

Simplification of pulling class cards, registration steps and the initiation of the \$2 fee for changing a course decreased waiting periods and long, long lines.


The addition of several student assistants also improved the flow of traffic in the Memorial Health Building.

Final official enrollment figures showed a record 2,471 students, a slight increase over the 1964 fall quarter figure. A breakdown shows 1,564 men and 907 women. By classification, there were 1,009 freshmen, 640 sophomores, 405 juniors, 328 seniors, 67 graduate students and 22 special students.






Homecoming celebration attracts largest crowd in APSC history


Gigantic building program hampered by sub-freezing temperatures

Campus beauty Cissy Williams doesn't seem alarmed about the construction slowdown.

Ole Man Winter crept into the massive construction scene, and for a three-week period hampered APSC's unprecedented building program. Sunny skies soon made it possible to pour concrete again, and the familiar snow battles subsided.

A 32-apartment married complex costing \$340,000 was completed in December; however, furious work continues on a \$1.4 million library, an \$850,000 women's dormitory and a \$440,000 men's residence hall. Completion of the three-story, 77,000 square foot library is expected by November 1, while the dormitories should be ready for occupancy this fall.

Still, a one million dollar student union building and a \$600,000 classroom are on the drawing boards.



His warm personality, hard work and devotion have influenced all areas of college life.




Long-time deans coordinate academic affairs, maintain quality

The Council is composed of the president and Panhellenic representative from the Alpha-Beta, Delta, Epsilon and Omega clubs.


Six selected counselors live in the freshmen dormitory and seek to guide 22 to 26 girls to which they are assigned.





The curricula of the college are routes to intellectual maturity and a means to the development of ideas, insights, values and competencies which form a permanent personal capacity for thought and action. Accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, APSC offers instruction in 19 departments. Degrees granted are the bachelor of arts, bachelor of science, bachelor of science in education and the master of arts in education on the graduate level. Self-exploration and mental enrichment take place at APSC daily—encouraged, perpetrated, initiated by classes, instructors and professors. The teachers prod, pry, inquire and inform to encourage academic excellence.



Varied and interesting careers available in Home Economics


For those young women who choose home economics as their major, a large and varied number of interesting careers are available.






Extensive courses in all phases of mathematics are offered in the department of mathematics for the student wishing to major in this field.











Chapter Two of Austin Peay State College's story-book football reversal was completed when the 1965 Governors posted the finest gridiron record in the 36-year history of the institution with an 8-1 mark.

The 1964 contingent started the rise to national football prominence by presenting head coach Bill Dupes and his staff with an 8-1-1 season. The 1964 winning season was the first since 1952, as Gov grid teams had won only six games in five years while losing 34.

Derailed by eventual Ohio Valley Conference champion Middle Tennessee 24-20 in the classic of all OVC games before 11,000 homecoming fans, APSC finished in the loop's runner-up spot for the second straight year.

APSC scored 280 points in nine games for a lusty 31.1 average per outing to top the conference in scoring offense. Not to be denied, the scoring defense was the best in the league also, allowing 118 points for a 13.1 average.

Ground-conscious, the Govs easily led the OVC with 2,142 yards for a 238.0 average per tilt. APSC finished second in total offense with 352.7. On total defense, the scarlet and white was the loop's best, allowing 249.9 per game. The rushing defense was second best with a stubborn 96.4 average.


Phenomenal Govs vary attack to destroy first 5 opponents



Turnstiles continued to click with paying customers as APSC drew an estimated 54,700 in nine contests. Five home games attracted approximately 33,800 spectators.

Individually, seven were named to the annual All-OVC twinkle squad, and three others landed berths on the second unit. The first teamers were junior Ronnie Parson, end; junior Tommy Dobbs, guard; junior John Ogles, fullback; senior defensive tackle Tommy Dillard; junior linebacker Bobby Byrd; junior defensive back Andy Toombs; and senior defensive back Tim Chilcutt. Senior defensive ends Claude Clements and Larry Black and senior tackle Tom Jones were on the conference's second unit.


