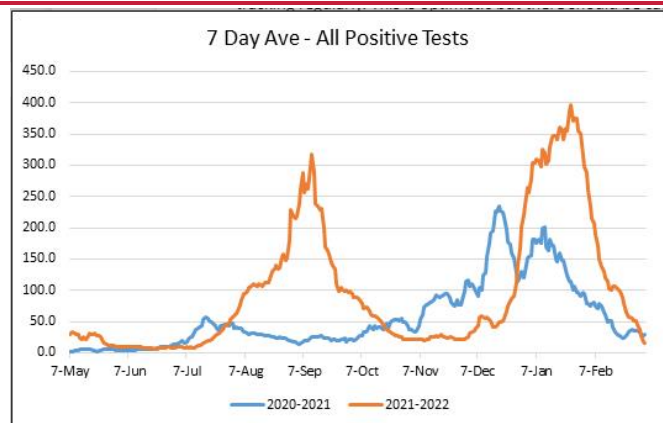

### ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

- Numbers for 3/10/2022 reported through 3/5/2022. Cases continue to decline from the peak one about 4 weeks ago including the percentage of positive cases. The total positive cases are down to 16 per day which is in line with base rates across non-peak times since we began tracking regularly. This is optimistic but there should be caution as other areas of the world deal with pop-up variants that can return to our communities. Also given that there are less cases we should see a smaller number of deaths over time but it still remains quite high. Most may not develop severe symptoms, but those that do still are at high risk for complications that include death based on the reported numbers in Montgomery County.
