## THE MONOCLE

RICH TRADITIONS AT Austin Peay State University are captured year after year in the hearts and minds of students, faculty and staff — and often also in the viewfinder of a camera. Showcased on social networking sites, in the student newspaper, in photo albums, on bulletin boards and a variety of other media, the best images may provide a glimpse of the meaning of APSU traditions for years to come.

But it is inevitable that some of that meaning is lost — when Facebook is replaced by the next social networking medium, when pictures are recycled to make space on a bulletin board. Since 1993, we suspect that has been the case for many special images of the faces and traditions of APSU in the absence of a volume whose purpose is preserving history.

No longer, though. The Monocle yearbook has been established to record university history in words and images that will be around for years to come.



## PRESERVING HISTORY

SINCE THE LAST yearbook was published in 1993, many new buildings, organizations and traditions have been created. But the old ones are still present. Homecoming is more popular than ever, with the floats and school spirit, and the "bowls" are still here. The clock tower still stands over the Browning Building in spite of the 1999 tornado.

These events, locations and more were formerly documented in APSU's last yearbook, *The Govs' Pride*. In 1993, the yearbook was discontinued. For years, no yearbook documented our history.


In the summer of 2008, President Timothy Hall held a meeting about preserving Austin Peay's

history. While *The All State* covers events and news on campus, its purpose is not preserving campus history. No other publications served this purpose, either.

The idea of a yearbook had been discussed before and the decision was made to proceed this year. The original idea for this project was a video or electronic yearbook, but with technology changing everyday, a physical yearbook was simply the best option to capture tradition in a form we will be able to view in five years, 50 years and beyond.

With every move we made in planning this project, we had tradition in mind. The name of the yearbook even incorporates a part of Austin

Peay's history — *The Monocle* alludes to the eye piece our mascot, The Gov, wears. It was used for vision correction when held to one's eye in the 1800s. In a way, it serves a similar corrective purpose with our campus history. For 15 years APSU did not have a yearbook, but now, *The Monocle* is here to document our school's history in a volume that will last a lifetime.



WHAT A YEAR and what a way to cap it off with the first edition of The Monocle, Austin Peay's revived yearbook. This was the year we finished designing and prepared to break ground for a new student housing facility in Castle Heights. It was the year Gov. 



## Telling the story

Every year holds millions of historical moments. Whether it is a child's first steps, a university's new president or national tragedy or triumph, it is a notch in someone's timeline. A re-established yearbook would be lacking if it did not account for some of the timeline notches that have been made since the last

# Since 1993 @APSU

## 1993

THE PRESIDENT OF the university was Dr. Oscar Page.

### EXPANDING ONLINE

In 1993, APSU offered no online classes, but now there are 13 complete degrees offered online.

## 1994

LEADERSHIP OF THE university transitioned to Richard G. Rhonda as interim. In October of 1994, Sal D. Rinella became president of APSU.

## 1997

APSU FOOTBALL BECAME non-scholarship.

COACH DAVID LOOS was named OVC Coach of the Year.

## 1998

APSU ADDED WOMEN'S golf.

## 1999

ALUMNUS VALERIE MOORE ('71) had been writing a story about her first-hand experience while investigating the Titanic, which led to a hands-on role in the making of the movie "Titanic."

## 1999

AN F-4 TORNADO wreaked havoc all over APSU's campus and downtown Clarksville.

## 2000

DR. SHERRY L. Hoppe became interim president.

ONLINE COURSES BECAME available.

## 2001

DR. SHERRY HOPPE became APSU's first female president.

THE NEWLY CONSTRUCTED Sundquist Science Complex opened.

THE APSU ROTC was recognized as the No. 1 ROTC program in the nation at the 2nd Region Commander's Conference in Nashville. This honor was based on overall recruiting, training and commissioning. Only 270 college units existed nationwide, according to the Oct. 30, 2001 edition of The Chronicle of Higher Education, and "Most colleges and universities dismantled their ROTC programs decades ago."

THE AMERICAN CHEMICAL Society (ACS) Student Affiliates chapter at Austin Peay was one of just 24 nationwide selected to receive an "Outstanding" designation from the American Chemical Society for its activities during the 2000-2001 academic year.

# 1993-2008

## 2002

**THE CURRENT MORGAN** University Center opened, doubling the space of the previous student center.

**APSU CELEBRATED ITS** 75th anniversary during 2001-2002 with special events all year, including the launch of a new capital campaign.

**PEPSI COLA LANDED** the soft drink vending contract at APSU, and the message board on College Street was installed as part of the agreement.

