anxiously anticipates that final distribution, the day of rest. When a person fails to do his work, the editor quietly (sometimes) finds a typewriter and completes one of the last-second duties.






Registration, freshman talent show, the faculty-student reception, dances, parties, clubs, churches and friends are all a part of student life.

The student has the opportunity to become an integral part of the Austin Peay State College family. He chooses for himself the type citizen he will make in college.





Governor gridders complete brilliant 8-1-1 campaign

Finishing a campaign which would make a chapter in any storybook, the 1964 Austin Peay State Governors concluded its best gridiron season in the 35-year history of the institution with an 8-1-1 mark.

Picked to finish dead last in the eight-team Ohio Valley Conference by a vote of the coaches, APSC missed the OVC championship by a slim two points and a perfect season by three markers. A 6-6 deadlock with Western Kentucky and a fourth quarter 14-13 loss to Morehead State were the only blemishes on the slate.

Bill Dupes, unanimous choice for "Coach of the Year" honors in the OVC, and his five-man staff gave APSC and the city of Clarksville the Govs' first winning season since 1952. The grid fortunes posted a 1-9-0 in 1963 and prior to last fall's sensational record the Govs had won only six games in five years while losing 34.

APSC defeated the eventual OVC champion, Middle Tennessee, 9-7 but finished second to the Blue Raiders in league play. APSC's conference mark was 5-1-1 to the Murfreesboromen's 6-1-0.

The complete reversal brought fans to the turnstiles as APSC drew an estimated 60,800 fans in 10 games. Approximately 31,200 attended five home games and some 29,600 viewed the Govs on the road. The 60,800 compares to 45,500 in 1963 and 40,100 in 1962.

The "rags-to-riches" club collected 230 points against the opposition's 78 and finished seventh and 12th respectively in two national rating services. APSC rolled over Eastern Kentucky (26-0), Murray State (26-10), Carson-Newman (44-7), Middle Tennessee, East Tennessee (27-20), Tennessee Tech (29-0), U-T Martin (35-0) and Fort Campbell (15-14).

In only their second season of OVC competition, the Govs gained respect in the football world with a thunderous start and finish.




Sophomore fullback Ray Hand (34) eludes a tackler in the season-opening 26-0 triumph over Eastern Kentucky.



Individual player honors were profuse as the Gov athletes enjoyed their golden era in sports.

Senior quarterback Carlton Flatt was named "OVC Back of the Year" by a poll of the loop's coaches. The smallest man on the 22-man All-OVC squad, Flatt was picked as a defensive back along with junior Tim Chilcutt. Senior tackle Ed Bunio and graduating center Dave Satterfield rounded out the APSC first-team choices.

Five Gov gridders landed positions on the second-team twinkle squad. Sophomores Ronnie Parson and Calvin Walter were named to the offensive team at end and tackle respectively, while junior ends Tommy Dillard and Claude Clements and sophomore linebacker Bobby Byrd were selected for their defensive work.

Chilcutt earned a second-team berth on the Associated Press Little All-American team. The versatile performer was picked as a defensive back. Flatt received honorable mention for the second straight year.

APSC began the season by smashing Eastern Kentucky, Murray State and Carson-Newman respectively.

Bill Dupes and his assistants, Jim Lane, Jerry Flatt, Gordon Schultz, Ray Thomas and Richard Brown, saw their long hours and hard work pay off when APSC routed Eastern Kentucky by a 26-0 count in the season opener at Municipal Stadium.

Local fullback Ray Hand personally accounted for 97 yards in 13 carries to pace the opening win.

Conference eyebrows began to raise when on the following Saturday the Govs unleashed an awesome offense for 425 yards and 27 first downs to drop Murray State 26-10. The stout defense continued to shine also as the Racers had the pigskin for only 16 offensive plays during the last half.

Eight Govs got into the scoring column as the Red and White completely outclassed Carson-Newman 44-7.



Inches, seconds cost Govs OVC crown, perfect season

Middle Tennessee numbered among five final victims

Following the three straight victories, APSC hit a couple of snags before roaring through the final five games of their schedule.

On a chilly October 10 afternoon 8,000 fans overflowed the Western Stadium in Bowling Green, Ky., to witness a 6-6 defensive draw. The Hilltoppers drew first blood, but the Govs knotted the count in the third stanza. With only 14 seconds showing on the scoreboard clock, Ronnie Parson attempted a 30-yard field goal, but it was wide to the right of its mark.

