Powers views highways, education as main issues

Jimmy Powers, mayor of Waverly and president of the Tennessee Municipal League, visited Austin Peay State University last Wednesday to meet students and faculty.

Powers is a prospective candidate for Tennessee's governor race. When asked if he will announce officially, he said, "We're taking a look at it—a serious look. In the next 60 days we hope to have an answer to that which will be positive."

Powers was elected president of the Tennessee Municipal League in June. The league, an organization composed of mayors and city officials of 320 towns across the state, serves as a monitoring device for what goes on in state cities and for legislation that affects local governments.

Polling city officials across the state about local needs and improvements, the league, along with county leaders, develops a local government platform. The platform is carried to the governor and leadership of both political parties. The league members then contact members of the legislature to sponsor legislation for them.

"The league is one of the most active groups on Capital Hill. We've had excellent years the last two years," said Powers.

Powers projects some of the main issues of the 1974 gubernatorial race to be highways and education.

"I think with good education and good highways, we can raise the per capita income for Tennessee," he said.

He advocates keeping these departments moving by pumping needed funds into them to keep them moving forward and not backwards.

"In education we need to think about moving us off the lower level," he said.

According to Powers, the budget for education has increased 43 percent for education

over the last four years while the overall budget has increased 100 per cent.

"There hasn't been a proper amount of money put into education at all levels," he added.

Raising teachers salaries to meet the rising cost of living is another measure Powers sees as necessary. He added that a teacher in the last four years has received salary increases of approximately \$1,000 while those in industry with comparable training have received salary increases of \$4,000 for the same period in time.

In the area of vocational training, Powers favors moving the area programs closer to and in combination with high schools. He added that many who are in area vocational training schools now are drop outs. These people

Military spending "continues to rise

Since the end of World War II up to 1972, the United States government spent \$1.3 trillion on the military. This enormous figure paid the cost of the Korean War and the Indo-China conflict and for the monstrous apparatus that matured during the cold war: a world-wide network of military commitments and bases, military aid to more than 80 countries, a vast arsenal of nuclear weapons and millions of men and women both in and out of uniform to operate this global enterprise.

There seems to be no end to this wasteful spending and if Congress continues to Richard Nixon, defense spending will increase for 1974. In December Congress gave us a preview of how they will be voting in the future. An amendment that sought to strike \$200,000 in military training funds for Saudi Arabia and to exclude that country from any foreign military credit sales failed. Also failing to pass was an amendment that sought to reduce funds for emergency military assistance for Cambodia by \$100 million.

The Nixon Administration is asking Congress for \$199.1 billion in general funds for Fiscal 1974. Of this amount 59 per cent is earmarked for military use, 19 per cent human resources, 18 per cent physical resources and the other 12 per cent on international affairs and finance, space, general government, revenue-sharing, pay raises and contingencies.

While Nixon's rhetoric may be "generation of peace" his budget reflects "generation of military spending."

Based on the budget figures from the Library of Congress and population figures from the Bureau of the Census, the average American family will spend \$1486 in general taxes or military-related programs during Fiscal 1974. Compare this figure with \$126 for education, \$63 for community development and housing and \$45 for natural resources (environmental programs).

The State Department reported on August 1, 1972 that the U.S. had 5900 long-range nuclear weapons, the Soviet Union, 2200. Just 200 to 400 of these weapons could destroy a third of the Soviet population and three quarters of its industrial capacity.

Does this make you feel more secure that we can "overkill" the Russians more times than they can "overkill" us?

Consumption of meat disrespectful to animals

Dear Editor:

With the observance of Animal Week and the protest over eating goldfish in a contest, it is curious that no one has mentioned the large scale, organized cruelty occurring every day: the slaughter of thousands of animals for human consumption. People are shocked if a dog's skull is crushed but are not concerned when a cow's skull is crushed, in fact it is condoned and insisted upon that more skulls be crushed to satisfy the desire to eat flesh. The average American, living to a life expectancy of 68 years, consumes three hogs, ten lambs, eight steer and four veal calves. All are totally unnecessary and detrimental to the person's health, the animals and the earth.

People can get all the vitamins, minerals and protein necessary for good health from the top of the

food chain, the plants, and avoid adding more poisons to the body by eating animal bodies that contain concentrations of pesticides and other harmful chemicals. A little more thought and planning is involved in a diet without meat, but with the United States leading the world in degenerative diseases most people need to think more about what is being added to their bodies by way of their mouths.

