College Meal Books To Be Unacceptable

R. C. Shasteen, business manager, announced today that in the next few days the Slater Service will sell their own meal books and the coupons from the college meal books will not be accepted.

Students holding meal books issued by the college may have them redeemed at the Business Office by returning the books and the flyleaves which were dated and signed when the books were issued by the college.

The college will redeem the books by issuing cash or credit depending upon the manner in which the books were secured by the student.

Slater will issue meal books on credit to students on authorization from the college. The college will authorize books to the following:

1. Students with a food allowance from State Vocational Rehabilitation;
2. Students with money on deposit with the college;
3. Students with a food allowance authorized by an organization authorized by the college for such credit.

For the Spring and Summer Quarters of 1964 only, a student may secure a refund of \$8 out of the dormitory rent for the current quarter by turning in to the Business Office not later than 10 days after the close and not earlier than 10 days before the close of the current quarter the flyleaves from current college and Slater meal books valued at a minimum of \$60.

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ASB Election Rules

Once again the election time has rolled around at Peay State College. Election day has been set for April 22, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the Student Center.

In order to avoid confusion and hard feelings among those who may have aspirations of running for one of the four offices which are up for grab, the following rules have been set up concerning this year's election.

Each candidate, whether he is running on a ticket or as an independent candidate, will be expected to abide by the rules set up by this year's Associated Student Body.

The rules are:

1. Petitions for candidates must be in the ASB office by Friday, April 10. Fifty signatures are required of the candidates.

2. Posters may be put up any time after midnight, April 14.

3. A debate among all of the candidates will be held in the student center on Monday, April 21, beginning at 7 p.m.

4. Speeches of the candidates will be given in assembly April 21.

5. Voting will take place April 22 in the student center.

Time of the voting will be between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

6. Qualifications which all candidates must meet are:

a. Each candidate must have a 2.0 (C) overall grade average.
b. A candidate must be enrolled for at least 12 quarter hours this quarter.

c. A candidate must be classified as a sophomore or junior and he must have been enrolled at APSC for three consecutive quarters prior to his election.
d. He must intend to serve the full length of the Fall, Winter and Spring Quarter at APSC.

e. No candidate may have been on social probation at any time.
f. In case no candidate receives a majority of the votes cast for an office, a run-off election shall be held between the two candidates receiving the largest number of votes cast. The run-off election will be held the week following the first election.

g. All posters must be removed from campus by April 24, unless there is a run-off election. Candidates within a run-off election may keep posters until two days after the run-off election.

h. On voting day all campaigning with materials such as cards, pins, etc. (that is distribution but not wearing of the items) will be prohibited. However, conversation among candidates, campaign managers and voters will be permitted.

Amendment Proposal

Whereas the Constitution of the Associated Student Body insures Senate representative of both the men and women in the Men's Student Government Body and the Women's Student Government Body respectively, it is hereby proposed that section 2 of Article III of the ASB Constitution which now reads

"...the president and one elected representative from each class (the elected representative shall be of the opposite sex of the president)"

be amended to read as to

"...the president and one elected representative from each class."

In accordance with the ASB Constitution, the above mentioned proposal shall be effective upon an affirmative vote of a majority of the student body members who cast ballots.

Balloting on said amendment will take place in assembly on April 14.

Dean Woodward Listed In Who's Who

F.G. Woodward, dean of the faculty and director of the graduate division at Austin Peay State College, has been selected to appear in the 1964 edition of "Who's Who in America." The annual publication lists the names and accomplishments of outstanding Americans each year. In 1926 he received his B.S. Degree from George Peabody College in Nashville, and in 1929 he was awarded a M.A. (English) from Vanderbilt University.

He was a lecturer in English Education at Central State Teachers College, Mt. Pleasant, Mich. In the summer of 1929, he was head of the department of English at APSC between 1929 and 1947.

In 1935 he left the college to do graduate work at Vanderbilt and returned in 1943 as dean of the faculty.

He is an elder and chairman of the Sunday School Board of the First Presbyterian Church in Clarksville; a member of the Joint Committee on Public Higher Education in Tennessee; and member of the Tennessee Council on Teacher Education and Certification.

In 1958 Woodward was made an honorary member of the Rotary Club and was president of the Middle Tennessee Education Association during 1961-62.

Woodward has been the author of several publications including "The New Humanities," "A Program of Tennessee Colleges" and "A Bibliography of Rural Life Literature."



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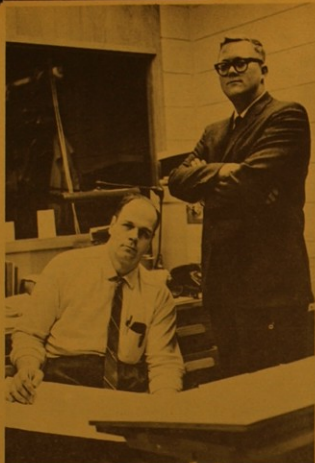
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Speech And Theatre

"Thorough knowledge in the field of speech is the hallmark of a college educated man," Dr. David Mays, assistant professor of speech and chairman of the speech and theatre department, declares.

The speech and theatre department is new at Austin Peay State College. Its purpose is to balance the practical aspects of everyday public speaking with rhetoric and public addresses.

