AP student bills soar at TISL

Austin Peay students recently had the opportunity to find out what being a legislator is all about when they participated in the 30th Tennessee Intercollegiate State Legislature in Nashville from Nov. 9-12.

The Austin Peay delegation was comprised of ten members, including Jude Crowell, Jeremy Faulk, Rosalia Fierst, Angie Harville, David Hester, Heather Kinstler, Rebecca McCraw, Gabriel Segovia, Ellen Smith and Amy Spiceland. Paige Carter served as a House Clerk and was the Middle Tennessee Coordinator for TISL.

APSU students wrote and presented four bills to the House and the Senate during the four-day event held in the actual House and Senate chambers in the state capitol.

Faulk, a senior English major, wrote a bill to allow all schools under the Tennessee Board of Regents to recognize Veterans' Day as Austin Peay does. Spiceland presented the bill to the legislature. The bill passed the House and the Senate, resulting in a

unanimous vote in both houses. Faulk was proud of the bill because it was the first to pass both houses unanimously.

"TISL lived up to my expectations. I learned more about parliamentary procedure and proper house etiquette than I probably would have been able to at Austin Peay. I have already seen the improvement in myself. The event as a whole gave me a perspective of what it would be like to be a senator or representative. It was a valuable experience," Faulk said.

Smith, a junior majoring in political science, wrote and presented a bill requesting that spousal rape be considered equal to any other type of rape. Her bill passed both houses with acclamation, receiving support from fellow senators and representatives.

"The current law was outdated and outlandish. I wanted to change it and make it equal to other rape laws with harsher punishments," Smith said.

Kinstler, a chemistry major, wrote a bill pertaining to mandatory HIV testing for pregnant women. A similar bill was written by a Tennessee Tech delegate, so they

combined their bills. Kinstler presented the bill to the House and the Senate, and it passed both.

Harville and Segovia co-wrote a bill requesting that all cigarette vending machines be removed from public places except those restricted to minors. Segovia presented the bill to the House, and it passed. Harville presented it to the Senate.

"I really thought we could make a difference with the bill we sponsored. If I ever get the opportunity to present it to the real legislature, I will be prepared," Segovia said.

Austin Peay was the only delegation that had all bills passed in the House and the Senate and two to pass both houses with acclamation.

According to students who attended the event, APSU was one of the most knowledgeable schools when it comes to parliamentary procedure.

"I was very pleased to be a part of the best prepared delegation as far as knowing rules of order and presenting four well-written and organized pieces of legislation," Smith said.

Students also had the opportunity to hear Governor Don Sundquist speak about legislation currently in the works by state legislators.

Nearly 25 schools were represented at TISL, and students were able to network with other delegates that shared similar interests.

Many of the students are already planning to attend next year's TISL, where Kinstler and Spiceland may be appointed to clerk positions. Others have volunteered to help the TISL governor and staff.

After 30 years of TISL, the first female governor was elected for the 31st TISL to be held next year.

TISL proved to be a tremendous learning experience for Austin Peay students, and it allowed them the opportunity to urge state legislators to make a change and consider their bills for actual law.

The state sealbill law originated at TISL. Perhaps the bills written by Austin Peay students will become law for the citizens of Tennessee in the future.

Last Thursday night the Student Government Association unanimously passed a resolution to change the closing time of the Felix G. Woodward Library from 10 p.m. to midnight on Sunday.

The resolution, introduced by Jeremy Faulk, allows not only for the library to remain open until midnight, but also for the computer lab to remain open until 11:30 p.m. on Sunday.

"I told the president of SGA that we would be willing to do a survey of about one week," said Dr. Donald Joyce, dean of library and media services. "If we get enough people in there on Sunday night, then we would stay open later."

Randall to present lecture series on Middle East

An Austin Peay State University professor of philosophy will give a three-part lecture series at the end of this month on the crises in the Middle East.

Dr. Albert B. Randall, who has been studying Judaism and Islam for 30 years, said that while he is "not an expert" on such a complicated issue, he traveled to Jordan last year on a two-month expedition that took him to Israel twice and Syria once.

During this lecture series, which is sponsored by APSU's International Education Program, Randall hopes to clear up "the continuing misperception that comes from the media services about the extent and nature of this crisis."

The lecture series will be held on three consecutive nights. The first lecture, "The Holy War-Its Religious Origins, History of Importance in the World Today," will be held from 7:30 p.m. on Monday, Nov. 27, in the Gentry Auditorium (Kimbrough 119). Randall will present the history of the holy war and how the importance of land and "chosenness" effects these wars.

