APSC Expands Graduate Program

Science Day To Be At APSC

The annual regional Science Day competition, sponsored by the Tennessee Junior Academy of Science, will be held at Austin Peay State College February 22.

Students in grades 7-12 may enter projects. Entry blanks should be sent to Dr. George M. Rawlins, Department of Chemistry, Austin Peay State College, by February 17.

Contestants will present reports on their science projects or on a special phase of science or mathematics. Students will set-up their exhibits February 22 from 7 to 9 a.m. Contestants will be divided into junior high and senior high divisions.

The fields of entry are: Plant Biology, Chemistry - Earth Science, Animal Biology, Physics-Astronomy and Mathematics.

Entries from Montgomery, Stewart, Houston, Jackson, Humphreys counties and Fort Campbell are expected.

Winners of this regional competition will compete at State Science Day on March 21, at the University of Chattanooga. Only first place winners from the

various regional groups are eligible for this March 21 competition.

Morgan And Pryor Attend Conferences

President Joe Morgan and Dr. Harold Pryor left yesterday to attend the 36th Annual Meeting of the American Association of Colleges of Teacher Education Conference which will be held Feb. 19-22 at the Conrad Hilton Hotel in Chicago, Ill.

In addition, Morgan will attend the Association of State Colleges and Universities Conference which will be held tomorrow in the same hotel.

On Thursday, Dr. Pryor will act as chairman of a three-hour debate and discussion session on 17 proposals for the improvement of teacher education which Dr. James F. Conant advocates in his most recent publication, *Education of American Teachers*.

Peace Corps Exam To Be Given

Dr. Tom K. Savage, dean of students, announces the giving of the Peace Corps Placement Test on the campus Thursday, February 20.

All applicants who take the test should have applied previously to the Peace Corps or should obtain a questionnaire from Dean Savage and submit it at the time of the test.

The Peace Corps is a challenge and an opportunity; it means a new language, a new culture and two years of hard work overseas. The Corps needs 6,000 qualified Volunteers to begin training this summer. Needed background qualifications include liberal arts, agriculture, engineering, health, physical education, home economics and over 300 skill categories.

In addition to seniors, this announcement should be of particular interest to juniors. Five hundred to seven hundred college juniors who have applied and have taken the placement test will be invited for a six-week summer training program. There will be no charge for this training. The Peace Corps will provide room, board and pocket money, plus a \$75 monthly readjustment allowance.

Dean Savage advises that for further information about the test and procedure for applying, the interested student may contact his office.

Eight Areas Of Study Approved By State Board

Beginning next quarter, eight new teaching majors will be offered by Austin Peay State College in its graduate program, Dean F. G. Woodward announced today.

The new majors which will emphasize content rather than professional courses are:

- Biology
- Business Education
- Health and Physical Education
- History
- Mathematics
- Music Education
- Science (Biology and Chemistry)
- Social Science (history and geography)

In addition, a graduate major in counseling and guidance has also been approved by the State Board of Education.

"This change will strengthen the masters program in education to a considerable degree and will meet with hearty approval of the accrediting associations of which we are a member," said President Joe Morgan.

The program is open only to those who hold or plan to be qualified to hold a professional teaching certificate. However, students who are now under the old graduate program may transfer to the new program if they so desire.

In addition to these changes, the new plan for a masters degree requires only three quarters of residence and a research paper which will be done in the student's major field.

The new curricula are designed to increase, at the level of the first year of graduate study, professional competence in the chosen teaching field.

The Master of Arts in Education degree has been offered since 1952. The graduate program is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

New Program Of Admission To Begin This Summer

A plan for the early admission of academically talented students will become effective at Austin Peay State College the Summer Quarter of 1964.

The plan will enable students who have completed at least three academic years of residence in an accredited high school and earned at least 14 high school units with a 3.5 or better grade-point average to carry 12 college hours in the summer of their junior year.

In the fall, they will return to their high school and complete their senior year. The College will hold the credits earned during the summer until such time as the student is admitted as a regular student. The credits then become regular college credit.

In addition to his high school record, the student will have to

score in the 91 percentile or better on the American College Test.

Afterwards he will be interviewed by a committee of the faculty to secure additional evidence that the student is sufficiently mature socially as well as intellectually to profit from the early admission program.

The purpose of the trip is to view firsthand the continuing impact of French culture upon America.

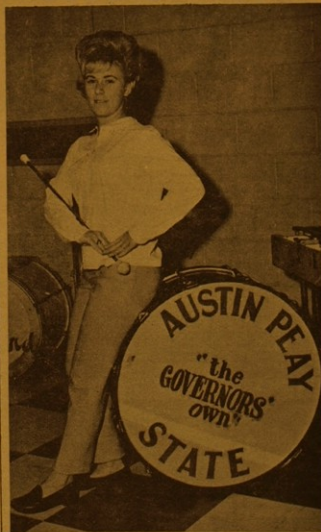
All college students, faculty and others interested in this type of trip are invited to join the French students on the trip, Welker stated.

Do you recall seeing, (or being), a first quarter freshman viewing the shelves of books in the Austin Peay State College library for the first time?