**JOHN DAVID HAZLETT**, an APSU senior, was the first recipient of the Delta Iota Alumni Scholarship and one of only three national scholarship winners out of the more than 80,000 members of the fraternity.

**DR. HOWARD WINN**, professor of history and his colleague, Dr. Richard Gildrie, professor of history, debuted their book, titled "A History of Austin Peay State University and Its Predecessors, 1906-2002." The two agreed to write a new history book about APSU as part of the 75th Anniversary Celebration.

**DR. STANLEY YATES'** range and his unique guitar stylings captured the attention of "Fingerstyle" magazine, which featured him in the February/March 2002 edition.

**BROOKE ARMISTEAD LANDED** a pictorial profile in the May issue of "Slam" magazine. "Slam" notes that the 5-foot-9-inch guard has "been a star" in the Ohio Valley Conference since she arrived at the Peay, leading the Lady Govs in scoring in each of her three seasons. She averaged 20.3 points per game as a freshman and 22.1 as a sophomore. In the 2001-2002 season, she averaged 22.2. "In the process, she led APSU to 19 victories and its second straight NCAA Tournament appearance," noted writer Michael Lewis.

**KAPPA ETA CHAPTER** of Pi Sigma Alpha was named one of the three best political science honor societies nationwide in its category (colleges/universities with 6,000-15,000 enrollment).

**THE VAGINA MONOLOGUES** was performed for the first time at APSU.

## OPERATION RESTORATION

After the tornado in January of 1999, the University quickly initiated "Operation Restoration," with the commitment to have classes resume within a week. Many heavily damaged buildings were reopened within one year, and classes resumed within days.

## 2003

**SECOND LT. RICHARD** Torres, 25, who was killed in Iraq Oct. 6, was honored with a classroom dedication ceremony Dec. 4 in the ROTC Armory. Torres, the University's first ROTC graduate killed in action, was on combat patrol in Baghdad when his convoy was hit by an explosive device. He was a member of APSU's "Governor's Guard" and served the ROTC as cadet battalion operations officer before graduating in May 2002. He went on to Fort Benning, Ga., to attend the Infantry Officer Basic Course and was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 32nd Infantry Regiment, 10th Mountain Division, Fort Drum, N.Y. After one month at Fort Drum, training in urban operations for Afghanistan, Torres' unit deployed to Iraq, where he had been for about two months.

**APSU RESIDENCE HALLS** were wired for the Internet.

**AUSTIN PEAY WOMEN'S** basketball player Brooke Armistead headed to the Women's National Basketball Association (WNBA). The senior guard was picked in the third round (40th pick overall) by the San Antonio Silver Stars in the three-round draft. She became the first Ohio Valley Conference player ever to be selected in the draft.

## 2004

**THE HARVILL BUILDING**, renovated from its former use as the University cafeteria, became the Ann Ross Book and Supply Store and Austin Diner. Ann Ross managed the APSU Bookstore for many years when it was located in the old University Center and retired just prior to the construction of the new Morgan University Center. The bookstore was eventually named after her as a result of her dedicated service and financial support of the University. Being the dedicated supporter she is, Ross still attends many sporting and social events to this day.

**HAND VILLAGE OPENED** as the newest housing option for students. It features apartment-style housing.

# 1993- 2008

FIRST YEAR EXPERIENCE programs were launched for new students.

APSU BECAME THE only university in Tennessee to offer a bachelor's degree in Homeland Security.

THE MURAL IN the Tommy Head Atrium of the Sundquist Science Complex was unveiled on Jan. 25. The mural was painted by Professor Emeritus of Art Max Hochstetler. Hochstetler murals can be seen in several public venues, but the best-known one is the beautiful, 22,000-square-feet mural covering the walls of the Tennessee Ballroom at Opryland Hotel, Nashville. Using such resource materials as Charles Waters' history book, "The First Fifty Years of Austin Peay State University," Hochstetler has captured on canvas the highlights of Austin Peay's history, beginning in 1927 and

Ending in 2001 with the science building dedication. Hochstetler secured two Austin Peay art students to assist with the mural, Tommy Jones and William Gentry, both of whose names are under his signature on the last panel. With the installation of the mural, Hochstetler bid his final good-bye to APSU. He was a member of the art faculty since 1967, serving as department chair from 1989 to 1993.

THE GOVERNORS STADIUM and the Winfield Dunn Center underwent extensive renovations adding new stadium track and synthetic turf field, Jumbotrons, new seats and more. The Chicago Bears paid a visit to the Govs stadium to check out the new turf.