A Brief History of the Conflict Among the Children of Abraham (Jews, Muslims and Christians) in the Middle East," the second lecture in the series, will be held from 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 28, in Gentry Auditorium. During this lecture, Randall will summarize the history of the conflict between Jews, Christians, and Muslims in the Middle East and concentrate on events of the past 100 years.

The final lecture in the series is "The Children of Abraham—Sources of Mutual Understanding, Dialogue and Peace." It will be held from 7:30 p.m. on Wednesday, Nov. 29, in the JF Barry Conference Room (Kimbrough 109). It will focus on what Judaism, Islam, and Christianity have in common and will be an effort to move from conflict to dialogue.

"Throughout the series, the focus will be to promote tolerance based on knowledge and information and to present a position that is neither pro-Israel nor pro-Arab, but pro-peace," Randall said.

Yearbook pictures marijuana smoking

LUBBOCK, Texas—What is a yearbook? Should it be a keepsake, showcasing only the best of college life? Or should it be more like a documentary, portraying all facets of a university, warts and all?

At Texas Tech University, differing views of what a yearbook should be led the student senate to pass a resolution of grievances against the La Ventana.

Yearbook editors included a two-page spread on marijuana use on campus in the 1995 edition. The spread, entitled "Mary Jane's Addiction," featured photos of students taking hits from bong and quoted students saying that drugs were "very accessible in Texas."

LaVentana's managing editor, Julie Kimball, said when the article was written, marijuana use on campus was reported to be up 300 percent. Marijuana also figured prominently in the resignation of a prominent president for a student organization last year "and was in the student papers constantly."

So, to the yearbook staff, the two-page spread was worth putting in the yearbook—if only to illustrate what's happening on campus. "They (the senate) didn't feel that was appropriate, and I understand that," said Kimball.

Curt Bourne, president of the student association, put it this way: "A yearbook is something that you keep and show your friends, your kids, while recruiting students, and here's a two-page spread on marijuana, and the homecoming queen has a 1-1/2 x 3" picture in the index and no name by it. We support the yearbook, it's just that spread..."

Students go hungry for affirmative action

IRVINE, Calif.—After 16 days of no food, drinking only water, Gatorade and little else student hunger strikers at the University of California-Irvine campus ended their protest Nov. 1, calling it a moral victory.

The four Hispanic students from University of California-Irvine, along with one student from Claremont College, went on a hunger strike to protest the UC's Regents July 20 decisions to dump affirmative action practices from the University of California system.

The students began their strike on Oct. 16. Originally strikers had worked out an agreement with campus officials that allows them to camp out in tents on campus for 10 days as long as they ended their protest at midnight Oct. 27. The student they consented

to be monitored twice daily by student health.

A last-minute proposal, drafted by the students, continue the strike past Oct. 27 was ended by Irvine Chancellor Laurel Wilkening, who expressed concern for health of the students. But the students chose to continue their strike anyway, lasting the full five days until finally ending the fast.

During that time, several student groups and supporters urged the student to stop the protest. A letter was given to each of the strikers from Farm Workers of Maieria President Antonio Encarnacion, encouraging them to "honor your decision to strike on midnight Oct. 27 so that we can stand together for a future with justice in California."

When the hunger-strikers continued past the deadline, they were arrested for failing to follow police order. After they were arrested, students on the strike and were able to leave jail on their own power.

Governors drop thrilling season finale to UT-Martin

In the past few years, when Austin Peay and UT-Martin have hooked up for a football game, fans were treated to an offensive explosion that went to the wire.

The 1995 version at Skyhawk Field Saturday afternoon was no different, as the Governors rallied from a 17-0 first quarter deficit to make things interesting late, before dropping the season finale in 31-28 fashion.

The loss gave the Governors a 3-8 record for the year, with an Ohio Valley Conference record of 2-6, matching the overall record of a year ago.

The first quarter was a nightmare for the Governors. A sign of things to come occurred on the second play from scrimmage when Lance Hoeltke's first pass attempt was intercepted and returned to the Austin Peay 24. A personal foul penalty put the ball on the 12-yard line and four plays later, the Skyhawks led 8-0 after their two-point conversion was good.

Things didn't get any better for

the Governors on the next possession either. Just over a minute later, a safety put the Skyhawks ahead 10-0.

Following a 56-yard free kick by APSU punter Chris Wiggins, senior cornerback Kirk Pointer, playing in his final game as a Governor, put his name solely in the record books. Entering the contest needing just one interception to break the career mark of 15 he shared with Jim Hardie (1967-70), Pointer picked off a Martin pass at the Governors' own five-yard line that ended another Skyhawk threat.

