

Participation in extra-curricular activities helps develop more well-rounded individuals. These activities are designed to perfect the student's personality and to promote the morale of the student body.








WITH PERSONALITIES

Proudly has stood our Alma Mater, And twenty-five years have gone by.*

FROM a Normal school to a senior college with a graduate division, our college has endured growing pains to rise and become a leader of educational institutions; we know that we can be justly proud of our school.

Prior to the establishment of Austin Peay Normal School, this campus had long been the site of institutions of learning. As early as 1806, Rural Academy was established by the State Legislature. Mt. Pleasant Academy replaced the Rural Academy in 1811 and was itself superceded in 1825 by Clarksville Academy.

In 1851, the Masons took over the Clarksville Academy grounds, buildings, and equipment under the name of Montgomery Masonic College. In 1855, the Masonic institution became Stewart College, named in honor of the president of the institution, William M. Stewart. During the Civil War, the college exercises were suspended; and part of the time, the old Castle building and the campus were occupied by Federal troops. After the Civil War, however, the Presbyterians of the Southwest chose the Stewart College campus as the site of their Southwestern Presbyterian University. They accepted the grounds, buildings, and endowments from the trustees of Stewart College; and Dr. J. N. Waddel became the first Chancellor and attempted to make SPU the "Princeton of the South." In 1925, Clarksville saw Southwestern Presbyterian University move from the city's northern border to the southern border of the state.

Continuing the tradition of being a beacon to higher learning, the same campus was again made the site of a college in 1927, when the General Assembly created Austin Peay Normal School, as a junior college for the purpose of training teachers for the elementary schools of Tennessee. The institution was named in honor of Austin Peay, the fortieth governor of Tennessee and a resident of Clarksville. The City of Clarksville donated to the state the campus and buildings of Southwestern Presbyterian University which had been moved to Memphis, and the new \$300,000 school was opened for approximately one hundred and thirty students on September 23, 1929, with J. S. Ziegler as its first president. In the spring of 1930, the Diploma of Graduation from Austin Peay Normal School was awarded to the first graduating class.


President Ziegler died in office in May of the same year and was succeeded in the fall of 1930 by Dr. Philander P. Claxton, former United States Commissioner of Education. During President Claxton's administration the school was authorized by the General Assembly in the spring of 1939 to offer a third year of work and in the fall of 1941 a fourth year of instruction. During this time the institution began the task of preparing teachers for the secondary, as well as, for the elementary schools of the state. In addition, the school expanded its curricula to include general studies, pre-professional training, and vocational education.

In the spring of 1942, the Bachelor of Science degree was conferred upon the first graduating class. February 4, 1943, Austin Peay Normal School became Austin Peay State College by act of the General Assembly. In July, 1946, Dr. Claxton was retired by the State Board of Education as President-Emeritus, without portfolio; and Halbert Harvill, long-time Dean-Registrar of the college, was elected to the high position in August, 1946.

In 1951, the College was authorized to offer a curriculum leading to the Bachelor of Arts degree; and 1952, the state granted the institution the authority to establish a fifth year of advanced, professional work leading to the Master of Arts degree in Education.

These steps made Austin Peay State College the multi-purpose institution of learning that it is now. Its 1953 enrollment has grown to 1000 students, and the plant valuation has reached \$4,000,000. We are determined that it will progress further in the next quarter century and will continue to be respected by the other institutions of Tennessee.

DEDICATED IN MEMORIAM



No matter how long the freshmen remain at Austin Peay State College, they will never realize the experience which they have missed in not having known Mrs. Catherine Evans Harvill, the devoted wife of our distinguished president. Twenty-five years ago, when Halbert Harvill came to this institution as professor of history, he brought with him a person who would prove to be a source of inspiration to him, to the faculty, and to the student body.

A great Christian character, an enthusiastic worker, a leader in civic and church activities, a woman with a warmth of friendship and personality, Catherine Evans was born in Marshall County, Tennessee, January 11, 1903. Educated at Martin College, Pulaski, Tennessee, she became Mrs. Halbert Harvill April 21, 1925, and took her place beside her husband at APSC in 1929. Loved by all, Catherine E. Harvill took the college to her heart; its triumphs she heralded, and for its continued progress she tirelessly labored.

No more gracious First Lady could have inhabited the white house which serves as the President's residence; its doors were open to the Student Wives, of which she was the sponsor, the faculty, distinguished visitors of the college, and the students to whom she sympathetically listened.

In the summer of 1953, Mrs. Harvill succumbed to an enduring illness. January 21, 1954, the embers of the guiding light of our president and institution slowly burned out, but the fire of her memory burns brightly as a constant inspiration to the institution for which she so ably strove—Austin Peay State College.

