On Dec. 4-5, Austin Peay will continue a proud Christmas tradition with the 14th Annual Madrigal Feaste, a dinner which features Renaissance and contemporary Christmas music and Elizabethan costumes and decorations.

"It will be an evening of continuous entertainment," says Dr. George L. Mabry, who comments that the event is often labeled "Dining with

Entertainment and an explanation of the dinner starts off the Madrigal Feaste which is annually held at 6:30 p.m. in the ballroom of the Joe Morgan University Center. A large buffet dinner and five different acts of entertainment heralded by brass instruments complete the evening of fun and frolic. During the event, the APSU Chamber Singers, the APSU Brass Quintet and guest choirs from local high schools perform as part of the Madrigal Royal Court.

Gholston sets record in Govs' loss to Bearcats

The talent that's been hidden most of the season surfaced in Cincinnati, Ohio Saturday night, Nov. 14.

A Heismann trophy candidate tried to outlast "slinging Sammy" Gholston and failed. Gholston set a

school record as he tossed balls around Nippert Stadium at random, amassing a 342 yard total passing game, and only one interception in the 42-10 loss.

Nowhere in the statistics does it mention QB sacks, either. The offensive line finally did its thing in

Other notable Governor improvements included kickoff return coverage. They only got 17 yards on their two attempts, while their punt return crew fared a whole lot worse. They also had two tries but could only manage a measly eight yards altogether.

Coach Emory Hale said, "We worked hard on our passing game the week prior to this game. We had to get to where we could protect the passer. We've had this type of offense all along. We played a lot better up front, a real decent effort from our players. It was good to see them fight back and respond to the challenge."

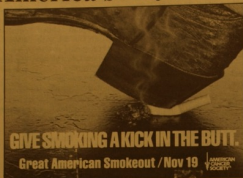
Smokers of Austin Peay, it's time to quit.

The Kappa Nuve Class of Sigma Nu Fraternity will sponsor a Great American Smokeout tomorrow. The purpose of the smokeout is to try to get smokers to break the habit for one day.

The Great American Smokeout is a nationwide event held each year on the Thursday before Thanksgiving. It's an upbeat, good-natured way to encourage smokers to give up cigarettes for 24 hours.

The Sigma Nu novices will have a display set up in the University Center lobby from 9 a.m. to noon. During this time, they will sign up smokers wishing to pledge to abstain from smoking for the day. Pledge cards will be made for each smoker that signs up and these will be attached to helium balloons. At noon, the balloons will be released in the University bowl.

Don Lundy, graduate assistant and co-organizer of the event, said, "It's just another way to promote the Smokeout and

to provide support for those trying to quit. In the past, when we sponsored the Smokeout, someone found a card near Nashville. The person called the smoker whose name was on the card to see if he'd made it."

On the serious side of the Smokeout, the novices are trying to alert smokers to the hazards of the habit. The risks of developing lung cancer are 10 times greater for smokers than for nonsmokers. More

than 320,000 Americans will die prematurely of diseases linked to smoking this year.

Doug Brooks, a reformed smoker and member of the novice class, admitted that he hasn't smoked for the past six weeks. In addition to the health reasons, he noted the monetary savings. A person who smokes a pack-a-day will spend hundreds of dollars during a year.

Another incentive to help the smokers quit is the Adopt-a-Smoker program. Smokers get a friend to help them break the habit. The friend "adopts" the smoker for the day. Adoption papers are signed by both parties and the Adopter agrees to

encourage and cajole the smoker through the day. The novices have adopted Todd Chandler, their class president. He has decided to give up smoking after five years.

Many smokers are unable to give up the habit on the first attempt, according to information from the American Cancer Society. Smokers who have quit are less likely to backslide if surrounded by friends who don't smoke.

Houston Knights

Reviewer calls police drama first-rate

Since the demise of *Starsky & Hutch* in 1979, television has been lacking a hard-hitting, young, unconventional cop team that does things their way. We've endured a lot of boring, watered-down story lines involving unexciting people in drab places.

Now, I think the wait is over.

