Confidence is also the key to speaking up and expressing your own ideas no matter how contradictory they may be. Confidence is standing up and waving your own flag.







Success is putting first that thing in which you want to be successful, yet never losing contact with the other things around you and realizing ¹⁰ they're important too.







"For this is the journey that men make to find themselves. If they fail in this, it doesn't matter much else what they find."




HAPPY BIRTHDAY U.S.A.






THE HASSLE OF REGISTRATION










Andy Fulton

In a similar way, the president of a university, through his official actions, bears a great deal of responsibility for the success or failure of that institution.


The facts show clearly the great progress which Austin Peay has made under the administration of Dr. Joe Morgan.

During his 13 years as president of Austin Peay, it has grown from a teacher's college to a multi-purpose university with a budget of over \$7 million. The student body has doubled in size, from approximately 2,000 to 4,000 students, while faculty and administration have grown from approximately 120 to 190 members.

Several buildings have been completed, including the Woodard Library, the University Center, the Dunn Center, and a number of classroom buildings and

A SMOOTH TRANSITION






Riggs administration will change APSU life significantly in the ensuing years. Examples are already evident in Riggs restructuring of the campus grounds, planning and administration.




A GLANCE INTO THE FUTURE

NEW ADDITIONS





All of these new additions were greatly needed at Austin Peay State University.











The Golden Hearts sold singing valentines and carnations during the winter quarter to raise money for their big brothers.







THE OFFENSE





After defeating East Tennessee, Murray State, Western, and Middle Tennessee twice; the Govs seemed on their way to their third conference title in four years. However, the Govs found themselves in the middle of "Death Valley" with no place to turn. And it was "death" for the Govs as they fell prey to both Eastern Kentucky and Morehead. The two losses sent the Govs into a tie for the conference lead with Western.





During the fall season the Govs finished tied for fifth in the Murray State Invitational and second in the Redbird Invitational at Normal, Ill.








Anthony Carter and a David-Lipscomb opponent run head-and-head in the 100-yard dash.


T E N N I S














The women's sports program at Austin Peay is becoming a very important feature of the university's total athletic program.




INTRAMURAL RECREATION






Intramural Recreation involves more than fraternities and sororities competing for awards. It is a means and an opportunity for the whole university to participate in some worth-while activity for recreation.