However, the Governors were forced to punt and one play later, UT-Martin connected on a 49-yard scoring pass to put the lead at 17-0 to end the first quarter scoring.

On the first play of the second quarter, cornerback Tyrone Shorter notched the first of three interceptions on the day at the APSU 23-yard line. Following a 36-yard return and a 15-yard UT-Martin penalty, the Governors were in business at the Skyhawk 23-yard line.

Three plays later, Chris Horton

put the Gobs in the scoring column with an eight-yard run.

The Governors' defense stuffed the Skyhawks on three plays, forcing Martin to punt deep in its own territory. Michael Swift blocked the boot and Horton fell on the football in the Skyhawk endzone to pull the Gobs to within 17-14.

UT-Martin answered with a long drive that resulted in a touchdown to put the lead back to 10 at 24-14.

However, following an APSU punt, Shorter intercepted another pass that resulted in points for the Governors. Hoeltke's 10-yard keeper was the payoff.

Shorter picked off his third pass of the half with just over four minutes remaining to give the Governors another chance. However, David Young's game-tying 44-yard field goal attempt missed and the half ended with a 24-21 Skyhawk advantage.

In the second half, Hoeltke's second interception of the day deep in Governor territory resulted in a Skyhawk touchdown. It took the Skyhawks three plays to cover the

13 yards for a 31-28 third quarter lead.

Hoeltke pulled Austin Peay to within three again with his second touchdown run of the day from four yards out. The freshman quarterback led the Governors in rushing for the game with 100 yards.

Young's second attempt to tie the

game late in the fourth quarter was blocked.

The Governors had another chance in the waning seconds to win or at least tie, but Hoeltke's pass was picked off at the UT-Martin goal line with just 27 seconds remaining, sealing the defeat.

Despite the loss, the game was

extremely evenly matched statistically. There was an advantage in first downs (APSU 16), total yards (UTM 281 APSU 299), (both teams with 12), possession (UTM 30:23 29:35). The only notable difference was the 31-28 score.

Spikers end year with loss in first round of OVC tournament

The Austin Peay State University volleyball squad ended its 1995 campaign with a first round loss in the Ohio Valley Conference tournament to Middle Tennessee State.

The loss dropped the Lady Governors' overall record to 19-16 on the year with a regular season conference mark of 7-9.

The loss to MTSU gave the

Lady Raiders a sweep of Austin Peay this season, as the Lady Governors dropped both regular season contests.

The Lady Governors had a dismal attack percentage of .108 in the loss after committing 16 errors.

On the other hand, the Lady Blue Raiders recorded 62 kills to APSU's 30 in winning in three games, 15-6, 15-9, 15-5.

Andrea Miller had 18 digs on defense, while Amber Parks led the

offense with a 313 kill percentage. Middle Tennessee dominated the game throughout, leading the Governors in every statistical category for the win.

The loss marked the end of fine careers at Austin Peay. Seniors Miller, Suzanne Parks and Parks, along with junior Vann Austin, who will finish senior year of eligibility at a nursing school, played their final game for the Lady Governors.

Lady Gobs open exhibition play with impressive victory

If Loos wins, Vaughn must promote the Gobs' season opener Monday night against Northern Illinois at 7 p.m. wearing a sign in the APSU cafeteria at lunch Monday afternoon. If Vaughn wins, however, Loos will buy an APSU student present to the cream bar during lunch Monday.

In the latest installment of the James Bond series, "GOLDENEYE," Pierce Brosnan plays a remarkable knack for the role of an adventurer.

Superior to the rather dull Bond portrayed by Timothy Dalton, Brosnan's superspy comes with the right combination of intelligence, wit, and fearlessness.

Bond's latest mission is to retrieve GOLDENEYE, a Soviet nuclear device which uses an electromagnetic pulse that destroys electronic equipment within range.

Of course, the search for the stolen weapon leads Bond through a series of international adventures, sending Bond into one death-defying feat after another.

Along for the ride is a crop of new Bond women. Villainess Xenia Onatopp (Famke Janssen) is sexually lethal.

When she isn't stealing aeronautical equipment, she's crushing men to death with her thighs.

Bond's latest love interest, computer operator Natalya Simonova (Izabella Scorupco), appears to be a femme fatale in her opening scenes as the only survivor of GOLDENEYE's first blast. However, she becomes increasingly assertive and acts as Bond's partner in the film's conclusion.

The film compliments Bond's style with

incredible stunts, including a phenomenal bungee jump. The musical score is fresh, and the film possesses a new-found sense of playful satire directed at its own clichés.

"GOLDENEYE" is a witty, stylish return to the sort of Bond movie that disappeared after the Connery years.