Houston Knights is a police drama on CBS (seen locally on Channel 5 at 7 P.M.) that reminds me a lot of the better moments of *Starsky & Hutch*, but is in no way imitative of that series. The plots revolve around two police officers in boomtown-gone-bust Houston as they battle crime along with the other problems that confront today's law enforcement officials.

"Levon Lundy" (Michael Beck) and "Joey La Fiamma" (Michael Pare) find that their biggest problem is that they absolutely and unashamedly hate each other. a

relatively unused plot device in police dramas, but one that cannot be all that uncommon in the real world of crimebusting.

La Fiamma also hates Houston. The Windy City native lost his partner in a shootout with local mafia officials and was then exiled from his beloved Chicago for unrelentingly pursuing the case on his own, stepping on a few important toes in the process. It was either Houston or find another job, so La Fiamma found himself Texas-bound.

Lundy doesn't know what to think about his new partner, who wears sharp duds, carries two Italian pistols, abhors country music and Texas chili and drives around in souped-up sports car. Lundy fits the Texas-stereotype perfectly with his shiny .357 Magnum sidearm and his blue jeans and cowboy boots. He lives in a big ranch house, where he parks his pick-up truck.

But both are professionals. Still, they spend as much time arguing with each other as they do catching criminals. Some typical dialogue from the show runs as follows:

Lundy: *La Fiamma you amaze me. Where did you learn sign language?*

La Fiamma: *I dated a deaf girl while I was in college.*

Lundy: *She must have been blind too.*

Needless to say, some of this series' better moments come when this duo exchange verbal jabs at each other. The show's writers, in its first full season, don't appear to be letting up either. After watching the show for a while I'm not really sure if I want them to.

The show moves into the 1980s as the boys work for "Lt. Joanna Beaumont" (Robyn Douglas), Lundy's former partner. She takes her place beside the male characters on the show and doesn't waste a whole lot of time proving herself, like "Cagney & Lacey" and other female TV cops seem to have to do.

It is refreshing to me to see this character so casually and completely accepted in her role, which shows that real progress is being made in at least some parts of Hollywood to stop portraying women merely in traditional stereotypes. Beaumont has arrived and knows just what she wants and can jump down our two heroes' throats as effectively as any of her male counterparts can.

Like "*Starsky & Hutch*," this duo has a stooge, who gets them a lot of information on their cases. "Chicken" (John Hancock) who runs a snack-food restaurant in Houston, is a lot of like the "Huggy Bear" character from the aforementioned series.

The show's writers have promised that they will develop this character more in the upcoming and it should be interesting what we find.

Another source of information for Lundy and La Fiamma is "Annie," a paraplegic clerical worker at the police station. Played by veteran actress Madelyn Rhue, she always has a cheery word for the boys as well as helpful data drawn from the police computers. It is also nice to see that the producers of this show appreciate the contributions of the handicapped as well.

The scripts for this show are entertaining as well as relevant to modern times. Plots have thus far dealt with TV evangelists, date rape and even the theft of a blind girl's seeing-eye dog and look only to get better as we know more about these characters.

I love this show mainly because it is a break from the norm. Most TV violence is like a bad date—a lot of stimulation but no climax. You know what I mean, this real sicko who has done all of these nasty things for an hour merely gets handcuffed and led into the squad car, knowing full well he'll probably beat the rap via a technicality, plea bargain or insanity claim or some other bogus means.

Not on this show.

Lundy and La Fiamma tote some heavy artillery and are not afraid to use it. They kill more people than they cuff, which in these days of ineffective courts, is something people want to see (as evidenced by the large turnouts and acceptance of Charles Bronson, Sylvester Stallone and Arnold Schwarzenegger movies), if not in real life then at least on television.

With all the action, I cannot why CBS has put this show in the so-called "family hour" of TV. With talent like Beck's and Pare's (the latter remember as the star of theatrical releases like "The Philadelphia Experiment," "Streets of Fire" and "Eddie and the Cruisers," the network that now stops to showing Pee-Wee Herman on prime time should put this show in a later time slot where it does not have to compete against the likes of NBC's "Matlock" or ABC's tandem of "Who's The Boss" and "Growing Pains."

It would be a shame to see this show die-out. It's just too good.