Chilcutt, 5-10, 165-pound deluxe halfback, earned a position on the Associated Press Little All-American team for the second straight year. At the season's end, Chilcutt, Dillard and Jones inked pro pacts with the Houston Oilers of the American Football League. Parson was drafted in the red-shirt round by the San Francisco 49ers of the National Football League and the Oakland Raiders of the AFL.

OVC final statistics revealed that Parson was the conference's leading scorer with 71 points. Ogles was sixth with 42, end Pete Bush ninth with 39 and Chilcutt 11th with 36 tallies.

Senior quarterback Rodney Rogers amassed 1,203 yards on total offense, good for fourth in the OVC, while Ogles was seventh with 1,017 yards. Rogers passed for 833 yards, ninth best, and back-up signal-caller Aubrey Flagg was 12th with 182.

Record-breaking Ogles set a new school standard by rushing for 1,017 yards, which placed him second in the OVC. Rogers was ninth with 370 yards via the turf, senior Arnold Huskey 10th with 345 and Chilcutt 13th with 316 yards. This foursome, known as the "Governors' Cabinet," was the best-balanced backfield in the conference.

Chilcutt ran away with the OVC punt return title as he returned 30 kicks for 502 yards and an amazing 16.7 yards per return. He was the league's second-best in kickoff returns with 258 yards. Toombs intercepted six passes to place second in this category, while Parson was the loop's fourth-best punter with a 37.3 average.

APSC began the season on a weird note. Surprise Eastern Kentucky reeled off 28 points in a nightmarish fourth quarter to defeat the Govs 35-30. Six days later, OVC commissioner Art Guepe granted the Govs a 1-0 forfeit by virtue of the fact that the Maroons had inadvertently used an ineligible player in the season opener.

Propelled by the Eastern reversal, APSC whacked Murray State 23-6 to move again into contention for the OVC crown. Rogers established a new school mark in total offense by running and passing 229 yards. Parson booted a 42-yard field goal, his second of the young season, to give APSC a 3-0 halftime advantage. Three Rogers' TD passes sealed the verdict in the final 30 minutes.

Stepping out of the conference for the first time, Dupes' boys manhandled Southeast Missouri 50-7 in the home opener at Municipal Stadium. Drawing first blood, APSC led 7-0 at the quarter stop only to see the visitors tie the count early in the second quarter.

Evidently maddened by SEMO's tying score, APSC cracked the game apart on the strength of Chilcutt's 53-yard touchdown from scrimmage and 82-yard pay-dirt punt return.

A 91-yard pass interception by 235-pound captain Dillard just before halftime gave APSC the spark it needed to maul Western Kentucky 38-6 in the fourth game. The billed rushing duel between the Hilltoppers' Dickie Moore and Ogles never materialized as Ogles gained 93 yards in 25 carries to Moore's 38 in 14.

APSC ran its seasonal mark to 5-0 by downing stubborn Morehead State 26-21. Commanding a 13-7 lead at intermission, APSC scored on the first play from scrimmage in the third quarter. Huskey's 43-yard burst made the count 20-7, and a pass interception in the final stanza by sophomore guard Phil Farinella iced the contest.


Publicized as the "OVC Game of the Year," unbeaten APSC and Middle Tennessee met with the conference leadership, and possibly the crown, at stake.

Trailing 10-0 at halftime, the Govs stormed to a 20-10 lead in an 8:13 stretch during the third quarter only to see it vanish under the brilliant throwing of Raider quarterback Teddy Morris in the final stanza.

Last-ditch drives of 99 and 76 yards spelled defeat for the Govs. The winning TD came with only 2:03 left to give Middle Tennessee a 24-20 win.

APSC built up a comfortable 23-0 lead in three quarters before whipping Tennessee Tech 23-12 in the OVC finale. The Golden Eagles managed only 68 yards rush-

ing against the stout Gov defense. Parson set a new OVC record with a 45-yard field goal, his fourth of the campaign.



Cigar-puffing Jim Lane, defensive coach, and offensive coach Jerry Flatt watch APSC-UT-Martin action intently.





Govs make shambles of record section by breaking 39 marks

Thirty-nine individual and team records were either shattered or tied by the 1965 squad. Last year in compiling the 8-1-1 slate, the Govs either broke or tied 30 marks. This season's marks are more impressive considering the nine-game schedule instead of the usual 10.

