

FACULTY SENATE

Special Senate Meeting on Semester Calendar October 16, 1986

- A. The senate considered each of the six items on the semester calendar committee report separately.
 - 1. Item number one was accepted with the editorial modification of the addition of "seventy-five days" to appear in parenthesis after "15 weeks". The reason for the possibility of two days deletion is to allow for the single day holidays of Labor Day and Martin Luther King's birthday and the provision for any future unforseen holidays.
 - 2. Number two was accepted with the addition that the full week be bracketed by two weekends.
 - 3. Number three was accepted with no discussion.
 - 4. Number four was accepted with the clarification that grades would be due by 9:00 AM on Tuesday following exam week.
 - 5. After much discussion the senate voted to delete number five.
 - 6. After much discussion the members of the senate decided to send number six concerning the calendar for summer semester back to the committee for further consideration. Dr. Ron Gupton asked that all departments discuss summer semester and send recommendations to him to help the semester calendar committee work out an acceptable proposal. Send these recommendations by November 5, 1986—(in time for discussion of the November 6 senate meeting).

It was moved that the calendar dates for fall 1988 and spring 1989 $^{b}\!e$ accepted. The motion passed with amendment that spring break be coordinated with that of the public schools.

- B. Dr. Reese Elliot will take the calendar as modified by the senate to the SBR Faculty Sub-Council meeting as a proposal for a standard calendar for SBR schools.
- C. Business for the Nov. 6, 1986 regular senate metting will include the reports of the committees on the summer session and the student evaluation of instruction instrument. The senate will vote on the proposal of the committee on student evaluation that the student evaluation to be done in the winter quarter so that the new instrument may be used.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:45 PM.
