

A Lost Dream, an Unlikely Friendship, and the Redeeming Power of Music

Author and Los Angeles Times columnist Steve Lopez spoke to the APSU student body, on Thursday, Sept. 29, in what was the culmination of over a week of Peay Read events. Lopez's book "The Soloist" — about a schizophrenic musician, Nathaniel Ayers, who becomes homeless — was chosen by the Peay Read Committee as the year's required freshmen reading material. Events for the Peay Read included screenings of "The Soloist," book discussions and an essay contest. Having spoken to dozens of groups across the country, Lopez said the message he most wanted to leave with students was to "take advantage of the opportunities college offers you to figure out what you really have a passion for."

End of an Era




Subway Sets Up Shop at The Peay

In late September 2011, APSU welcomed its newest dining venue to campus. Subway opened its doors to anxious students, faculty and staff after much conversation about the new restaurant. Subway replaced Austin's Diner, a 1950's style soda shop, as a healthier option for students. Since it opened, Subway quickly became the busiest location in Middle Tennessee, proof of its popularity among the student body.

Dance Marathon

Student Life and Leadership organized a Dance Marathon to benefit the Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt. The Marathon had a "rave" theme, allowing students and participants the chance to dance the night away. More than \$5,500 was raised to benefit children facing life-threatening conditions. Part of the fundraiser was to recognize children who have bravely faced extreme health conditions like cancer and other serious illnesses.



AUSTIN PEAY

On September 11, 2001, America cried as the terrorist attacks on our country took its toll on 2,819 firefighters, policemen, soldiers, and civilians. It affected every American in some way, and some more so and deeper than others. We all remember where we were that day, no matter how old or young.

That was 10 years ago, and the toll has only increased with the War on Terror that has unfolded since. Tears have been shed by every family affected by both the 9/11 attacks and what has transpired as a result. Everything in America has changed, from the way we travel to the simple way we look at our loved ones.

Austin Peay State University students experienced an eye-opener when the highest ranking FDNY firefighter to survive the 9/11 attacks, Capt. Richard Picciotto, spoke in Clement Auditorium. Picciotto traveled to our school to share his experience. His moving story touched the hearts of many, and now students at our very own university have had the chance to be touched as well.

As the program began, students were instructed to look for a card marked with the fire department shield at the end of the row they were sitting in. If their row had a card they were to stand. 343 students stood, representing the 343 firefighters that died when the twin towers collapsed. The audience now looked on in utter shock at the visual display of the number dead — a display many of them had probably never seen.

The first firefighter killed had not even entered the building, however. Picciotto said early in his account that the first firefighter killed actually died from a victim falling from one of the upper floors of the 110-story burning building.

As Picciotto made his way up the stairway of the North Tower, he stopped on each floor to make sure everyone was evacuated. On the 35th floor, Picciotto said he could “feel the noise” of the South Tower falling. His first thought: “How many friends of mine just

died?" And the next: "How many people were in that building?" These unanswered questions plagued him while he stood in the North Tower plotting his next move. He repeatedly says the toughest decision he ever made was to evacuate the building.

Austin Peay State University students watched and listened in awe as he continued his story. Emotions were evident everywhere in Picciotto's audience and he expertly used a touch of comedy to prepare the audience for his next major event, telling a story about a man who was too busy with his work to evacuate.

On the 12th floor, he came across a room full of people who were doing nothing to try and escape the building. He talked about those first moments, wondering why there were still people on a floor so close to the ground and then realized that each of the people on this floor were handicapped in some way.

As he helped the people escape the building the banging began again and the lights went out. This time he knew. He knew that the North Tower was falling and they would soon be crushed. His prayer of "Please God, make it quick," filled his mind right before the stairs disintegrated beneath his feet. Hope continued to live when he realized they were in a void and they had a chance to escape.

Picciotto told students about making priorities and the importance of keeping family and friends toward the top of that list. He told students about preparedness in a crisis. He spoke about financial and emotional support for families and service men affected by this infamous day and he sent a large "Thank you" to each and every student. He stressed the importance of sending out the same support to the soldiers in the military who are dying every day for our freedom to attend this university, among many other things.

Picciotto told a captivating story, and Austin Peay students listened intently, most realizing that they were lucky to have heard it.





























Food Pantry sets up shop in SLL office to help APSU students facing difficulties

Shannon Doss and Kaytreana Shepherd, two graduate students in the Social Work department, had an idea.

They went to Alexandra Wills, Assistant Director for Student Life and Leadership, and pitched their idea.

Their idea? To help out their fellow APSU students. They created the Save Our Students (S.O.S.) Food Pantry to provide a helping hand to students struggling to make ends meet. S.O.S. not only helps students in need, but they also have counseling services attached to the program.

To get the program running they needed support and donations from students, faculty, and staff, which later totaled more than 1,000 items. They needed space to store the items, which came from a converted closet in the SLL office.

Two corporate sponsors — Publix and Davita — are also helping out. Starbucks set up a food drive. Alumni have donated money and gifts of the food to support them.

Giving food is not only service that S.O.S. provides. There is also counseling. If a student comes back a second time, they will sit down with one of the counselors from APSU. Any situation can happen in someone's life that can create troubling times for a student. Their goal is not only to provide food but also find the core problem.

They have big plans for the future to get a new, larger facility that can also include a thrift store.