A breakdown on the record book assault shows (1) team offense and defense (eight broken); (2) individual career (10 broken, one tied); (3) individual single season (12 broken, one tied); and (4) individual single game (six broken, one tied).

Chilcutt personally accounted for breaking nine marks, six of which are all-time career highs. The versatile lad's name appears in the record section 13 times.

Ogles and Parson each cracked six school standards and tied one apiece. Rogers accounted for four new marks, and halfbacks Huskey and Jim Scroggins and tackle Dillard each set a new record. Toombs equalled one mark.

Bull-like Ogles has picked up 1,878 yards rushing in three years to eclipse the career record, and he still has his final season ahead of him.

Captain for the 1966 club, Byrd topped the defense for the third straight year with 59 individual tackles and 75 assists. Other top defensive stars and their tackles and assists were linebacker George White 41-37, Black 36-36, Toombs 30-38, Farinella 29-31, Mike Riddle 28-42, Bigham 28-17, Clements 27-23, Bob Fletcher 24-26, Dillard 21-27 and Billy Joe Jeans 20-21.

Team-wise, APSC made shambles of the record section by piling up 161 first downs, 117 by rushing. The Govs threw 18 touchdown passes and averaged 114.7 per game via the air route.



Two overtime losses, a couple of one-point defeats and a pair of closing-minute heartbreakers kept Austin Peay State College from a winning season during the 1965-66 campaign. The final tally showed a 7-14 overall mark, and a share of sixth place in the Ohio Valley Conference with a 3-11 league mark.

In his fourth year at the helm of the varsity, coach George Fisher suffered through his second straight losing season after two winning ones.

Inexperience could be blamed for the close defeats as the Governors won only one of seven real close battles.

Despite the losing season, APSC showed a 5-5 record in the friendly confines of Memorial Gymnasium. On the road the Governors could muster only a 2-9 record.

Eight individuals carried the burden during the 21-game schedule. These include 6-5 Virgil McElfresh and 6-4 Gene Wilkerson, both seniors; junior college transfers 6-6 Tommy Head and 5-9 Dennis Snyder; juniors 6-3 Hal Jackson, 6-4 Melvin Van Hooser and 6-3 footballer Andy Toombs; and 6-6 sophomore Bob Burnett.

APSC opened the season with back-to-back triumphs over Transylvania (90-66) and Union University (82-79), the latter being the only close game won by the scarlet and white.

Closing pre-holiday play, the Govs traveled to Texas and split a pair, losing to Lamar Tech (108-81) and upstaging Pan American (74-63).







Head's 21 points, 21 rebounds against Western tabbed tops

OVC officials got their first look at the Govs in the league's annual holiday tournament, and the squad nearly pulled off a tremendous upset before bowing 86-85 to defending OVC champion Eastern Kentucky. Head and Snyder were named to the 10-man all-tournament team by a vote of the news media.


The new year brought quick disaster as Eastern Kentucky and Morehead State beat APSC in the final minute, and the first OVC road trip saw East Tennessee whip the Govs 86-82 in overtime.

Disheartened players rose to the occasion, however, and dropped Tennessee Tech 83-77 at Cookeville for the season's top win.

Inclement weather forced postponement of the Western Kentucky tilt, and when the snow melted so had some of the Govs' momentum. Carrying a 5-5 record, APSC proceeded to drop their next seven engagements against conference opposition and UT-Martin, whom APSC had manhandled earlier 99-84.

Fisher stuck with a seniorless group in the final four games, and the Governors trounced East Tennessee (95-76) and Middle Tennessee (97-91) before losing an overtime struggle to Murray State (80-73).

Holding a five-point lead on several occasions, APSC scared OVC champion Western Kentucky before bowing to the nation's No. 10 team by a 76-63 margin in the season finale.




Murray's Don Duncan closely guards Dennis Snyder (12) in the Gov 108-77 defeat.

Squad tops OVC in free throw accuracy, No. 2 in country

Hitting free throws with amazing regularity, APSC finished atop the OVC in this category and No. 2 in the nation with a sparkling .783 percentage. Snyder (.833), Head (.803) and Jackson (.773) finished fourth, seventh and 10th in the OVC in free throw accuracy.