## THE NEW ARCHWOOD

The university president's residence was previously on Dunbar Cave Road. Now the president resides on campus in the historic Archwood house that was completely remodeled in 1999.

# Since 1993 @APSU

## ENROLLMENT

Enrollment has skyrocketed from 5,293 in 1999 to over 9,401 students in 2008.

AUSTIN PEAY ACHIEVED history as the Governors defeated Eastern Kentucky, 81-64, and became the first team in the Ohio Valley Conference to finish league play at 16-0. The Govs also became only the fourth team to go unbeaten, joining the 1948-49 Western Kentucky team (8-0), as well as the 1965-66 and the 1969-70 Hilltoppers (14-0). Almost lost in the historic victory was the Governors 27th straight home victory, the fifth longest home streak in the nation and the longest in Austin Peay history. In addition, with a 94-72 victory against Tennessee Tech Feb. 24, the Lady Govs claimed the OVC regular-season title in women's basketball, successfully defending their 2002-03 crown. They were only the third team in conference history to claim back-to-back outright titles, joining Tennessee Tech and Middle Tennessee.

WRITTEN AND DIRECTED by award-winning playwright, Glyn O'Malley, the play, "A Heartbeat to Baghdad," was about the devastating impact of war on those most directly affected. Then Playwright-in-residence at Austin Peay, O'Malley interviewed soldiers of the 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault), Fort Campbell, and their family members. Although fictional, "A Heartbeat to Baghdad" was based on many first-person interviews. O'Malley dedicated the play to "The Soldiers of the 101st Airborne Division, The 160th Special Operations Aviation Regiment, The 502th Mechanized Division and The 5th Group Special Forces, United States Army, Fort Campbell.

A reading of the play debuted on July 3 at APSU. "A Heartbeat to Baghdad" went into rehearsals in New York City at Jim Simpson and Sigourney Weaver's Off-Broadway theatre, The Flea, on Sept. 30. It had first previews Oct. 24 and 25 and opened for the press on Nov. 8.


## 2005

THE HISPANIC CULTURAL Center opened and was the first among Tennessee state universities. It was modeled after the Wilbur N. Daniel African American Cultural Center, which opened in 1991.

APSU PLAYED A supporting roll in "Extreme Makeover: Home Edition."

## 2006

THE TENNESSEE TITANS held their training camp at APSU.



# 1993- 2008

THE MCCORD BUILDING reopened after a complete renovation and is now the home of the School of Nursing, School of Agriculture, Geosciences and the GIS Center.

APSU BECAME A smoke-free campus.

## 2007

FOY FITNESS CENTER opened in January, providing exceptional opportunities for recreation, adventure recreation, exercise classes, nutrition classes, intramurals and more.

TIMOTHY L. HALL became the ninth president of APSU.

FOOTBALL RETURNED TO the OVC.

ON NOV. 12, 2007, Kim McMillan, Clarksville, assumed the duties of executive director of community and business relations, reporting directly to APSU President Timothy Hall. McMillan, an attorney, was formerly the senior adviser to Tennessee Gov. Phil Bredesen.

## 2008


THE FOY OUTDOOR pool opened. The Red Barn was renovated to house ROTC and the new dance major.

THE MEN'S BASKETBALL team won the OVC Championship and played in the first round of the NCAA tournament.

A NEW, LARGER facility at Fort Campbell debuted in 2008-2009, allowing the university to better serve the Fort Campbell community.

AS PART OF the preinaugural activities, the Govs Programming Council hosted a talk by Holocaust survivor, Nesse Godin. In the 1930s and '40s, Nesse Godin lived through the horrors of the Shauliai, Lithuania Ghetto, the Stutthof Concentration Camp, four labor camps and a death march.

Also, poet and activist Nikki Giovanni was the speaker at the Student Affairs annual Unity Celebration Dinner.









APSU BEGAN TO offer two new summer study abroad programs, one in Japan and the other in Russia. Students gained the opportunity to earn college credit through either the Japan Study abroad or Study Abroad in Russia. The additional summer programs brought APSU's international education opportunities to more than 20.

THE APSU LIBRARY Athenaeum program kicked off Spring 2009 with a look back at the 1999 tornado that ripped through Clarksville. The program began with a showing of "The Clarksville Tornado: 10 Years Later," a 15-minute documentary produced by students in a video production class taught by Kathy Lee Heuston, assistant professor of communication. The 10-year anniversary of the tornado that tore through the APSU campus was Jan. 22, 2009. To commemorate the event, and the recovery and growth that followed, Student Affairs, with the help of the landscape staff, planted 10 new trees around campus, one to mark each year since the tornado hit. Student Affairs also provided a large display in the lobby of the UC, featuring photos of the destruction as well as repairs and

improvements since January 1999, some items belonging to students at the time who attended events on campus when classes resumed, such as a special tornado survivor ID card and T-shirt, and showed segments of Nashville news stations' coverage of the aftermath that aired at the time. It was a shock to most students to see how far the campus has come since then!

