

President Harvill has been at Austin Peay for thirty two years. Beginning in 1929 as an instructor in history, he later assumed the position of Dean-Registrar and in August 1946 was elected president of the college. From that time to the present this institution of higher learning has undergone a change which has expanded tremendously its facilities and reconstructed its curriculum to the extent of giving rise to Bachelor of Arts Degrees and Master of Arts Degrees in Education. Many old landmarks have fallen and new buildings have taken their place during this era. The McCord Hall Science Building, Catherine Harvill Cafeteria, the Browning Administration Building, the Ellington Hall Men's Dormitory, McReynolds Hall, the Memorial Health and Physical Education Building, the Frank G. Clement Building, and more recently the Ernest C. Ball housing project for married couples, the Halbert Harvill Women's Dormitory, and the Jack Miller dormitory for men are results of this dynamic program. These exemplify the breadth of vision and the remarkable capabilities of this man. Students and faculty members alike have been inspired to emulate his example of deep-seated conviction, unswerving determination, refinement, leadership, and accomplishment.



What

Austin Peay State College, named in honor of Governor Austin Peay, was created by Act of the General Assembly of 1927 as Austin Peay Normal School. It was a junior college for the special purpose of training teachers for the elementary schools of Tennessee. On February 4, 1943, the name of the School was changed to Austin Peay State College; in 1951 the College was authorized to offer a curriculum leading to the Bachelor of Arts degree, and in 1952 was authorized to establish a fifth year of advanced professional work leading to the Master of Arts degree in Education.



The end product of a college education is considered by most to be the acquisition of a reasonable amount of knowledge. This knowledge comes via various routes during a college career, but the prime source seems inevitably to be the classroom.

Classes at Austin Peay are of an informal and informative nature. Trained and skilled professors leave little to be desired in their teaching for each and every student is of concern if he or she is truly interested in the education which is undertaken. The classrooms are well equipped and offer the best facilities to be found anywhere. Clean, up-to-date equipment in the laboratories, and attractive, comfortable classrooms go a long way in making for better learning situations. Though the importance of good laboratories and excellent classrooms to learning is undeniable, the item of chief importance is that of mutual understanding between teacher and student. Probably nowhere else is there a more desirable situation than at Austin Peay. Not infrequently do the instructors take extra time with individual students who have difficulty with certain aspects of their studies.

The informality achieved in the classroom is to a great extent due to the relative smallness of the classes. Seldom does a class consist of more than forty students with the average being much less. The informality, adequate facilities, and close student-teacher relationship are desirable features of class situations at this college.







To think of Dr. Grise is to remember an English professor at Austin Peay State College. But to have been acquainted with him is to have known a colorful personality and a stimulating teacher.

His engaging smile, his informal classroom attitude, his practical viewpoint in dealing with everyday problems, his numerous tales of the Kentucky he loved so well, his folksongs with their haunting strains, his guitar and auto-harp, his zest for living, and his willingness to share his talents and his hospitality both on the campus and at his "84 Acres"—all these remembrances will keep Dr. Grise in the lives of those who knew him.

His death in an automobile accident on December 30, 1960, created a void at the college that will not soon be filled. But those of us here are thankful for the privilege we had of calling him teacher and friend.

This year the FAREWELL AND HAIL staff is proud to include in the Superlative section the Laurel Wreath Society.





The Governors will continue to press forward and look upon the events of the past season not as an indication of things to come but merely as trying grounds for greater achievements.



A fourth quarter touchdown, set up by a recovered Austin Peay fumble, gave the Blue Raiders of Middle Tennessee the edge, 6-0, in a game that had all the outward appearances of ending in a stalemate.

The Governors displayed a potent defense which contained the M.T.S.C. attack for three full quarters until sophomore halfback Danny Neal scored on an 18-yard end run in the fourth quarter. Tackle Joe Wiggins then missed the conversion.

The score was the second lowest the Raiders had been held to in their previous 42 games, who last season were ranked number 1 in most small-college polls.

The Governors came close to notching their first win of the 1960 season but were turned back 7-0 by a late fourth quarter score. An Austin Peay fumble on their own 22-yard line set up the lone tally.

Bright spots in the Austin Peay offensive attack were the passing of Moe Burlison and some brilliant runs by halfback Ronnie Dollar. Six of Burlison's nine completed passes were caught by A.P.S.C.'s glue-fingered end, Jack Wallace.

Guards Bud Coley and Jack Bushovsky played exceptional defensive ball as the C-N running game was comparatively bottled up inside.

