

There will be fond memories to reflect on — lying in the grass on an autumn day, free and not so free concerts, and important afternoons spent trying to find someone to spend that important evening with.










There are no easy parts, and the paths change from year to year, but when it's all over one can feel a sense of pride in saying that he registered and lived.













The Fantasticks


night must fall






Laurel Wreath Bowl








summer




black history week

A view on educational intent

YOU MAY have read a recent letter in *The Tennessean* congratulating several colleges for the outstanding student representatives that they sent to an inter-collegiate synod that was held last month. The implication was that the schools were responsible for the outstanding performances delivered by these few exceptional scholars.

I really resented the self-congratulatory tone of the piece written by a prof thought I'd write a few thoughts on the subject.

I see any individual's ability with education most profound sense process rather than performance; as an private experience, upon, but not restricted particular medium for its genesis.

We are mystified--even repelled--by the meditative passivity of older societies like the Indian and Far Eastern and cite our innumerable con-

tributions to the society's ideal form, create a pretty depressing image of the future for the intellectual who expects something more than sympathy for his creative sensibilities.

It is unfortunate that the schools rest between two such opposite influences. Society inspires them, and the students and academics try to reinforce them, the result being that they are divided along an imaginary rational humanistic/oracrical

prejudice toward creative reaction as opposed to creative thought. It is absurd to define intellectual superiority in the


So far the only known cure is to cram 3100 of the plagued victims into a warm gymnasium and give them a couple of hours to work it out of their system.

You will be gone, but not forgotten, for you have left a little of yourself on the campus. It might be in the form of sweat, desire or disappointment but it's there and you are gone.



It is not my intention to emphasize problems to the exclusion of achievements and hopes, rather I want to say everything significant about your university including its problems, in a concise, timely, and "like it is" manner. You have the advantage of an external view that is different from mine. Together, by sharing our views, we can also share a greater assurance that the University will serve the people of its region better and more completely.

During the past year we have come to a better understanding of our role as a "regional university." Our vice president for academic affairs has already begun the development of plans to implement our board's definition of a regional university as one that uses its resources of whatever kind to serve all the people of its region. Although most of us, traditionally, have considered the education of the 18 to 22 year-old group to be virtually our sole responsibility, we now find that services and education for all age groups is a major area for serious effort.

I am happy to remind you that our programs in these relatively new areas have been functioning in a conventional mode for some time both on-campus and as extension courses for teachers. More recently we have developed, partly on our own and partly with federal

cation programs are modest ones; consequently, it will take some years to bring these programs to a level comparable to that of our other strong programs, but with your encouragement and your help we can accomplish this task without detriment to the continued improvement of existing programs.

The University is deeply and seriously involved in a series of studies conducted by work committees appointed and charged by the area-wide University Community Planning Coordinating Committee. This group and the work committees are seeking ways to delineate problems, to find solutions, to improve functions, and to make plans for a better university of the future.

As Austin Peay State University continues to search for better ways to serve the people of its region with external assistance from our Board and internal assistance from our committees, I earnestly request that you, our alumni and friends, provide the additional assistance that can make the difference between our serving well or serving poorly.




james vinson, occupational research assistant




janet blanke, field representative





john bratcher, director of student financial aid




dr. wayne stamper, dean of the graduate school

mrs. margaret sumner, director of learning resource center











Although he did not see much action until the fourth game of the season, Henry picked up 822 yards and averaged 5.5 yards per carry. Against the University of North Alabama, Yarber gained 240 yards, an all time APSU high.

The Governors, under fourth year head coach Lake Kelly, were supposed to be rebuilding. This year, shocked by the inelegibility of stars Fly Williams and Danny Odoms due to an entrance exams mix up, the Govs were expected to be no better than mediocre. The team was a very pleasant surprise however; finishing with a 16-9 record overall, with 10 wins and 4 losses in the OVC, a good enough record for second place. One outstanding player this year was senior Percy Howard, who contributed both points and rebounds. Sophomore center Ralph Garner was the backbone of the defense and an excellent rebounder. Charlie Fishback, a junior college transfer, was outstanding guard and an excellent shooter.

Two freshmen showed great promise. Norman Jackson (younger brother of former Gov star Howard Jackson) showed quickness and good ball-handling ability, and Otis Howard (no relation to Percy) was an excellent shooting forward and good rebounder.










The Govs opened their basketball season on a promising note defeating South Alabama 94 to 92 on a last second shot by Senior forward Richard Jimmerson. The Governors then made their first appearance in the Vanderbilt Invitational Tournament. They lost to Southern Illinois in the first round, and Virginia Tech in the second. They returned home to defeat Union University 62 to 55. Traveling to Western Carolina they lost a thriller 99 to 96. The Govs then had a poor shooting game against Bellarmine, losing 67 to 55. The Governors took on national power Alabama and lost 85 to 65. This was followed by four victories, making the Gov's non-conference record, 6 wins and 5 losses.







