STUDENT LIFE is a day-to-day race. Can a student live through the student life race and still remain alive?






ATHLETICS is a competitive race. Can a student live through the athletic race and still remain whole?

A handshake, finding the numbered seat, plotting strategy, a timeout, a race to first base and the beginning of a play are parts of the athletic whole.








ORGANIZATIONS are systematized races. Can a student live through the organization race and still remain an individual?


REGISTRATION CONFUSION

The victory race started and ended ablaze. An urban renewal house was used for the bonfire, and the outstanding entry award-winning freshman float caught afire.








The Swinging Medallions, an Atlanta, Ga.-based rock group, produced the sounds for the student homecoming dance.





Students on varying work programs provided numerous services, whether in the recreation area of the University Center, Computer Center, post office or bookstore.


Noon halted the activities for a brief meal, and then the work continued until another day was completed. Late at night the worker folded his hands and closed his mind until another day.



An explanation of Greek Night, a lady adviser to a frat, open rush, and a fund-raising project highlighted several activities.





Fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the university is under the control of the State Board of Education. Organized as the college of arts and sciences, the college of education, the school of business and economics, the graduate school and the division of applied arts and sciences, the university offers seven degrees—three undergraduate and four graduate.

Higher education development flourishes under direction of Ellington, state board

Higher education growth in Tennessee has been greatly encouraged and aided by the efforts of Gov. Buford Ellington and the state board of education. Gov. Ellington is an ex-officio member of the board, which is the governing body of Austin Peay State University.

The board serves over five other regional state universities, the state's community colleges, regional technical institutes, area vocational schools and is the policy-making

and regulatory board for the public school system of Tennessee.

Interest by the state administration has been evidenced by sponsorship of progressive academic programs and the addition and improvement of facilities.

Progressive Dr. Joe Morgan boosts university expansion



Unprecedented growth has taken place since Dr. Joe Morgan came in 1963 as the fourth president of APSU. He quickly developed an orderly expansion plan, which has affected all areas of university life.

Since his arrival, total enrollment has increased from 2,228 to 3,444, full-time teaching faculty from 89 to 138 and professional staff from 13 to 20.




Gentry assumes position as dean of admissions



Numerous advancements made in geography-geology studies

Independent study for students was provided on a larger scale this year by the department of geography and geology. 


ematics from the National Science Foundation for the support of two summer programs—one for 30 high school seniors with superior academic ability, and the other for 25 junior high school mathematics teachers.


Authority on history of religions speaks to philosophy department

Physics department turns efforts to establishing service center for high school science teachers




Funding of a \$33,050 grant to the physics department launched the basic development work for a service center for teachers of high school science and mathematics. The funds, secured under the grant from the National Science Foundation, now total \$193,600. Most of the funds, however, support "Physics: The Program for Teachers," a unique program which began last year.

Ultimately, the center will involve the departments of biology, chemistry, education, geography-geology, mathematics and physics, and will act as a coordinating agency for the pre-service science and mathematics programs of the university, and for in-service programs for some 20 school systems in the general vicinity of the university.


The course relied chiefly on reading, discussion and practical projects to achieve its objectives.


Department of speech sponsors debate squad and AP Playhouse

Year filled with changes in personnel for members of accounting department


Several personnel changes took place during the year in the department of accounting. Foremost, J F Burney returned with a doctor of philosophy degree from the University of Alabama, and was named

Jerry L. Weatherspoon fulfilled his military obligation during the fall and winter; he returned at the outset of the spring quarter.






Acceptance of the Marketing Club as a chartered member of the American Marketing Association was a highlight of the marketing department, which sponsors the collegiate group.







Lack of qualified instructors forces university to postpone nurse education courses indefinitely






Procedure of student ID's to check out books greatly helps efficiency of university library staff

Implementation of the use of the student identification card system in order to borrow books greatly aided the university library. Books were checked out by the machine recording the student's name, identification number and the book due date.





Govs' disappointing year on gridiron results in 2-7-1 mark

Although several outstanding individual performances were turned in, the ventures of the 1969 APSU football Governors turned out to be little better than disappointing. With the loss of only six performers from the year before and a fine incoming group of freshman players, the Gov gridders looked for a resourceful season, but ended up struggling to a 2-7-1 mark over-all and a 2-5 record in Ohio Valley Conference play.

After the first three games of the season, the gridders of head coach Bill Dupes had run the gauntlet of football fortunes, having recorded a one-point loss, a tie and a one-point victory. From there, Lady Luck seemed to frown on the Governors, as they could manage but one more triumph—that over archrival Middle Tennessee State—before concluding the season with a near upset win over bowl-bound East Tennessee.





Even in the midst of a dismal season, however, the APSU football contingent assaulted the record books, establishing a total of 50 new standards, including one NCAA mark, 11 OVC records and 38 APSU marks. Leading the attack was sure-handed junior end Harold (Red) Roberts—perhaps the finest pass receiver in the history of the conference—who personally accounted for 17 of the new records. Roberts now owns seven OVC marks, 12 APSU records and one NCAA standard in pass receiving.

Senior quarterback Dennis Dyer etched his name in the record book nine times, while freshman signal-caller John Kok, manning the quarterback slot for only two and one-half games, added his feats in five different categories. Others breaking records included versatile Ronnie Fuqua and punter Jim Hardie.


terback Dennis Dyer to split end Harold (Red) Roberts in the first quarter.

A missed extra point, two fumbles in Martin territory, two fruitless field goals attempts and five pass interceptions proved to be more miscues than the Govs could overcome.







Stingy Colonel defense holds Govs off as EKU wins 29-10







After failing in their second attempt for the two-point conversion, the Govs recovered their own on-side kick on the ensuing kickoff, but were unable to capitalize on the situation.






Eagles' Schreiber deflates Gov defense in 56-20 loss



Flatt's late-game fumble turns victory into bitter 14-12 defeat by Buccaneers






Freshman gridiron squad manages single victory against trio of losses








Governors pile up 104 points per game in winning 3 of 4 non-conference warmups before home fans




Overtime victory over Morehead snaps loss streak






Road losses come fast and furious for Governors






Small schools deal team humbling home setbacks







Wright-less Govs test WKU before packed APSU house




Grateful school retires Wright's No. 30 in appreciation of stellar senior's efforts






Pack's top scoring leads freshman outfit to 10-11 mark







Golfers claim 9-1-1 record, best in university's history




Posting a 9-1-1 dual match record, best in the school's history, APSU's 1969 golf contingent also placed high in prestigious tournaments.


APSU also defeated seven non-conference opponents to run their consecutive string to 27.


Fraser leads tennis squad to respectable 7-7 showing








Organization of Program Board undertaken by student Senate






Phi Alpha Theta prospectives initiated during annual banquet






Skydiving students engage in regular routine of parachuting

Choir performs opera; Chamber Singers give spring concert