Raising powerless animals for humans to eat creates enormous waste. The highest quality food sources are fed to animals. An average of 21 pounds of humanly edible protein is required to produce one pound of meat protein. Computer picks roomies to receive higher grades

(CPSI)—A study conducted at West Virginia Institute of Technology indicates college roommates who are matched by computer for compatibility earn significantly higher grades than those selected at random to live together.

The study, conducted by David D. McIntire, used a study group of 30 roommateships of men, 30 roommateships of women, and a large control group of roommates assigned at random for comparison. McIntire asked a wide sample of questions dealing with such factors as family income, race, IQ, educational major and extracurricular interests to

determine which factors best predicted roommate compatibility.

McIntire discovered that for both men and women, the single most important factor in determining roommate compatibility was the similarity of their stage of academic development. This would indicate that roommate pairs of students who entered college in different years would tend to be least compatible than two roommates who were in the same academic year.

For men, the second most important factor in compatibility was the similarity of the two roommates' views on drinking. For women, it was attitudes toward smoking, although the survey questions made no distinction between cigarettes and marijuana.

from 10,000 to 50,000 animals and up to 250,000 poultry, in a single feedlot. Animal waste in the U.S. amounts to 2.6 billion tons annually, equivalent to the waste of 2.6 billion people or more than half the world. Most of this waste finds its way into our water systems leading to depletion of oxygen, encouragement of eutrophication and contamination of the water with pathogens.

Who of us believes that animals have less rights on this earth as living beings? Coyotes have their stomachs slashed by ranchers and are left to die of a lamb is missed, though coyotes rarely attack lambs. Ground hogs are poisoned or blown apart if they come out with cattle for grass. Deer die of starvation in the winter because their usual food, sage, has been sprayed with herbicide so that the cattle can have a few mouthfuls of grass in the summer.

Flesh eating is an unsound practice economically, ecologically, physically and morally. One is perpetuating a grotesque cycle of violence, waste and death every time one eats another animal.

Powers reviews education data

need to be guided early in high school and directed into vocational training before they drop out to prevent making their failures at an early age.

One change in the penal system that Powers would like to see is the segregation of those who have committed less serious crimes, such as possession of marijuana, from those who have committed more serious offenses.

Abusers treated medically

He stated that many in Tennessee talk of being tough as far as strict law enforcement of drug charges go, but he favors trying to help people in these situations.

"These drug abusers, not pushers, should be separated, treated medically and turned back into society," he said.

"This is not a small thing to sweep under the rug; it is a real problem now."

Revenue sharing

Powers stated that revenue sharing as it was designed to be was fine, but was misquashed. As a result funds were impounded.

"When this happened a lot of people's programs, such as education and man power training programs, were cut. These programs that people needed were cut first," he said.

Powers thinks that, in order to receive funds without major tie ups in federal and state bureaucracies, comprehensive plans of specific programs should be submitted before funds are granted. He added that if local governments do not plan ahead the money usually gets sidetracked.

"The people's programs never get funded unless there are guidelines," he said.

According to Powers, government is not in real touch with middle America. People in the middle, those who make too much to apply for food stamps but too little to financially put their children through college, need to be helped.

When asked what he thought he could offer to the people of Tennessee that no other candidate could, Powers said, "I think I can offer more knowledge in governmental operations because of the long time I've spent in the government closed to the people-the local government."

Powers, now serving his sixth term as Mayor of Waverly, first entered politics as County Campaign Manager for the late Estes Kefauver. He served as the Sixth District Campaign Manager for John J. Hooker Jr. in his bid for governor and was elected chairman of the Sixth District Democratic Convention at its last meeting.

He now serves on the Board of Directors of the Mid-Carolina Development District and the Highland Rim Economic Development Corporation.

Powers attended Austin Peay State University, Southwest at Memphis and was graduated from the University of Tennessee at Memphis with a Doctor of Dental Surgery Degree in 1961.

State tries nare

on murder rap

(CPSI)—The federal government has challenged California's right to prosecute a US narcotics agent for homicide.

The government, arguing in California Appellate Court, stated that the state has no right "to try a federal agent in the proper discharge of his federal duty."