The Governors open their conference season on the road against Eastern Kentucky. Junior guard Charlie Fishback lead the way with 28 points as the Gov's won 85 to 73. They then went to Morehead State and lost 99 to 89, despite 29 points by Fishback. The Gov's returned home and faced East Tennessee State, winning 99 to 80. Senior forward Percy Howard was a star with 22 points and 16 rebounds. Cold shooting affected the Govs as they lost their next game to Tennessee Tech 71 to 69. The unpredictable Governors had a hot night against arch-rival Western Kentucky winning 78 to 75. Charlie Fishback lead the way again with 26 points. The Govs then traveled to play another fierce rival Middle Tennessee.

They were outclassed that night losing 101 to 70. Back home against Murray State they found the going easier winning 80 to 70. The Governors were lead by Ralph Garner with 26 points, Charlie Fishback with 22, and Otis Howard a promising freshman


had 19 points in his starting role. The Governor's record at this stage was 10 wins and 8 losses overall and 4 wins and 3 losses in the OVC.











The Governors then hosted Morehead State; and in a good defensive battle won 70 to 66. Little guard Charlie Fishback had 21 points while teammate Ralph Garner contributed 13 points and nine rebounds. Eastern Kentucky then rolled into Clarksville, and the Govs won 88 to 74. Coach Kelly said that this was the best defensive game played thus far. Charlie Fishback and Percy Howard scored 20 points apiece and Ralph Garner had 19. Taking to the road the Govs played Tennessee Tech in Cookville and won 94 to 79. Senior Joe Johnson and Freshman Otis Howard each had 23 points to lead the way. Next the Govs traveled to Johnson City to play East Tennessee and barely escaped with a 90 to 89 victory. Charlie Fishback topped all scorers with 31 points. Then came one of the most exciting games of the season. Playing their last game in the Memorial Gymnasium (the Little Red Barn), the Govs knocked off conference leader Middle Tennessee 70 to 65. Once again Charlie Fishback was the leading scorer with 15 points. Percy Howard was top rebounder with 9. The Governors went to Western Kentucky. Despite 25 points by Charlie Fishback and 19 by Otis Howard, Austin Peay lost 92 to 76. The last regular season game was with Murray State, on the road. Despite erratic play, the Govs won 73 to 64. Charlie Fishback lead the attack with 20 points, and Ralph Garner contributed 17 points and 13 rebounds.







For the first time in OVC history, the conference held a post-season tournament to determine which school would represent the conference in the NCAA basketball tournament. The participants were the top four teams in the conference: Middle Tennessee, Austin Peay, Tennessee Tech, and Morehead. The tournament was held at Middle Tennessee. The Govs opened against Tennessee Tech winning 78 to 69. Charlie Fishback was high scorer with 20 points, while Otis Howard added 16. Ralph Garner and Percy Howard were the leading rebounders, with 17 and 11 respectively.

The Governors then advanced to the finals, but Middle Tennessee proved to be too strong, as the Blue Raiders won the game 89 to 75. Otis Howard led Austin Peay with 25 points, followed by Charlie Fishback with 22, and Ralph Garner with 18. The Govs ended the season in second place, in both conference action and tournament play.








TOP LEFT: Positioning himself against Indiana, Jorge Jimenez slaps a backhand.



















The women's sports program is a vital and growing part of the overall athletic picture at Austin Peay.









cheerleaders

The growth of Intramural participation has been steady. In the 73-74 season 2,562 students participated in the program, an increase over the 1972-73 year. For this year the total should be over 3,000 students participating. The largest increase has been in the Co-Rec activities.

The program was given a big boost this spring when Austin Peay sponsored the First Annual Tennessee College Spring Extramural Festival beginning on April 26. Looking back at the sports, I realized that there were a few sports items that were missed and need mentioning. These events helped change the sports outlook at the Peay and so I have included this section. I know that this isn't a complete look at the events but I felt that these had the biggest bearing on the whole curriculum.

Fly and Danny "O" Declared Ineligible



James "Fly" Williams and Danny Odoms, sophomore basketball players from New York, were declared ineligible for intercollegiate competition at Austin Peay State University. The announcement was made by APSU Athletic Director George Fisher at a press conference on the Austin Peay campus.

"The NCAA notified us that we must declare Williams and Odoms ineligible," said Fisher. "The ruling was a result of a misinterpretation by the Ohio Valley Conference office concerning the requirements for entrance as a student-athlete to OVC-member schools."