Head topped the squad in scoring with 382 points for an 18.2 average, and led all rebounders with 212 and a 10.1 average. Scoringwise, he ranked No. 5 in the OVC, and he finished 10th in rebounding.

Playmaker Snyder was 10th among league scorers with 340 markers for a 16.2 average, while Jackson's 13.8 average on 289 points was good for 19th position. Snyder led the team in field goal marksmanship with a .471 percentage, seventh in the OVC, while Head's .435 was good for 17th position.

Other top scorers include Van Hooser (8.6), Wilkerson (8.4), Toombs (5.6), McElfresh (5.4) and Burnett (5.2). Jackson for the second straight year came up with the season's top scoring effort by dumping in 30 in the triumph over Middle Tennessee. He also had the OVC high by connecting on 19 of 21 attempts at the charity stripe against UT-Martin. Top rebound effort was turned in by Head in the initial Western Kentucky encounter. The Clarksville lad pulled down 21 ricoschets.

Expected to bolster the attack for the 1966-67 season are sophomores-to-be 6-2 Charlie Moore (19.2), 6-3 Holly Heaberlin (16.5), 5-10 Tris Kington (11.8) and 6-7 Terry Young (10.7). This yearling quartet led the baby Govs to a 10-9 frosh tab this year.






Shortstop Quentin Osborne attempts to elude tag at third base in the 5-0 loss to Murray State.

Outstretched glove of first baseman Wayne Chesney misses throw to permit Middle Tennessee batter to reach first safely.















Winning two of three non-conference matches, the 1965 Austin Peay State College tennis edition dropped all four Ohio Valley Conference matches, however, to finish 2-5.



Rounding out the squad were Garvin Claiborne (No. 4), Gary Loveless (No. 5) and Rocky Cobb and Jim Roe, who split the No. 6 position.

Both Gov victories came at the expense of Kentucky Wesleyan, while two close losses to Tennessee Tech severely hampered the chances of winning a season.




Completing a forehand smash, frosh Gary Loveless leaves court surface.




Facial expression by Gary Loveless shows fierce play as he prepares to use backhand.

Finnish star Alavuo-tunki smashes numerous javelin records

Record-smashing performances by Risto Alavuo-tunki, a native of Kuusamo, Finland, highlighted the 1965 Austin Peay State College track and field season.


The Finnish star whipped the spear 239 feet, 5½ inches for a new school mark, cracked the Ohio Valley Conference standard with a 222-9½ toss and erased the Tennessee Intercollegiate Athletic Conference record with a 234-10 heave.

Teamwise, the Governors managed only a 2-5 seasonal record under the tutelage of Gordon Schultz. However, the cindermen pulled a big surprise in the seasonal finale by stopping Cumberland College (Ky.) and the University of Louisville in a triangular affair.


APSC finished fourth in the TIAC meet by scoring 33 points to champion Middle Tennessee's 80. The Govs managed seventh place in the OVC with 14 points, and a like place among 14 teams in the Fort Campbell Invitational.

Other Gov individual record-breakers besides Alavuo-tunki were: shot put—Jeff Fisher (50-0), discuss—Fisher (134-11½), and triple jump—George Fort (42-2½). Tom Hinkle, captain and most valuable, cracked the record for most points in a career by an individual performer. He scored 87 points to complete his varsity competition with 296 points.

Following Hinkle, TIAC mile and two-mile king, in the scoring column were Terry Schultz (71½), Fisher (68), Fort (49), Alavuo-tunki (48), Gary Swinconos (32), Riley Holliday (30), John Carpenter (29½), and Jim Rohrbacher (26).




Staff produces largest Farewell & Hail in history for students






An anthology of student writings and art published during the spring quarter constitutes *The Tower*.




A charter member of Delta Tau Alpha, national agriculture honor society, the APSC chapter has been a leader in, and was responsible for the establishment of, the national honor society.




Reorganization of student chapter 325 of the Music Educators National Conference was completed, and the club hopes to become more active in campus affairs as it once was.




Marching Band and Governettes is one of nation's largest