The agent, Lloyd N. Clifton, was indicted for second degree murder last January after he shot an unarmed 24-year-old suspect in the back during a San Francisco drug raid.

A companion of the victim said that they had become "petrified" when they saw 19 long-haired men running toward their cabin with drawn guns.

Clifton, one of the plain clothes agents, said that he shot the youth in the back "to prevent him from escaping." Charges against the victim's companion were dropped.

SGA passes bills for women

Three resolutions were passed at the Jan. 31 Student Government Association meeting. These resolutions will be presented as recommendations to the Austin Peay State University administration.

Introduced by Jo Clare Wilson and Carolyn Haley was a resolution concerning equal rights for women at APSU. A list of sex discriminations currently present at APSU were presented in the resolution. Included were such grievances as a lack of any athletic scholarships for women and women being denied the privilege of visiting men's dormitory rooms.

It was pointed out that the 1973 Tennessee Intercollegiate State Legislature passed legislation which requires that all Tennessee institutions of higher learning are to be investigated by their governing bodies to insure that these institutions are abiding by the letter of the law in the area of sex discrimination.

A second resolution submitted by Bob Cooper and Bonita Wilson was a bill to recommend a new dormitory inspection policy.

Currently dormitory rooms are inspected for cleanliness, but it was noted that the rules for room inspection are not equally enforced in each residence hall.

This bill recommends that dormitory rooms be inspected only in the search for damages and illegal substances and that the inspection follow the policy

presented in this bill beginning spring quarter of 1974.

Rooms will be inspected at the beginning of the quarter before the resident moves in. A list of damages done prior to the residents moving into the room will be compiled and kept on file in the offices of the Director of Men's Affairs or Women's Affairs.

The dormitory supervisor and the resident of the room will make the inspection together. The room will be re-inspected the week before final exams.

If the resident is to keep the same room for another quarter then the inspection at the end of the following quarter will serve the purpose of the inspection at the beginning of the new quarter.

Complaints against fellow residents concerning intolerable uncleanness can be appealed by the student to the dormitory supervisor. The dormitory supervisor can ask the resident involved to clean up the area in complaint. A failure to carry out this task is grounds for a student to appeal to the dormitory council in the case of women's dormitories or to the Men's Affairs Board in the case of the men's dormitories.

Passed unanimously by the SGA senate was a resolution intended to be a statement of feelings against future plans for a segregated athletic dormitory.

Rumors that plans for a "football dorm" for the 1974-75 school year were being discussed caused Carolyn Haley, Bonita Savage and Bonita Wilson to submit this resolution.

The SGA senate resolved that no special housing arrangements for athletes shall be made by APSU. Reasons for being against such plans include the right of students not to be removed from their current dorm rooms which they are entitled to keep for the following year, according to university policy.

APSU head football coach, Jack Bushovsky had previously announced to the SGA senate in spring quarter of 1973 that he did not wish for football players to be

housed differently or separately from other male students. This was in accordance with the policy of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, of which APSU is a member.

In consideration of the current energy crisis it was felt that opening Miller Hall as an athletic dormitory would be unnecessary, uneconomical and unwarrantable.

In agreement with all three resolutions, SGA president, Tex Fletcher, said, "I believe that we are making definite progress and achievement here at APSU." He expressed hope that students would communicate their feelings toward these resolutions to him or any SGA senate member.

It isn't really necessary to point out the significance of Austin Peay State University's next two Ohio Valley Conference basketball games.

But the fact can't be overlooked that wins over East Tennessee State Saturday and Tennessee Tech Monday are almost imperative if the Governors are going to successfully defend their OVC championship.

Both games will be played in APSU's Little Red Barn and Gov head coach Lake Kelly has already pointed out that his team can't afford another loss at home.

Of course, Austin Peay was defeated at home earlier in the season by a tough Eastern Kentucky team, 71-64, which is still a sore spot in the minds of Kelly and the Govs.

Samford tomorrow

However, before the Governors can really worry about East Tennessee and Tech, they have to make a road trip to Birmingham, Ala., tomorrow night to play a rebuilding Samford University

squad.

The Bulldogs have only won about half a dozen games so far, but then again, their competition has been of very high caliber.

The only time Austin Peay has ever played Samford was last year. The Governors won 85-73, are 6-1 scoring ace Al Walker, 6-8 center Randy Morgan and 6-7 forward Stan Crawford.