"When Fly and Danny signed the national letter-of-intent, they were permitted entrance to Austin Peay under their SAT (Scholastic Aptitude Test) which had been converted to project his ACT (American College Test) score by a conversion table designed by the conference. This was the established method of the conference as outlined in the OVC Manual."

"It was discovered, however, that the conference was in error by allowing this method of entrance for student-athletes and has been incorrect since April 28, 1969. At that time, the NCAA established definite guidelines which, in effect, concluded that all conferences must adopt either the ACT or SAT score as the determining entrance factor and use of the conversion table should be abandoned." Odoms had been an excellent defensive and ball-handling guard. Williams was the nation's fifth leading scorer as a freshman. Last season, Williams ended in the number three spot in the country with a 27.5 average. He was named to the All-OVC team twice and was selected "Player of the Year" in the conference for the 1973-74 season.

Hamilton Heads for Kentucky

Assistant basketball coach Leonard Hamilton resigned last year, to take a similar post at the University of Kentucky. When asked if coaching is tougher at Kentucky, Hamilton replied, "In one way it is and in another it parallels the situation I had at Austin Peay." It's tough recruiting for Austin Peay and Kentucky. I guess the big difference is that when I first started recruiting for Austin Peay I had to spend 15 minutes explaining where I was from. The Kentucky name opens a lot of doors. It would be easier at Austin Peay now, however.

In fact, wherever I go and people find out that I was once an assistant coach at Austin Peay, they have heard about its program. Some of the kids I talk to say they have received material from them. Yep, if a kid knows anything about basketball, he has heard of Austin Peay and Fly Williams."

Hamilton has not yet lost sight of his goal — that of becoming the first black head coach of a major basketball power.

"I think I am a little ahead of schedule as far as my plans are concerned," he said. "And I owe a lot of that to Coach Lake Kelly. He is a guy that took me right out of college and gave me a chance. I owe him a lot."

After a stint under Kelly and having recruiting program builders for Austin Peay like Fly Williams and Danny Odoms, Hamilton was hired at Kentucky. He was the first black assistant to be hired.



"Fly" Flies With Spirit



Fly Williams, amid the same kind of controversy he had generated as a player, was declared ineligible on three different counts. He signed to play with the St. Louis Spirits of the American Basketball Association.

When asked about playing professionally, Fly replied, "It's really tough. They pound on you if you don't watch out. I'm a little guy, too. I'm skinny. But I avoid all that contact with my quickness. I've gotta outquick people."

Phillips May Be in Violation

According to a letter sent by President Morgan to NCAA and OVC officials, there is a possibility that a substitute for Noel Phillips took the Scholastic Aptitude Test in March of 1971. Phillips was to serve as the tennis coach this year.

After receiving this information from an undisclosed source, Morgan and George Fisher (APSU athletic director) initiated an investigation which revealed that a violation of NCAA and OVC regulations did take place.



Morgan and Fisher discovered that Phillips' SAT testing date was March 6, 1971. An examination of APSU records indicated that Phillips did not arrive in the United States until March 14, 1971. SAT tests are only administered in the U.S. When Fisher presented Phillips with this information, he stated that although he was scheduled to take the test, he wasn't able because of illness and his arrival in the U.S.A. was delayed for several days. He further stated that soon after his arrival he was informed by Jack Justice (APSU tennis coach at the time) that "all matters incidental to his enrollment had been taken care of." "Noel, as I can see is at no fault," said Fisher.

Phillips was relieved of his duties of coach when it became apparent to us that he was in possible violation of the NCAA mandate for student coaches. Phillips was the OVC tennis player of the year in 1973 and 1974.

Guepe Resigns Commissioner's Post




After 12 years as commissioner of the Ohio Valley Conference, Art Guepe resigned. Guepe has been the only full-time commissioner the OVC has ever had, serving in that capacity since 1963. At a special session of OVC presidents at Western Kentucky, Guepe requested that he not be considered for reappointment when his current annual appointment expires on June 30.

Guepe, former coach and athletic director at the University of Virginia and Vanderbilt, had come under criticism when 25 OVC athletes were declared ineligible by the NCAA because the league had used an outmoded method of determining entrance eligibility. However, Guepe said that this criticism had nothing to do with his resignation. "I have been in it 12 years now and I felt it was time to get out," he said.

Guepe said his job had become increasingly more difficult because, "you have to cut back a little on all the duties in order to get any of them done." Concerning his 12 years as commissioner, Guepe said, "I like to think we have come a long way during that time and I am proud of the conference that has developed."








When trying to decide who to thank first for their help I found a difficult task. So many people contributed to the outcome of this book and no matter how hard I try I will overlook someone. But the


