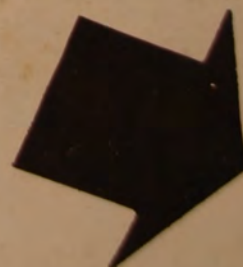

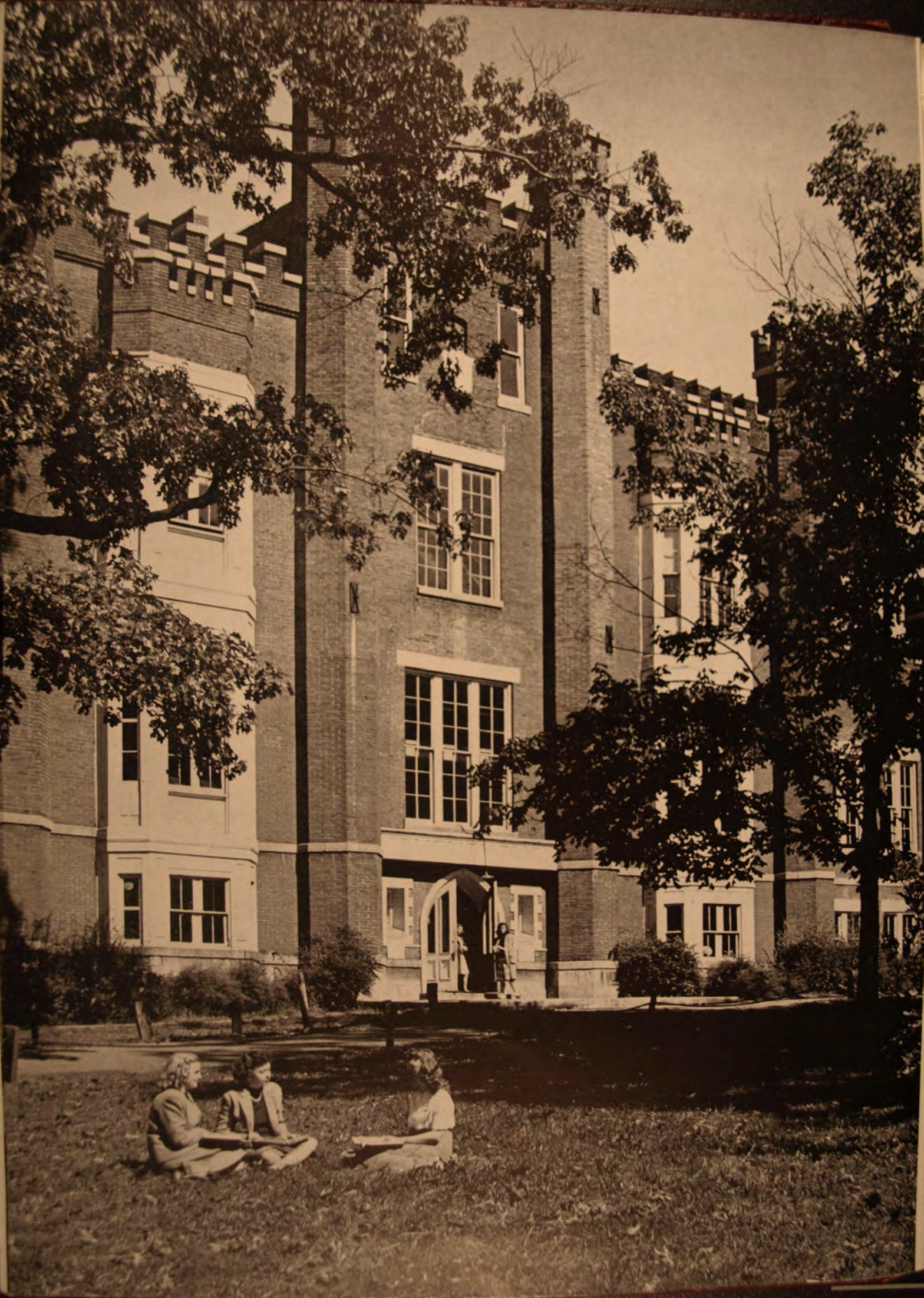

This CAMPUS OF OURS

Our campus at Austin Peay State College is one of the loveliest in Tennessee. Three of the six natural depressions have been made into sunken gardens, which serve as cradles for a boundless variety of flowers from early spring till frost; the other depressions are used for demonstrations of forest plantings.