Reynolds taps Buck

When East Tennessee comes to town, they will feature one of the best shooters in the league in Kenny Reynolds. Reynolds, a junior college transfer, is averaging 18.5 point per game.

But Mitchell is "Mr. Consistent" for the Buccaneers. Mitchell was honorable mention All-OVC last season and this year Mitchell's play has shown the same consistency. He is averaging around 12 points and eight rebounds per game.

Tech's big gam

Tech's Eagles will bring two of the league's top scorers in guard

Jim Clements and forward Frank Jones. Going into last weekend's action, the duo had both scored 333 points in 18 games, an average of 18.5.

Howard Miller mans the boards for TTU. The big senior is

averaging almost 11 recoveries a game.

Both teams have proven they can win on the road. On the opening weekend of the year, both teams played Western Kentucky in Bowling Green and

both teams came away with victories.

Fly is the star of the show

Austin Peay bombs Eastern

Austin Peay State University head Coach Lake Kelly said, "It was one we had to have."

So his Governors went out and took "it," a 100-41 victory over Eastern Kentucky in Richmond before 5,700 fans and a regional television audience Saturday afternoon.

For Kelly and the Govs, it had to be one of the most satisfying wins of the year. After all, Eastern rolled into the Red Barn in Clarksville Jan. 14 a decided underdog and upset Austin Peay 71-64, a fact that has noticeably bothered Kelly.

The game appeared it might be a tough one for the Govs in the early going. Eastern's Colonels sported to a 7-4 lead and trailed only by four, 17-13, with 12:33 remaining in first half.

Then, mostly behind the efforts of Fly Williams and Ralph Garner, Austin Peay zipped in front of EKV 29-19 with 7:30 showing and increased the margin to 30 points, 41-21, with 2:41 left.

The Govs led by 32 at 80-48 with 10:28 and for all practical purposes, the game was over.

Fly Williams had what he termed, "a good day." Williams lived up to all the pregame ballyhoo of area newspapers and TV stations hitting follow-ups, layups, turn-around jumpers and long bombers to score 35 points. He also grabbed nine rebounds and handed out five assists.

Percy Howard, who both Kelly and EKV head coach Bob Mulachy said might have been the difference between the Jan. 14 meeting and Saturday's game, dumped in 13 points, all coming in first half.

Danny Odums and Ralph Garner bagged 12 while Joe Johnson added 10. Robert Turner the 6-1 guard, had eight points and an astounding 13 rebounds.

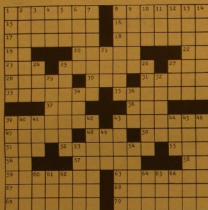

Blacks take 2,000 books from Rutgers University

(CPS)—The way to a University's heart is through its libraries or as seems to think protesting Blacks at Rutgers University in New Brunswick, New Jersey.

The group is pressing the University administration to meet a list of 43 demands calling for improvements in health services and student life issued during a 12-hour takeover of the deans office at the university's

Livingston College November 5.

On Wednesday, November 14 a group of about 50 Black students began what has come to be known as a "check-out" of books at the small Livingston Library. Taking advantage of library rules which allow any number of books to be charged by a student, the blacks took out stacks of ten to fifteen books each and brought them to their rooms. The students then returned to the library for more.

Within two hours 700 books had been removed. Two thousand books had been taken out from the 4,700 volume library by that Friday.

The action has since spread to other parts of the University as well. The entire political science section of the main library was checked out that Friday. At least 200 books have been similarly removed from the university's medical library.



Magazine pages contain lead

(CPS-ZNS)—Caution: Time Newsweek and other glossy magazines may be highly dangerous to children.

This is the finding of the Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station, which studied the results of children—not reading—but chewing up the pages of magazines.

The researchers discovered the colored pages of glossy magazines contained high levels of lead—and that a habit of chewing on the pages could be harmful, or even fatal.

According to the study, children who chew just four square inches of a color magazine each day are receiving a toxic dose of lead. The study further found that the most toxic color to chew on was yellow, followed in second place by red.

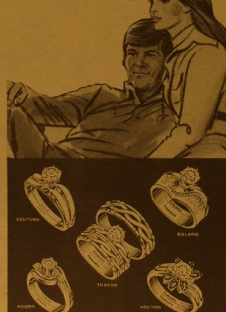
