The services of the University Student Health Services are available to currently enrolled full-time and part-time students of the University. Services are also available to faculty and staff for emergencies or emergency evaluation. The office is located in the McReynolds Nursing Building with an outside entrance marked "Student Health Service" which is located on the North side of the building. Entrance to the parking lot is from Drane Street.

Hours of Operation:

Monday through Friday: 7:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m.
Saturday and Sunday: Closed

Limited emergency coverage is provided after hours. If medical treatment is needed when the Student Health Services is closed, head residents or the Department of Public Safety (648-7786) may be contacted to procure services of the Student Health Services Assistant and/or the Montgomery County Ambulance Service.

Emergencies:

Refer to the procedures outlined in Policy 3:011

Services:

- Allergy injections (Student provide their own medication and instructions. Syringes are provided at a fee.)
- Blood pressure checks
- Simple urinalysis
- Pregnancy testing
- Various laboratory testing
- Blood tests for marriage

- Crutches
- Medication
- Diagnosis and treatment of illness per established protocol
- Family planning (birth control counseling)
- Patient teaching for preventative health

There is no charge for the use of the Student Health Services or for services of medical personnel. Medications can be obtained at the state purchasing price.

Family Planning:

This service is provided by the Montgomery County Health Department as a service to APSU students, staff, faculty, and spouses of students. A fee schedule is provided in accordance with federal guidelines.

AIDS

Medical research indicates that Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) is not transmitted through casual contact but only through the exchange of body fluid by intimate contact or transfusions of infected blood. APSU will regard a diagnosis of AIDS, AIDS related complex or HTLV III positive as a medical problem and as such award it the same privilege of confidentiality as any other medical problem. APSU does expect, however, an individual with a diagnosis of such to alert the Director of Student Health Services.