Forming the background for the northernmost sunken garden is the stately Myra McKay Harned Hall, dormitory for women. It has rooms for 180 women, two in a room, and contains the office and apartment for the matron, the infirmary and nurse's quarters. The impressive reception room is the nucleus of the social life for the students.

Outstanding because of its architecture and its history is the Castle Building, center of activity around the school. This aged building houses

classrooms for mathematics, social science, psychology, English, languages, art, agriculture, music, and commerce.

The Stewart Building contains the administrative offices, library, gymnasium, assembly hall, laboratories and lecture rooms for all sciences, other classrooms, and the recently completed student room.

Robb Hall and Calvin Hall, dormitories for men, have rooms for approximately 100 students. A member of the faculty lives in each dormitory to look after the care of the rooms and the comfort and welfare of the men.

For indoor athletic contests and for large assemblies, the college has the use of the new armory building just across the street. The college will also have at its disposal the large municipal stadium which is being built near the armory.

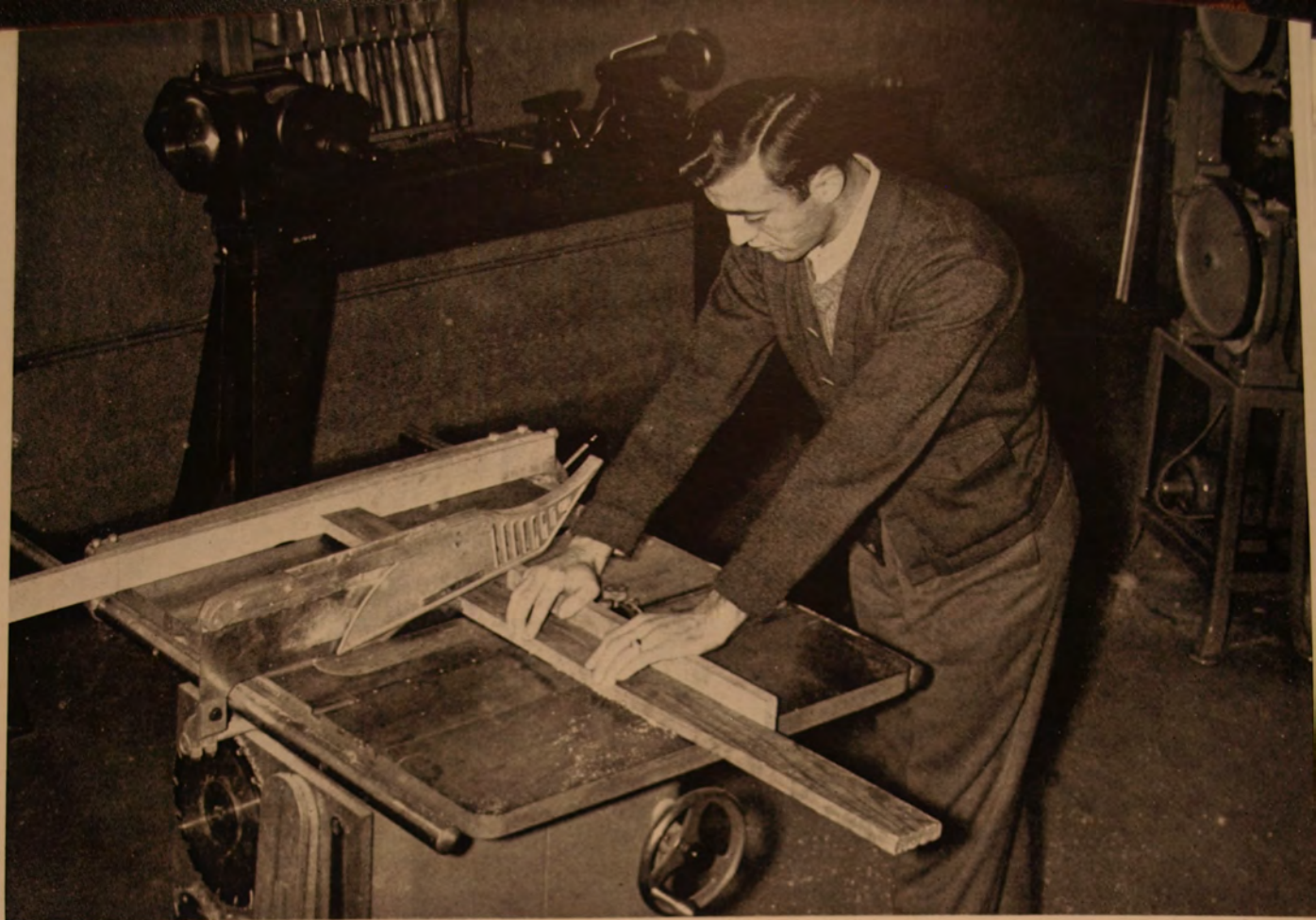

Theory AND APPLICATION

Theory and application are combined at Austin Peay State College. Theory without the principles of application makes one visionary and impractical. On the other hand, learning the tricks of the trade or learning to work by rule of thumb is insufficient.