Austin Peay lost its third straight game in the final period against UT Martin Branch, 13-7.

A 54 yard desperation pass from quarterback Vernon Prather to halfback John Brodie in the last 35 seconds of play gave the Vols their victory.


U.T.M.B. tallied first in the game in the opening quarter but the Govs came back in the second quarter to knot it up on a one-yard dive by halfback Fred Alexander. Freshman Ralph Grant added the conversion.

On the Gov's successful touchdown drive, fullback Leroy Overstreet's diving smashes carried the Governors inside the U.T.M.B. five-yard line where Alexander's thrust took AP to their first touchdown of the 1960 season.

A hapless Austin Peay eleven held the Hilltoppers of Western Kentucky to a 6-0 lead at intermission before Western unlimbered its passing weapons in the second half to tally 28 points in the final two stanzas.

The sweltering heat took its toll from the under-manned Austin Peay squad in the last two periods and broke open a game that appeared headed for a re-run of the Gov's first three outings.

Austin Peay scored in the second half with a 37-yard pass from quarterback Cobb Parker to end Jack Wallace eating up most of a 58-yard drive. Fullback Leroy Overstreet scored the touchdown.

Austin Peay threw off the shackles of defeat and upset heavily-favored Jacksonville State 14-8 for the Governor's first football win in five starts.

The Govs came out passing in the second quarter and climaxed the drive with a five-yard pass from quarterback Richard Moore to end, Jack Wallace. Ralph Grant then converted for the Govs.

In the same frame Jax State got control of the game on an Austin Peay fumble on the Gov's 19. Jacksonville's quarterback, Eugene Griep scored the touchdown and ran his own two-points extra.

Jax State returned the fumble courtesy in the final period when an AP end, Rupert Baker, recovered the ball on the Gamecock's 26.

On the next play, halfback Ronnie McKinney went the distance to score. Ralph Grant added the extra point.

Eastern Kentucky, along with a three quarter offensive lapse by Austin Peay, added up to a 27 to 13 victory for Eastern in the Governor's Homecoming game.

Austin Peay held the Maroons scoreless until the last 37 seconds of the first half when Eastern made a touchdown, resulting from a pass interference penalty inflicted upon Austin Peay.

The Maroons added 14 points in the third period and 6 more in the fourth quarter, all on long drives.

Austin Peay then came alive with 10 minutes left in the game. Quarterback Cobb Parker threw a 51-yard aerial to end Jack Wallace to make it 27-7. Parker then consumed 60 yards in the air with three consecutive first down passes, two to Wallace and one to halfback Fred Alexander.

Back Nick Nichols carried it over from the one yard line for Austin Peay's last score of the game.

Lee Roy Overstreet, a former Southern Golden Gloves Champion, punched Troy State silly with two long touchdown jaunts in a 13-7 Austin Peay football victory.

Overstreet ripped straight up the middle just after intermission, steamrolling over several defenders enroute to the goal line. Ralph Gant then booted the extra point.

The margin was widened in the final quarter when Overstreet repeated his stint, this time for 27 yards.

Troy's touchdown was set up by a recovered fumble at the Governor 32. Charles Aplin capped a drive from there by going over at the one.

The Governor defensive unit was brilliantly led by center Joe Cincotta and tackles Howard Suiter and Walt Davie.

Austin Peay racked up a record 18 first downs against the Buccaneers but were unable to cope with a 21-point output by East Tennessee in the fourth quarter.

In the fatal fourth, after three quarters of good playing from the fired-up Governors, a young Austin Peay drive was nipped on the Governor's 34 when a Buccaneer tackle intercepted one of quarterback Cobb Parker's bullet passes. This appeared to be the turning point, after which the Governors seemed to lose some of their zip.

The Governor scores came on an 8 yard run by halfback Glen Glover and a 22-yard canter around end by freshman Ronnie Dollar. Ralph Grant added both extra points.

Austin Peay and Florence State threw caution, defense and the football to the wind in a spine-tingling game that gave the visiting Lions the decision 35-34 when Austin Peay failed on a two-point conversion attempt.

Austin Peay finished in a swirl of fourth quarter touchdowns and with 28 seconds left in the game moved to within one point of a tie on a two-yard pass from quarterback Richard Moore to end Jack Wallace. A pass to Lee Roy Overstreet in the end zone for the two-point play was intercepted and victory went out the window.

Moore threw four touchdown passes and Overstreet collected the only other marker. Ralph Grant was 4 for 4 in the conversion department.