Because of her life and her devotion and services to our college, the staff of the 1954 FAREWELL AND HAIL wishes to pay its highest tribute to Mrs. Catherine Evans Harvill. To her living memory the twenty-fifth anniversary edition of the FAREWELL AND HAIL is respectfully dedicated.

The Claxton Chapter of the Future Teachers of America, the first professional organization of its type to be established in Tennessee, became affiliated with the National Education Association on December 7, 1939. The FTA movement was inaugurated in connection with the Horace Mann Centennial and the Centennial of Teacher Education 1937-39, and the first college chapters were organized in the spring of 1939.

To promote greater interest in the educational field is the primary goal of the FTA. This association, designed to give to the students enrolled in the elementary or secondary education curricula practical experience in working together in a democratic way, seeks to familiarize prospective teachers with the history, ethics, and program of the organized teaching profession.

In September, members of the Claxton FTA sponsored the Freshman Coke Party, welcoming newcomers to this institution. At Christmas the student body was again reminded of the holiday season by the annual Christmas Tree Lighting at the nativity scene. Book Week was turned into a successful financial venture. Where you see active clubs on the AP campus, there you will see the Claxton FTA in full swing.

"Eager to promote a closer bond among students of Education and to enter into more intimate fellowship with those dedicated to the cause of teaching as a profession, for which specialized preparation is deemed imperative, the members of the Illinois Education Club, established at the University of Illinois in 1909, resolved to sponsor the founding of a national society with local chapters similar to its own organization, thereby aiming to foster high standards of preparation for teaching and to invite into bonds of fellowship those who have attained excellence of scholarship and distinction of achievement as students and servants of Education.

"Successful in its endeavor, the Illinois Education Club was re-organized on March 8, 1911, and incorporated June 8, 1911, under the laws of the state of Illinois as the honorary educational fraternity, Kappa Delta Pi. In 1932, this title was changed to Kappa Delta Pi, an Honor Society in Education." This is the preamble to the constitution of the Kappa Delta Pi, a national honorary society which was established at Austin Peay State College in 1953.







These nine seniors join that group of notable persons who, since 1948, have been recognized in "Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges" at Austin Peay. Having distinguished themselves as intellectual and social leaders in campus life, they have been selected by the faculty and administration to fulfill this position.

To qualify, a student must have held at least one elective office for one year in some type of college organization recognized by the Administration; or must have been active in at least two organizations of the College for at least one year; or must have received one superlative or annual recognition voted by the students, instead of one year's active membership in a club, as described above; or must have received an award through some college organization recognized by the school.

The publication of "Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges" was originated in 1934 with the idea of creating one national basis of recognition for college students.

Students become members without cost, and a certificate of recognition is awarded to them by the organization. In addition to the certificate of recognition, a placement service, conducted for the benefit of senior and graduate members, is available. The right to purchase and wear the key emblem of the organization is also presented to the participants.

Benton Adkins, president of the Methodist Student Movement, has combined a chemistry and biology major in preparation for Vanderbilt's medical school, where he will begin his studies in the fall. An active student, Benton has served on the FAREWELL AND HAIL staff for four years as co-sports editor and on the *All State* staff for his first two years as sports editor. His membership in the Men's Glee Club, Student Ministerial Association, and Student Council, and his service to the institution have awarded him membership in "Who's Who."

Tom Bayham, Jr., a mathematics major, is president of the Future Teachers of America. Galois Club has been fortunate to have Tom as one of its ardent supporters for the last three years; he served as vice president of the group in his junior year. Kenneth Cooper, who joined the ranks in 1951, is the maestro of the charging linemen. He came from the Baltimore Colts.


Coach Leon Sandifer, returning from a leave of absence, rounds out the list of athletic directors.

SEASON'S RECORD

The big "Red and White" of Austin Peay opened the 1953 season with a 21-13 victory over East Tennessee State College at Johnson City in a driving rainstorm. Back home at Clarksville they whalloped Henderson State for a 34-6 opening home game.

The trip to Florence, Alabama, brought slight disappointment as the Florence State men eked out a 14-13 advantage. Coach Aaron's men bounced back home to swamp the Delta State eleven 20-0 for their third win, and marched over Jacksonville State 47-16 the following week.

Carson-Newman slightly clogged homecoming happiness as they husseled a four point edge in beating A.P., 18-14. South Eastern Missouri beat the Governors 19-6, and Murray State won the final game of the 1953 Governor Football Season with a score of 33-13.

A HISTORY OF FOOTBALL AT AUSTIN PEAY

THE beginning of the sports program in those years which have become familiar to us as the depression years must of necessity have been a struggle. At that time the institution was a two-year teacher training Normal School. Not until 1939 was a third year granted by the legislature; and two years later, in the fall of 1941, Austin Peay State College became a full four-year institution for higher learning.