You probably got a glance at him before he found a place to sit and attract less attention. He studied a diagram of the library before he got up again. Then the search on the sly began.

After a quick look around at the neat arrangement of study booths and shelves of books he went down stairs. His adventure in the college library ended. Now he could find his way back again, and most likely, he spends a lot of his time there now.

Did it ever occur to you that someone has to manage the cataloging selection, care and direction of the library's books?

Mrs. Mary Fox Clardy, head of the library science department and associate professor of library science, is concerned with teaching interested students the complex mystery of library management.

The department offers a basic training program for students who wish to prepare for positions as librarians in elementary and high school libraries; teachers and prospective teachers who wish to become acquainted with library materials and the function of the library in the classroom; school administrators who wish to have a fuller appreciation of

the place of the library in the instructional program of the school; students who plan to attend a graduate library school after completing this basic program.

No major is offered in the department. Courses ranging from the principles of librarianship to selected reading for young people and adults are included in the program for minors.

Students completing the requirements of the elementary or secondary curriculum take courses in the department. Some are certified to be teacher-librarians, grades 1-12 and others may be certified to be full-time librarians, grades 1-12.

The library science department is essentially a service department. It renders valuable instruction and guidance to its students, who in turn offer assistance to wandering grammar school, high school and college students!

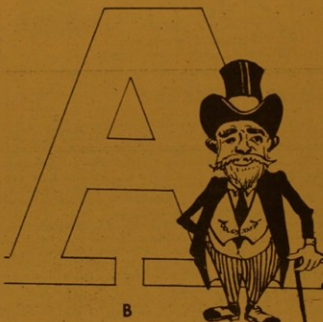

Govs' Travels End

Tomorrow night the Govs will make their final road trip of the 1963-64 season. They will travel to Murray, Ky., to play Murray State in varsity and freshmen encounters.

The game with the Murray Thoroughbreds will be a must game for both schools since each team will need a win to stay in the tough race for supremacy in the Ohio Valley Conference.

The Govs will be out to avenge a 98-82 trouncing by the Thoroughbreds earlier in the APSC gym. Also, the freshman team will try to take advantage of the last chance at a road victory over a team they beat 86-76 at home.

The Governor varsity team, which didn't lead the 'Breds but once in the first meeting, will possibly be somewhat hampered with two of the top Governor candidates slowed by injuries.

Richard Keller and Jim DeForest, both who sustained ankle injuries missed practice last week but are expected to be in the line-up tomorrow night.

Following the Murray clash the Govs will return home to host Morehead State Saturday and East Tennessee Monday night.

These clashes with two of the OVC's leaders could be quite decisive in conference standings should the Governors knock off these ball clubs.

Governors Whip Vols

The past victory for the Govs over U-T Martin was a real shot in the arm for the team in several ways.

First, Steve Miller was the standout performer, scoring 23 points and recovering 10 rebounds. Also, the Govs outrebounded the baby Vols and boosted their percentage recovery mark to .556, one of the top marks in the national rebounding department.

Doug Stamper hit seven straight free throws to boost himself on top of the OVC for the best percentage at .825. Stamper also increased his career total to 1,110 points, a close third to Kenny Gerald's record of 1,257 points which is good for second place.

Intramurals Near Tourney

This week will mark the end of the round robin playoff in the boys intramurals in preparation for the league tournament next week.

As of last week, the leaders in each league were as follows: NORTH - Hurst Hoosiers (4-1) and Trashmen (2-1); SOUTH - Renegades (3-1) and Wildcats (3-1); EAST - Red Eyes (3-0) and Rejects (3-0); and WEST - Misfits (3-0) and Potneckers (2-1).

Scoring leaders in the league are Charles Lawrence of the Hoosiers with 83 points; Ron Claxton of the Wildcats with 61 points; Kenny Townsend of the Wildcats with 56 points; Jimmy Hatchett of the Rebels with 45 points; Gary Farnbrough of the Red Eyes with 45 points; Willard Ross of the Misfits with 45 points; James Moroni of the Robb Hall Rats with 43 points; and Jerry Wooten of the Shotgunners with 42 points.

After a week's rest the Austin Peay State basketball team will return to the hardwood tomorrow night when they travel to Murray, Ky., to face the Thoroughbreds of Murray State.

This game will mark the last road game of the season for the Governors as they return home to play host to Morehead State (Feb. 27), Eastern Kentucky (Feb. 24), and Western Kentucky (Feb. 27) to close out the season.

In the Govs' last game his 6-5 Steve Miller led APSC to victory over the University of Tennessee Martin Branch 82-68. Miller turned in his finest performance of the season against the U-T Martin Vols with 23 points and 10 rebounds.

The win over UTMB raised the Governors' season record to 11-8, while their conference record remained at 4-6, good for sixth place in the Ohio Valley Conference.

The above mentioned games, are all against OVC teams and, although the Governors are practically eliminated from the championship, they will have a lot to say as to who will become the champion.

Murray State, Morehead State, Eastern Kentucky are all still in the race for the conference crown with East Tennessee.
