

Reimagining the past for a better future

ome of us APSURANS, including myself, seem these days to be dwelling more frequently and at greater length upon the past. Maybe Future Shock is proving too shocking, or our collective short-term memory is simply about to blow its last fuse. Maybe the rapid approach of Kurzweil's Singularity is warping Time, forcing us to flee to a fast-retreating history. Or, more likely, perhaps our appreciation of the past has merely increased in proportion to the amount of time and energy we spent there.

Whatever, everywhere I look I see the olden days. A road trip last month found me again marveling at the beautiful All Saints Chapel at Sewanee, the rickety incline up Lookout Mountain, the parade of Rockwell ads in the Coca-Cola museum in Atlanta and the wonderful L & N Railroad Depot and Museum in Etowah, where I was born.

That trip also provided APSURAN Bob Privett the opportunity to respond to a request from rangers that he donate his drawing "The Old Fort" to the Hiwassee/Ocoee Scenic River State Park, in Delano, Tenn., where we found that the subject of his drawing remarkably still stands. This blockhouse is the only surviving fragment of the 1830s Cherokee Removal forts, and it is a stark reminder of those dark days in the history of our country. This particular fort was Fort Marr, which dates from 1814. Ironically, it was my grandfather who along with others had helped preserve the blockhouse by having it moved in 1922 from its original location in Old Fort to the Polk County High School where he was principal.

Treasurer's Report: APSURA awards first scholarship

e are happy to announce the awarding of the first APSURA scholarship, a \$500 book award for the 2013-14 year, through the Student Financial Aid Office. The recipient is Morgan Langley, a junior at APSU and the daughter of Mark and Jean Langley. Jean is employed in the Center of Excellence for Field Biology, and Morgan's brother John is a senior English major at APSU.

Morgan has lived in Clarksville most of her life and was home schooled. Active in her church and the Church of Christ Student Center, she also participates in the activities of student groups in the APSU College of Business. This year she served as a counselor with the Science and Math Academy. Morgan has achieved a 3.833 GPA at APSU thus far.

The granting of this award helps to mark the completion of another successful year for APSURA. We are happy to say we have a total of 68 members, many of whom have participated in the steady slate of activities sponsored by APSURA. Most members have been good to remember to pay their \$25 dues by July 1 of each year without relentless prodding by our treasurer (me). To those who have already renewed for this year, we thank you! Remember that after payment of our small number of expenses each year, the remainder goes straight into the scholarship fund, which will continue to benefit Morgan and other descendants of APSU employees in coming years.

The APSURA Scholarship Fund continues to grow. This fund was started with an initial goal of creating an endowment of at least \$25,000. Through the generosity of our members, the account

has grown to over \$6,000 in less than three years. Once we reach the initial goal, we will start making more substantial awards. 

Update on parking tags and other benefits

e have recently been working with Mitch Robinson, and Angie Judish and Mike Hamlet of Human Resources, to update our list of retiree benefits. This update will soon appear on our website, www.apsu.edu/retirees-association, along with a revised checklist for the count-down to retirement, but here are a few highlights:

Official University identification cards are available to all retirees. Ask at the information desk in the Morgan University Center for directions to the office currently administering these. New free and permanent parking tags (i. e. never requiring renewal) will be available to all retirees beginning in early September. You will be able to pick these up from Angie Judish or at the main desk in Human Resources, Browning Bldg., Room 2. Be sure to take your ID with you in case the person at the desk does not recognize you.

Retirees have access to the facilities and services of the Library, and the same privileges as current faculty and staff in the use of tennis courts and the facilities of the Foy Center. Spouses and dependents pay the same Foy fees as those of current employees, currently \$120 per year. Retirees may upon request keep campus email accounts and may obtain P.O. boxes, as available, at the same rate as current employees.

Cafeteria meal plans and season tickets to sports events are also available at the same rates as for current employees. You might not know that retirees holding season tickets in any sports venue when they retire are upon request granted complimentary season tickets to the same events in subsequent years.

A new benefit to retirees is the availability of free notary service, provided by the Office of Human Resources. Appointments may be made by calling HR at 931-221-7179.

Dr. Green is currently serving his first term representing Houston, Montgomery and Stewart counties in the Tennessee State Senate. He is also a decorated former Army Ranger medic who served tours in Afghanistan and Iraq. As the special operations flight surgeon on the December 2003 mission that captured Iraqi dictator Saddam Hussein, he was assigned to sit with Hussein throughout the first 24 hours after his capture. From this experience, Dr. Green authored his book A Night With Saddam, describing the capture of Saddam Hussein and his subsequent medical care.