Some of the earliest football data show that the team of 1930 had a record of 3 wins, 4 losses, and 1 tie. That year Austin Peay was coached by Mr. Scott Alden, and his team met such teams as: Vanderbilt Frosh, Lambuth College, Murray State Frosh, U.T. Junior College, Tennessee Polytechnic Institute Frosh, Murfreesboro State Frosh, and Cumberland University.

In 1933 intercollegiate football was abandoned at Austin Peay Normal School, due to insufficient funds for such activities. Football was discontinued for several trying years until the fall of 1936, when Mr. Fred T. Brown was named Director of Athletics and Head Coach of the newly formed team which adapted the name of Austin Peay Normal School *Terrors*. The new team won 2, lost 5, and tied 0.

The team of '37 gave the fans some real entertainment and opened a new brand of football to Clarksville by 2 wins, and 6 losses in very closely contested games which were frequently played against highly rated teams.

The team of 1938 went by the title of *Governors*, a name that has stuck and been upheld by all subsequent teams. The team of '38 won 3, lost 5, and tied 1, defeating such teams as South Illinois, Martin College, and U.T. Junior College by respectable margins.

In 1939 the *Governors* scored 89 points to the opposition's 98, as the *Red and White* won 4 and lost 5. By this time Austin Peay was on the map as a fine contender of sports.

Football was discontinued during the war years, and the *Red and White* was curtailed for that period. Emerging with growing pains from the expansion program of becoming a four-year college, the *Governors* started off in 1946 under the direction of Coach David B. Aaron, by winning 5, and losing 4 against such teams as Cumberland University, Western Kentucky State, M.T.S.C., U.T. Junior College, Bethel College, and Vanderbilt Reserve. The Governor team racked up a total of 141 points to the opponents' 188.

In 1947 the *Governors* broke even, winning 3, losing 3, and tying 1. Austin Peay was on the gridiron band wagon again.

The 1948 squad went to war with its opponents and won 3 and lost 2 while it was gathering 258 points against 116 of the opponents.

Once again in 1949 the *Governors* rolled over eight teams while bowing to only two. They ran up a total of 236 points and suffered only 83 at the hands of the opposition which were Troy State, Jacksonville State, Union University, Athens State College, Arkansas A & M, Maryville College, and the Camp Campbell "Angels." The days of "breather" games were over!

A record of 5 wins, 2 losses, and 1 tie was mustered by the team of 1950, as they scored 160 points to their foes' 75. L. E. Oakley was elected to the first team on the *Little All-American* team, and Phil Krug received honorable mention. Six APSC griders were voted *All V.S.A.C.* that year.

A lag of winning ways hit APSC in 1951, and the team was able to muster only a single win and one tie, while losing 8.

The team of 1952 won 7, lost 2, and tied 1 for one of the best seasons witnessed at ole APSC, as they crushed such teams as Arkansas A & M, Delta State, Union University, Jacksonville State, Troy State, and Milliken.



On the way of compiling a season's record of four wins and four defeats, the *Governors* received 41 kicks and returned them 759 yards, averaging 18 yards per try. The *Governors* were forced to punt 46 times; their opposition returned the boots 603 yards for an average of 13 yards per try.

Part of the yardage gained on kicks was lost in the original distance of the boots, for in this department the opposition held a slight edge. Our opposition averaged 42 yards for 26 kickoffs and 36 yards for 53 punts while we averaged 41 yards for 33 kickoffs and 34 yards for 43 punts.

For all the thrills you have given us and all the memories you have left with us, we wish to say "thank you," men of the 1953 football squad.



Coach Aaron met the 1953-54 basketball season with a squad containing only four members from the previous year's cage crew. The above situation was brought about when the army stepped in to claim the services of Tom Morgan and Jackie Hunt, just prior to the opening of the season. The four holdovers were Earl Chance, Donnie Holmes, Freddie Harrison, and Gene Trotter. Bill Craig, a former Austin Peay player, returned from military service to add a fifth man with experience in the Aaron school to the squad. Men seeing their first action in *Governor* uniforms were Dickie Elliott, John Rendek, Jim Cummings, Glen Britt, Ken West, and Eddie Evans.

With so many newcomers to the squad it was only natural that the boys could not work nearly so well as a unit during the first games as they did later in the year after they had learned the peculiarities of their team-mates. All these boys are expected back next year, and we should be able to expect a fine season.

The season's record for the *Governors* showed more victories than defeats. Possessed with a team short in experience, APSC can only attribute its final record to tremendous hustle and squad morale which were evident in abundance at most any *Governor* games.

Leading the scoring parade for the *Governors* on a points per game level was Jim Cummings, a transfer from Vanderbilt who was ineligible in VSAC games, with a 22.08 average. Earl Chance and Dickie Elliott tied for the total points scored lead with 316 each.