Leading 13-0 in the Morehead contest, the Govs saw two costly fumbles capitalized into touchdowns by the Eagles in the waning minutes of the final quarter. The 14-13 defeat stung the Govs greatly.

After a week's rest due to an open date, the miracle-workers captured their greatest gridiron victory in APSC history, a come-from-behind 9-7 triumph over rival Middle Tennessee. A 21-yard field goal by Parson with only 57 seconds remaining gave the Govs their first victory over the Blue Raiders in the 19-game series which began in 1936.

Swapping touchdowns all afternoon, the Govs scored last to insure a thrilling 27-20 win over East Tennessee. Sophomore John Ogles ground out 123 yards in 12 totes and Carlton Flatt had 127 on total offense to throttle the Bucs.

To the alumni's delight, Tennessee Tech fell 29-0 to the Govs before 7,200 homecoming fans; APSC slashed U-T Martin 35-0; and another fourth-quarter field goal by Parson helped the Govs finish the season with a 15-14 Thanksgiving Day triumph over Fort Campbell.

Area fans watched with awe as the well-polished offensive machine averaged 314.2 yards per outing, tops in the OVC, and the defense held opponents to an average of 199.5 yards per contest, third-best in the loop.

An assault on the record book shows that the 1964 contingent broke 25 records and tied five more.

Statistical leaders for the squad were John Ogles, 584 yards rushing; Carlton Flatt, 740 yards passing and 1,096 total offense; Ronnie Parson, 17 pass receptions for 334 yards; and Sammy Flatt, 37.5 punting average.

Tim Chilcutt grabbed six enemy aerials, returned 29 punts for 194 yards and nine kickoffs for 204 yards. Linebacker-deluxe Bobby Byrd topped the defense with 71 individual stops and 77 assists and recovered five fumbles. Parson led the scoring parade with 47 points, closely followed by Chilcutt (44), Ogles (36) and C. Flatt (32).


Elected by the student body after first appearing before a screening committee, the cheerleading squad had Mrs. Patricia Hancock as its sponsor.

In contrast to the football team's new-found winning formula, the 1964-65 Austin Peay State basketball team experienced its third-worst season in history in compiling a 4-17 record. It was the Govs' first losing campaign since the 1954-55 season.

Finishing eighth and last in the major college Ohio Valley Conference, the Govs posted a 2-12 league slate after surprising the loop last year with a 7-7 mark in their first year of official competition.

Head coach George Fisher tutored the contingent for the third straight year and suffered his first losing season after his clubs had posted impressive 18-11 and 14-9 won-lost marks. Fisher was assisted by Fred Overton and Tom Phillips.


The lack of a wealth of talent, size and speed, coupled with the graduation of three top-notch starters from the 1963-64 club, proved to be disastrous to the 1964-65 contingent.

A warning of the season's outcome came early when APSC dropped the season opener to Union University of the Volunteer State Athletic Conference. Prior to being admitted to the OVC, the Govs blitzed through VSAC opposition for seven consecutive Western Division championships.

Loser of their initial eight tilts, Fisher relegated himself to a losing season and pressed four sophomores into the starting line-up with a senior.

Despite the 17 losses, the 1964-65 squad went down in history as one of the most interesting to watch from a spectator's standpoint. The Govs' widest loss margin to an OVC team in the usually friendly confines of Memorial Gymnasium was by a mere seven points.

APSC mustered a 4-7 record at home, but drew a blank on the road in 10 engagements.




Andy Toombs (40) and Hal Jackson (24), both sophomores, wrestle with an Eastern Kentucky player for a rebound.

He averaged 15.4 per game on 323 points; grabbed 221 rebounds for a 10.5 average; hit .457 from the field and .743 from the charity stripe; and ranked high in the OVC in all four departments.


Sledd, along with senior guard Jimmy Darke, was named to the All-OVC Academic team for the second year in a row. Sledd and sophomore guard Hal Jackson received honorable mention on the All-OVC team.

Finishing second to Sledd in the scoring race was Jackson with 244 points for a 15.3 average. He was followed by Richard Keller (8.8), Mel Van Hooser (8.3), Benny Morgan (6.9), Jim DeForest (6.9), L. M. Ellis (6.7), Andy Toombs (5.3) and Gene Wilkerson (4.1).