## FEBRUARY 2009

THE UNIVERSITY'S ROTC program was named a MacArthur Award recipient, placing it among the top eight programs in the country. APSU beat out some 272 other collegiate ROTC programs at schools such as Duke, Princeton and Virginia Tech for the distinction.

**SHARON MABRY, MEZZO-SOPRANO** and professor of music, was a featured soloist on a new CD published and distributed internationally by Naxos, one of the leading classical music labels. Titled "Lincoln Portraits," this CD — Mabry's eighth thus far — has been issued by the Nashville Symphony Orchestra in celebration of the 200th birthday of Abraham Lincoln.

**HEIDI SCHEUSNER LEMING**, director of Student Life and Leadership and administrative director of the Hispanic Cultural Center was recognized for her efforts to bring greater awareness to Hispanic issues. She was presented the Outstanding Diversity Achievement Award for an Individual at the annual National Association of Campus Activities conference.

**AS TENNESSEE'S FASTEST** growing public university, APSU also holds the title of one of the state's most diverse universities, according to the latest enrollment data. From Fall 2007 to Fall 2008, APSU's black student enrollment increased 9.22 percent. The Hispanic student enrollment also increased, by 7.24 percent, during the same period. APSU's Hispanic retention rate was 72.7 percent, again higher than the University's overall retention rate. The figure is an 18.9 percent increase from the previous year's rate.

**AUSTIN PEAY STATE** University celebrated the grand opening of the new Austin Peay Center @ Fort Campbell facility with a brief ceremony. President Tim Hall and APFC Executive Director Bill Cox cut the ribbon on the new education facility on post.



In the fall of 2008, Austin Peay State University and the Clarksville-Montgomery County School System instituted the new Middle College High School, located at APSU.

The program "enables junior and senior high school students throughout the district to obtain a high quality high school education while concurrently receiving direct and invaluable access to college courses," said Melissa Champion, principal of Middle College.

"The Middle College concept is not novel," Champion said. "However, our district's approach of incorporating a choice of seeking a bachelor's degree or associate's degree is unlike any other in the nation."

Students eligible to attend Middle College must have completed the tenth grade and live within the Clarksville-Montgomery County school district. According to Champion, students who enroll in Middle College are considered college freshmen and are enrolled "in college classes with traditional college freshmen." Like traditional college freshmen, Middle College students enroll in 1000 and 2000 level courses and are held to the same grading standards as APSU students.

About 120 students attended Middle College High School during the 2008-09 academic year.

On May 9, 2009, they had their first prom in the MUC Ballroom, and on May 21 the first 46 seniors in the Middle College at APSU graduated in the Music/Mass Communications Concert Hall.





























## THE FOY

The Foy Fitness Center opened in January 2007, fully equipped with a climbing wall and boulder, an outdoor pool, a multifunctional gym, an indoor walking track, fitness studios, an indoor cycling studio, a court-side cafe, racquetball courts and a 10,000-square-foot cardio and weight training space.

The first Foy bouldering competition was on Nov. 22, 2008, and was open to students, faculty, staff and community members. The annual competition features very short climbs 10-to-12 feet in height and emphasize power, strength and balance. Each problem had a different level of difficulty and a unique point value to match the level of difficulty.


And it was at this time that it finally set into my mind that I had actually witnessed history firsthand!









## A record number and a tornado siren

A record 824 graduates earned degrees on May 8, 2009, from APSU.

"This is so far the largest class we've had," Telaina Wrigley, registrar for the University, said. "I think it's a positive sign because it seems like we have more students completing their degree requirements and graduating."

A year earlier, at the 2008 May commencement, about 750 students received diplomas, setting a record. This trend of large graduating classes led APSU to divide commencement into two separate ceremonies.

At 10 a.m., Friday, May 8, graduates from the College of Arts and Letters, the College of Science and Mathematics and the School of Technology and Public Management earned degrees.

At 2 p.m., graduates from the College of Professional Programs and Social Sciences earned degrees, but only after they and all other occupants of the Dunn Center sought shelter when tornado sirens blared about half an hour before the ceremony began. No tornado touched down near campus, and when everyone emerged from the crowded hallways, classrooms and offices, the weather held up for a flawless graduation ceremony.











