Theatre is spelled that way on purpose. It means entertainment from a stage and not from the screen. The primary activity of the department is theatrical. The plays, presented in the auditorium, are planned to be entertaining and provocative.

There are two members of the department; Dr. Mays and John Griffin, assistant professor of speech. "We both believe that live acting is irreplaceable; that it is an art form," Dr. Mays says.

Plans for the future include additional courses in speech and theatre as well as new classes in voice, diction and debate. The department expects to grow because of the interest of the students.

There will be four plays instead of three presented next year. The last one of this season is "Arms And The Man." It

Spring Events Rolling



Baseball—Following a make-or-break series with Murray State the Gavs will host Belmont Thursday afternoon in a non-conference battle at 3 p.m.

Last week's tussle with Murray on the Kentucky diamond was a near double-header sweep for the Gavs as they lost the first game 2-1 and won the second 5-3.

Murray's great pitcher, George Dagan, whose 9-0 record led the nation last season, saw his early season record hanging in the balance with a Gov on second in the final inning. A pitout on a steal attempt for third assured Dagan's victory.

Returning to this week's clash, the much-improved Belmont Rebels should provide ample activity for the Gov diamond dusters. The Gavs lead the Rebels in the all-time series record 15-5.

Golf—This Thursday the Gov linkmen return to action also playing Belmont in a triangular match along with David Lipscomb in Nashville on the Old Hickory Golf and Country Club course.

The Gov golfers are currently riding an undefeated 5-0 record this far this season with victories over the University of Missouri, Union University, Florence State, David Lipscomb and Belmont.

Sensors Steve Miller and Don Wood, Junior Bob Mitchell, sophomores A.B. Sisco and Jimmy Barber and freshman Joe Young have been the individual factors in the Gov win string. These men, with the exception of Wood, should well remember last season when the Gavs beat the Blisons 21 1/2 to 5 1/2 at Fort Campbell but one week later lost 14-13 in Nashville. This haunting memory should furnish incentive for another Gov triangular victory in preparation for conference foes.

The linkmen will host their first two conference foes Monday on the Cole Park course at Ft. Campbell, Ky., when they meet Tennessee Tech and Western Kentucky in another triangular meet.

Track—Only one outing is scheduled for the Gov track team this week as they play host to U-T Martin in Municipal Stadium at 1 p.m. Saturday.

Coach Gordy Schultz's thincials are still in need of more depth and will be looking for help from Bob Embry, freshman star. Embry has been sidelined due to an ankle injury and has been counted on for as many as eight or nine events per meet.

Last season the Gavs defeated the U-T Martin Volunteers for their lone track win of the season in a triangular meet on the Gov field. APSC scored 71 points compared with 68 points for David Lipscomb and 28 points for U-T Martin.

Tennis—The Gov setters will play their second match Saturday hosting Tennessee Tech at 1 p.m.

The tennis team will depend on experience and fate to try to better last season's 1-7 record with the lone triumph being a 5-1 victory over U-T Martin.

The Tech setters were able to score only nine points in last year's OVC meet on their home courts while the Gavs scored eight.

Providing the Tech improvement does not exceed the Gavs advancement, Saturday's match should be a closely contested affair with the Cookeville netters.

Postponements

LAST week-end's scheduled double-header with David Lipscomb was postponed because of rain. The track meet was also postponed because of wet grounds and cold.

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Gavs Split Double-Header With Murray

In the double-header that the Gavs managed to get in, Murray State played host to the baseballers and gained a split from the Gavs.

The Governors lost the first game of the double-header by the score of 2-1. The Gavs managed only two hits and one run off of George Dagan, the nation's leading pitcher last season.

In the second game, Leon Sandifer's crew defeated the Thoroughbreds 5-3. This marked the first victory for the Governors this season and was also the first time they had defeated Murray State since joining the Ohio Valley Conference.

The Gov's win came in the fourth inning of the second game when they were trailing 2-1. Murray had scored two runs in the first inning and APSC had tallied one in the second inning.

In the fourth inning Dwight Gregory opened with a single and advanced to second on a passed ball. Buddy Corlew followed with a walk. Both runners were moved up one base on a fielder's choice.

With two outs Dave Small drove both men in with a single to right field. Small went to third on an error by the shortstop. Two more runs crossed the plate on a single by Doug Stamper and APSC had captured its first game of the season, 5-3 over the Thoroughbreds.

Two Sign Grants-In-Aid

Two outstanding basketball players have been signed to basketball grants-in-aid to Austin Peay State College for the coming year.

Bob Burnett, 6-5 1/2 forward from Lowes, Ky., and Danny Oliver, 6-5 forward from Scottsville, Ky., will be members of the 1964-65 freshman basketball team.

Burnett scored 508 points and grabbed 359 rebounds during the recent basketball season while performing for Lowes High. He also hit 52 per cent of his field goal attempts.

Lowes sported a 25-9 seasonal record and were ousted from the regional tournament by Mayfield. Seldon Sleds, 6-5 senior-to-be and a starter at the season's end for the Governors, also prepped at Lowes High.

Oliver starred at Allen County High this past season and helped his team to the semi-finals of the Kentucky state tournament.

He gained all-district and all-regional honors, scored 301 points during the recently-completed campaign and pulled down 319 rebounds.

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
