Triumph Followed by Defeat For Governors' Last Two Games

The past two weeks of football for the Jacksonville State has had its bright spots and also its gloomy spots, the latter of the two helping to add gray hair to the coaching staff.

The homecoming win over Jacksonville State was the bright spot, but the loss to Troy State brings forth a picture which the Governor coaching staff had rather not discuss.

Last year the Governors outplayed a lot of teams only to come out on the wrong end of the score. The Jacksonville State clash brought about a welcome turn of events.

The Gova had their backs to the wall most of the first half with only a strong and determined defense keeping the Gamecocks from scoring two touchdowns.

The Gova had played so much defense the first half that it took them till late in the third quarter to get their offense rolling and score the only touchdown of the game.

Noel Walker was the big gun in the scoring drive making most of the yardage on eight runs which covered 31 yards. Walker also hauled in a 13 yard pass which set the Gova in scoring position on the Gamecocks 11 yard line. After two running plays and a first down Walker plowed over from the one yard line to wrap up the ball game.

After viewing the game Coach Cooper singled out Leon Vaughn and Bucky Brown for their work in the two goal line stands.

The loss to Troy State the following week came as quite a surprise to everyone. The week be-

fore Jacksonville played the Gova they had soundly beaten Troy by a score of 27 to 13 and perhaps the win over Jacksonville left the Gova a bit over confident.

The game started off with the Gova scoring the first time they got possession of the ball. Walker hauled in a pass from Cunningham Crow and raced 39 yards for the first of two Governor touchdowns. That ended scoring in the first quarter for either side but in the second quarter the Red Wave began to move.

Nothing spectacular highlighted the Troy scoring drives but they were picking up short yardage and getting those first downs, gradually moving the ball toward the Governor goal line.

Jack Hix, a 200 pound fullback who had played a B-Town on Wednesday before the Saturday clash, was the big gun for the Red Wave making most of the yardage and scoring one of the two touchdowns. After Troy scored their two touchdowns in the second quarter the Gova held them pretty well in check and they never threatened again.

The Gova dominated the offensive efforts for either club in the second half rolling up 223 total yards and scoring the only other td. That marker came after Dave Wagner hauled in a pass from Crow which covered 44 yards and a first down on the Red Wave five yard line. Al Corso skirted around right end to get the needed yardage for the score. Walker attempted for the extra point was partially blocked and the score wound up 14 to 13 with the Troy Red Wave victorious.

to the home economics graduate who wishes to continue her training in specialized areas. Advanced degrees are required for college and university positions.