A sidelight to the campaign was the cheering section composed of football players to boost one of their own, Toombs, who gained a position on the starting five.



The cagers' four victories came at the expense of Union University (85-77), East Tennessee (72-70), U-T Martin (70-69) and Morehead State (81-73).

APSC pressed eventual OVC champion Eastern Kentucky before bowing 69-64; scared National Invitational Tournament quarter-finalist Western Kentucky before succumbing 78-74; and dropped a 96-89 verdict to Murray State, OVC holiday tourney winner, in the home season finale.

As a team, APSC averaged 73.3 per outing, while a weak defense allowed opponents to score at the rate of 84.6 per contest. The Govs hit at a .379 clip from the floor as opposed to their enemies' fantastic .464. The opposition hit an even .700 from the free throw line, while APSC finished with a .697 percentage.

Six seniors finished their collegiate careers at the conclusion of the 1964-65 season. These were Seldon Sledd, Richard Keller, Jim DeForest, L. M. Ellis, Riley Holliday and Jimmy Darke.

Hopes of rebuilding quickly took a setback when the APSC frosh cagers of coach Tom Phillips finished the season with a 4-13 record.

The yearlings did defeat rival Middle Tennessee's freshmen twice, however, and some performers showed signs of future promise.

Bob Burnett paced the Baby Govs in scoring with a 15.1 average. He gained support from Danny Oliver (13.3), Barry Rollins (11.1), Ronnie Rager (10.0), Jack Darke (8.0) and Dwight Powell (6.1).

According to one college coach in America, basketball games are won between March and September—the recruiting season. The APSC coaching staff, realizing the difficulty of the tough OVC, hopes to land the prospects to put basketball on an equal basis with their league foes.



In his second year as head track mentor, Gordon Schultz led the cindermen to their second-best record since the sport entered the scene on the campus in 1954. Only 1955 squad's 4-1 slate tops the 1964 contingent's won-lost record.

When the season ended the following new records were established: 440—James Hatchett (:51.4), 880—James Lamberson (1:56.6), Mile run—Tom Hinkle (4:18.7), Two mile run—Hinkle (9:41.5), Intermediate hurdles—Bob Embry (:40.1), Mile relay—George Fort, Lamberson, Hatchett, Embry (3:28.1), 440 relay—Embry, Ron Thomason, Lester Aultman, Ron Freund (:45.7), Javelin—Riley Holliday (202 $\frac{1}{4}$) and Triple jump—Blakey Bradley (40-2).

Senior high-jumper and hurdler Bradley cracked the record for most points in a career by an individual per-


former. He scored 89 points to complete varsity competition with 291 $\frac{1}{4}$ points.



season for inexperienced, weak-hitting diamondmen

Relatively young and inexperienced, the 1964 Austin Peay State College baseball edition posted a 6-13 overall record and a 4-8 Ohio Valley Conference mark.

Coach Leon Sandifer experienced the worst season of his 13-year coaching career at APSC. His lifetime record now stands at 102-88.

The bright spot of an otherwise dull season came when the Govs whipped eventual OVC champion Murray State three out of four times.

Weak hitting was a primary factor in the Govs' rare losing season. As a team APSC batted only .194 compared to their opponents' healthy .283 mark.

Freshman southpaw hurler Dwight Work and junior outfielder Don Climer earned spots on the All-OVC Western Division squad at the season's end. Work

posted a brilliant 4-1 record, while Climer batted .244, finishing the season strong.

Besides Work, the pitching staff consisted of port-sider Dave Small (1-1) and righthanders Dwight Norris (1-3), Ewing Schmittou (0-0), Doug Stamper (0-1), Bill DeCicco (0-1) and hard-luck Wayne Tally (0-5).

Doug Stamper, the winner of the most versatile athlete award, led the regulars from his third-base position with a .291 average. He topped the squad in six departments, including hits and total bases.

Other players and their averages are Tommy Elliott (.250), Willard Ross (.250), Mort Paisley (.250), Jack Atkins (.222), Mel Van Hooser (.205), Dwight Gregory (.196), Rodney Rogers (.182), Billy Jewell (.154) and Small (.146).




APSC, under the tutelage of Marion Carr, scored only nine points in the OVC tournament to finish in


the cellar for the third consecutive season.