A Governor pass batted down by Ft. Campbell, with 1:37 left in the Annual Charity Bowl game, gave the Eagles a 14-13 victory.

The pass came on an attempted extra point, after the Govs had pulled to within one point on a dazzling 72-yard pass play for a touchdown from Richard Moore to Bobby Baumgartner.

The charity battle started off at a fast and furious pace with both clubs scoring quick touchdowns. A 72 yard punt return by the Eagle's Olin Winfreys put Ft. Campbell ahead at the half and marked the end of the game's scoring until Baumgartner's last quarter snag of a Moore touchdown aerial.

The Gov's other touchdown was also scored on a Moore pass to Austin Peay's sensational freshman end, Jack Wallace, who was also the top season scorer. Ralph Grant was good for the one-pointer after Wallace's score.

In the following days Austin Peay suffered through one of its worst losing streaks. After the U.T.M.B. game we lost another one point decision to Georgetown College and then another overtime defeat to Middle Tennessee State. Naturally these setbacks caused some mental letdown by the players and students and also it was exam time. Before long the Christmas break was over and the wars continued on the hardwood on December 29th and 30th. This was the first annual Queen City Invitational Tournament. In the opening round we ran into a tough Florence State five that handed us our fourth consecutive defeat. We managed to snap that losing streak the next night with a win over Delta State that gave us third place honors in the tourney.

1961 came in hard and fast and we tipped to four quick wins before stumbling to Carson-Newman at Jefferson City, in another one of those—!)?)(!—overtime games!! The Govs rebounded quickly though, and tore into the "Torch Game" with David Lipscomb with a chance to take over full possession of the V.S.A.C. Western division lead. Aaron's boys showed their appreciation to the fans and student body for supporting them, by a thrilling 69-68 crucial win! This was one of the key points in the success of the team. The Govs then streaked to the finish line by winning six of their last seven games. In the process of blazing through their remaining games, many heroes were born, many records were broken and many fans were thrilled! Jim Beshears set a new individual scoring record against Bethel by getting forty-three. The previous high was held by Tom Morgan with 38. Also, Austin Peay gained revenge against East Tennessee State and fabulous Tom Chiltons. Another mark of revenge was gained against Kentucky Wesleyan as the big red scored a climaxing victory over the Panthers, 81-78.

The V.S.A.C. Tournament must have caught Aaron's boys looking ahead to the NCAA because they were caught flat-footed in the finals and lost to David Lipscomb.

When the long awaited NCAA Regional did finally arrive, the boys were ready. They downed Chattanooga in the semis and knocked off Belmont Abbey to win the regional and advance to the National Finals at Evansville, Indiana. It was here in the first round and against a good Mount Saint Mary's College team that seven seniors played their last game for Austin Peay. They were: Bradley, Camp, Davis, Henderson, Overton, Phillips, and Stewart.

Aside from the just mentioned seniors the 1960-61 team was greatly supported by Beshears, Celusta, Darrah, Briggeman, and Sugg.

The accomplishments of the team were numerous: VSAC Champions for the fifth straight year; a third place finish in the Queen City Invitational Tournament; Second Place in the VSAC Tournament; winner of the NCAA Regional Tournament for small colleges, and played in the opening round of the NCAA small college finals, being one of only eight in the nation to attend.

Congratulations to a great basketball team, a great coach, and a great student body!!





Under the able direction of George Fisher and Leon Garrett the Governors copped their first VSAC track crown ever in the 1960 season.

After a somewhat disheartening performance in their first two meets the Gov thinlegs rallied their efforts and came on to win the next two contests before they fell twice again at the hands of powerful Murray State College and Middle Tennessee State College. Fisher and Garrett then took their spirited group through the last three meets with victories in two of them.

Carrying a mediocre record into the conference meet the Governors were rated as anything but a strong contender for the championship. But a determined and gallant crew, led by Tom Phillips in the broad jump and the high jump, Charlie "Red" Reinhart in the high and low hurdles, Jim Henderson and Fred Overton in the middle distance runs, and Bobby Winders in the mile and two-mile runs, paid little attention to their "dark horse" ranking and performed like champions to sweep Austin Peay to the VSAC track title, the first in the school's history.


1961 Tennis




This fine group, directed by Dr. Aaron Schmidt, exhibits the versatility of the music department of Austin Peay. The

Governettes And . . .










P. E. Majors Club

Each spring the band presents a special assembly program and makes a tour of Tennessee and Kentucky high schools and presents assembly programs for their student bodies.



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
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... and so Farewell and Hail