The farmer, the homemaker, the mechanic must know underlying principles. It is only a knowledge of principles that can insure freedom and success through the power of adaptation in changing conditions. The method of teaching here is such as to develop the habit of observation, of inductive reasoning, of right generalization, and of wise application.

In home economics there is an efficient working balance between theory and practice. Along with the best ways of performing homemaking tasks are given the basic reasons for the improved practices. Practical home management, care, repairs, and equipment of the home are a vital part of the homemaking courses.

The laboratory work in the industrial arts courses consists of many things useful and practical.

The business of science is to answer vital questions of life. Science must be revealed as an intellectual and social force. Students and the public need a broad cultural outlook in science, which is a mode of thought and action, not just a body of knowledge or a course.

At Austin Peay State College science is taught both for the layman and as a background for the potential specialist. The non-specialist is given a broad general appreciation for the field, with mastery of fundamental principles and application.

Instruction results in an understanding—from the point of view of the consumer, the householder, and the intelligent informed citizen—of such things as food, clothing, building materials, automobiles, mechanical devices, photography, household mechanics, industrial processes, and the like.

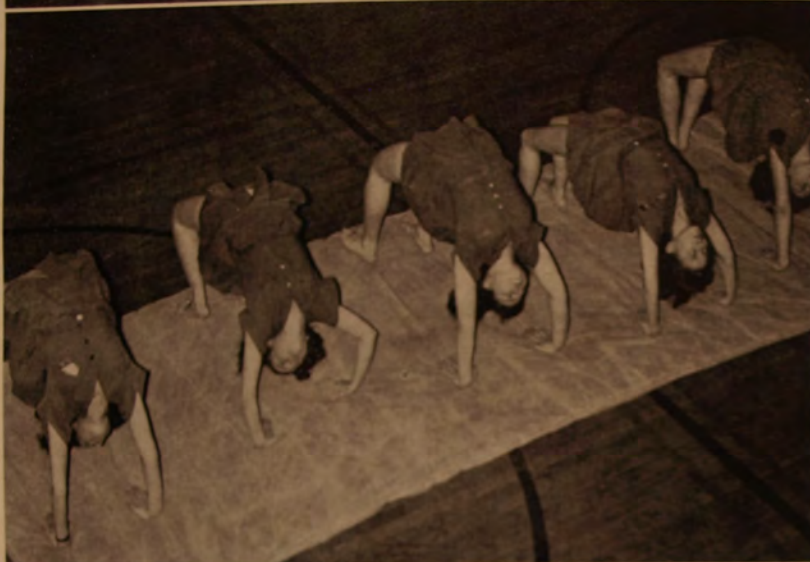




Above: In the year-round athletic program, which is stressed by the college, the girls participate in gymnastics, team games, and outdoor sports.

PHYSICALLY FIT

Austin Peay State College believes in an all-round program of physical fitness, the aim of which is the development of every student. Each student participates in either the gymnastics, competitive athletics, or other outdoor activities.

All freshmen are required by the College to take health throughout the year. Major health problems such as choice of food, weight control, stimulants, dietary difficulties, parenthood, mental health, and a thorough study of the care of all parts of the body are included in this course in health.

Many other health courses are arranged to cover a wide field of general knowledge and to embrace such subjects as physiology and first aid, nutrition, home nursing, and school and community health.

Methods and materials of teaching are offered to prospective teachers. Specific courses in health are required of these students.

Junior College students are required by the state to take physical activities which will give them vital health and body strength. In addition to the immediate benefit from these courses, there is immeasurable good which will result from such exercises and become a carry-over into the life of the individual.

Third- and fourth-year students are encouraged to participate in physical activities to further their ability toward recreational or intramural leadership.

The intramural program has as its aim "athletics for everyone." Through this program many more boys and girls get the enjoyment of actual competition than if it were limited to school athletics alone. In this way, a more wholesome and zestful outlook of life is evolved.
